



# CHARTER—CONSTITUTION—BY-LAWS

<p><i>Constitution of Christ Lutheran Church Rochester, New York Adopted: January, 1966 Preamble</i></p>	
<p><i>In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.</i></p>	
<p><i>We, members of the Church of Christ, desiring to be blessed together with Word and Sacrament and to unite as a congregation in the common confession, defense and propagation of our faith in Jesus Christ our Saviour, do hereby adopt this constitution and solemnly pledge ourselves to be governed by its provisions.</i></p>	
<p><i>Article I</i></p>	
<p><i>Name and Incorporation</i></p>	
<p><i>Section 1. The name of this congregation shall be Christ Lutheran Church of Rochester, New York.</i></p>	
<p><i>Section 2. This congregation shall be incorporated.</i></p>	
<p><i>Section 3. The seal of this congregation presents a double circle with a cross in the center, with the following inscription in the outer circle: Christ Lutheran Church, Rochester, New York, and the following inscription in the inner circle: Organized January 11, 1892.</i></p>	
<p><i>Article II</i></p>	
<p><i>Confession of Faith</i></p>	
<p><i>Section 1. This congregation confesses Jesus Christ as Lord of the Church. The Holy Spirit creates and sustains the</i></p>	



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<p>Church through the Gospel and thereby unites believers with their Lord and with one another in the fellowship of faith.</p>	
<p><u>Section 2.</u> This congregation holds that the Gospel is the revelation of God's sovereign will and saving grace in Jesus Christ. In Him, the Word Incarnate, God imparts Himself to men.</p>	
<p><u>Section 3.</u> This congregation acknowledges the Holy Scriptures as the norm for the faith and life of the Church. The Holy Scriptures are the divinely inspired record of God's redemptive act in Christ, for which the Old Testament prepared the way and which the New Testament proclaims. In the continuation of this proclamation in the Church, God still speaks through the Holy Scriptures and realizes His redemptive purpose generation after generation.</p>	
<p><u>Section 4.</u> This congregation accepts the Apostles', the Nicene, and the Athanasian creeds as true declarations of the faith of the Church.</p>	
<p><u>Section 5.</u> This congregation accepts the Unaltered Augsburg Confession and Luther's Small Catechism as true witnesses to the Gospel, and acknowledges as one with it in faith and doctrine all churches that likewise accept the teachings of these symbols.</p>	
<p><u>Section 6.</u> This congregation accepts the other symbolical books of the evangelical Lutheran Church, the Apology of the Augsburg Confession, the Smalcald Articles, Luther's Large Catechism, and the Formula of Concord, as further valid interpretations of the confession of the Church.</p>	
<p><u>Section 7.</u> This congregation affirms that the Gospel transmitted by</p>	

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<p>the Holy Scriptures, to which the creeds and confessions bear witness, is the true treasure of the Church, the substance of its proclamation, and the basis of its unity and continuity. The Holy Spirit uses the proclamation of the Gospel and the administration of the Sacraments to create and sustain Christian faith and fellowship. As this occurs, the Church fulfills its divine mission and purpose.</p>	
<p>Article III</p>	
<p>Relation to the Lutheran Church in America</p>	
<p>Section 1. This congregation is and shall remain a member of the Lutheran Church in America or its successor, of the synod of the church within whose boundaries it is located (of the New York Synod), and of the district to which it is assigned by the synod.</p>	
<p>Section 2. This congregation claims for itself all the rights and privileges and accepts all the duties and obligations connected with such membership. In so doing, this congregation recognizes the constitution, by-laws and constitutional enactments of the Lutheran Church in America and of the synod to which it belongs as having governing force in its life.</p>	
<p>Section 3. This congregation covenants to support faithfully with prayer, personal service and offerings the common work of the church and of the synod for the Kingdom of God.</p>	
<p>Section 4. This constitution, and all amendments thereof, shall be transmitted to the synod for review to ascertain that none of its provisions is in conflict with the constitution and by-laws of the Lutheran Church in America or with the synodical constitution. The article herein embodying the Confession of Faith and the section declaring the adherence of the congregation to the Lutheran Church in America</p>	



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<p>shall not be altered without explicit action by the synod agreeing thereto.</p> <p><u>Section 5.</u> The president of the synod or his appointed representative shall have the right to be present at, and shall receive prior notice of, all meetings of the congregation and of the church council during a pastoral vacancy.</p> <p><u>Section 6.</u> Should the congregation desire to relocate, or merge with another congregation, it shall secure the advice and approval of the synod before any commitments to that end are entered into.</p> <p><u>Section 7.</u> In case of strife or division, if any part of this congregation rejects the faith set forth in Article II, or refuses to abide by its obligations as a member of the Lutheran Church in America, that part of the congregation, whether a majority or a minority of its membership, which continues in unity with the Lutheran Church in America and its faith shall be recognized as the lawful congregation and shall continue in possession of all the property of the congregation.</p> <p><u>Section 8.</u> If this congregation a) disbands, b) ceases or fails to maintain religious worship or services according to the tenets and usages of the Lutheran church, c) departs from membership in the Lutheran Church in America without the consent of the synod, or d) so decreases in numbers or financial strength (in the opinion of the majority of the congregation) as to render it impracticable for the congregation to fulfill the purposes for which it was organized or to protect its assets from waste and deterioration, the synod to which Christ Lutheran Church of Rochester, New York, belongs shall have the right to take charge and control of all property of the congregation and thereafter to hold</p>	

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<p>manage and convey the same at the discretion of the synod.          Section 9. To be added?</p>	
<p>Article IV</p>	
<p>Membership</p>	
<p><u>Section 1.</u> This congregation shall consist of its pastor or pastors and other baptized persons within its fellowship. Child members are defined as those who have been baptized and are a part of the congregation but who have not yet been confirmed. Adult or confirmed members are those who have been duly received into communicant membership of the congregation by adult Baptism, confirmation, certificate of transfer from another Lutheran congregation, or reaffirmation of faith. Each applicant for adult membership shall have been properly instructed in the Word of God and the faith of the Lutheran church prior to his or her reception. All applications for such membership shall be submitted to, and shall require the approval of, the church council.</p>	
<p><u>Section 2.</u> It shall be the duty of confirmed members to avail themselves faithfully of the Means of Grace, joining regularly in the services of worship of this congregation, hearing the Word of God preached, and partaking of the Lord's Supper. They shall earnestly study the Holy Scriptures and observe private and family devotions. As is fitting for those whom the Holy Spirit has called to faith and discipleship, the members of this congregation shall lead a Christian life in love, humility and peace, endeavoring through admonition, consolation and encouragement to edify one another. They shall endeavor to promote the unity and welfare of the</p>	



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<p>congregation as a family of God.</p> <p><u>Section 3.</u> Parents shall present their children for Holy Baptism in early infancy and shall diligently nurture them in the Christian faith in the home and in the schools provided by the congregation.</p> <p><u>Section 4.</u> Acknowledging that all they are and all they have, come as good gifts from God, members shall, as one expression of their gratitude and obedience, contribute to the financial support of the congregation and for the general work of missions, mercy and education carried on by the Lutheran Church in America.</p> <p><u>Section 5.</u> Any confirmed member who, despite pastoral care and counseling, has failed for a period of <u>two</u> years to receive Holy Communion and to make any contribution of record to the congregation shall be classified by the church council as not in good standing and shall be removed from the roll of confirmed members. He shall be restored by the church council to the roll of confirmed members in good standing when he again receives the Lord's Supper and enters once more upon the other rights and obligations of a member of this congregation.</p> <p><u>Section 6.</u> A communing member is defined as a member who has received the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at least once within the year.</p> <p><u>Section 7.</u> At the request, preferably written, of a confirmed member a certificate of standing or of transfer of membership to another Lutheran or other evangelical congregation shall be issued to him.</p>	
<p style="text-align: center;">Article V The Pastor</p>	
<p><u>Section 1.</u> A pastor of this congregation shall be a man whose soundness in the faith, aptness to teach, and educational qualifications have been examined and approved by the church, and who</p>	

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<p>has been properly ordained; who accepts and adheres to the Confession of Faith of the Lutheran Church in America and of this congregation (Article II); and whose life and conduct are above reproach.</p>	
<p><u>Section 2.</u> He shall be a member of the Lutheran Church in America, or shall promptly apply to become a member thereof upon acceptance of the call of this congregation. Should the synod refuse to receive him, or should he be deposed from the office of the ministry, he shall automatically cease to be a pastor of this congregation.</p>	
<p><u>Section 3.</u> In the selection of a pastor, the congregation shall seek the counsel and guidance of the president of the synod.</p>	
<p><u>Section 4.</u> As soon as practicable after entering upon his duties, a pastor of this congregation shall be duly installed in his office by the president of the synod or his appointee.</p>	
<p><u>Section 5.</u> A pastor shall preach the Word, administer the Sacraments and conduct public worship in consistency with the faith and practices of the Lutheran Church in America. He shall care for his people individually and as a congregation, give catechetical instruction, confirm, marry in accordance with the laws of God and the State, visit the sick and distressed, and bury the dead. He shall inculcate piety in individual and family life and supervise all schools and auxiliary organizations of the congregation. He shall install regularly elected members of the church council, and, with the council, administer discipline. He shall seek out and encourage qualified young men to prepare for the ministry of the Gospel and strive to extend the Kingdom of God in the community, in the homeland and abroad. He shall impart knowledge of the church and its wider ministry through distribution of its periodicals and other publications and shall endeavor to increase the</p>	



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<p>liberality of this congregation in support of the work of the Lutheran Church in America and of the synod.</p>	
<p><u>Section 6.</u> In order that a pastor of this congregation may devote himself fully to the duties of his office, he shall receive an adequate salary, paid in semi-monthly or monthly installments. His expenses incident to attending conventions of the synod and the district shall be defrayed by the congregation.</p>	
<p><u>Section 7.</u> The pastor shall keep the membership rolls of the congregation, reporting thereon periodically to the church council. He shall record acts in the official parish register, which shall be and remain the property of the congregation. He shall be the custodian of the seal.</p>	
<p><u>Section 8.</u> When a pastor of this congregation desires to terminate his period of service, he shall submit his written resignation to the church council for report to the congregation. Unless otherwise agreed, the resignation shall normally become effective two months after the date on which it is submitted.</p>	
<p><u>Section 9. a.</u> The regular call of this congregation when accepted by a pastor shall constitute a permanent relationship which shall be terminated only for the following causes: (1) the death of the pastor or the dissolution of the congregation; (2) the resignation of the pastor; (3) the attainment by the pastor of the age of seventy years, after which time his pastoral service may be extended from year to year by a two-thirds vote of the congregation; (4) disqualification of the pastor through discipline; (5) the physical or mental disability of the pastor; (6) continued neglect of duty; (7) inability to conduct the pastoral office efficiently in this congregation in view of local conditions, without reflection on the moral and spiritual character of the pastor.</p>	

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<p>b. In the last three contingencies, it shall be the duty of the president of the synod, when such difficulties are personally known to him or have been brought to his attention by the dean of the district, by an official recital of allegations by the church council, or by a petition signed by at least one third of the communing members, to investigate such conditions personally in company with a committee of two ministers and one layman.</p>	
<p>c. In case of alleged physical or mental disability, competent medical testimony shall be secured. When such disability is evident, the president of the synod with the advice of the committee, shall declare the pastorate vacant.</p>	
<p>d. In case of alleged neglect of duty or of local difficulties which imperil the efficient conduct of the congregation, all those concerned shall be heard, after which the president of the synod together with an advisory committee, shall decide on the course of action to be recommended to the pastor and the congregation. If both agree to carry out such recommendations, no further action shall be taken by the synod. If either party fails to assent, the matter shall be reported to the subsequent convention of the synod and its action, based on the evidence submitted, shall be final. Such action shall not be regarded as an act of discipline, but as an act of expediency based on the principles of Christian love.</p>	
<p>e. The foregoing procedure shall never be invoked when questions of doctrine or morality are involved, all such cases being treated as disciplinary matters.</p>	
<p>Section 10. Charges against a pastor which, if sustained, would subject him to discipline shall be presented to the synod and adjudicated by it</p>	



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as set forth in the by-laws of the Lutheran Church in America.	
Section 11. At a time of pastoral vacancy, a vice-pastor shall be appointed by the president of the synod following consultation with the church council.	
Section 12. During his period of service, a vice-pastor shall have the rights and duties of a regularly called pastor. He may delegate the same in part to an interim supply pastor with the consent of the president of the synod. The vice-pastor and any ministers who may assist him shall refrain from exerting influence in the selection of a pastor.	
Section 13. This congregation shall make satisfactory settlement of all financial obligations to the former pastor, before calling a successor.	
Section 14. The privileges and responsibilities of an associate or assistant pastor shall be specified in his call, which shall be drafted in consultation with the president of the synod.	
Article VI	
Congregational Meetings	
Section 1. Subject to applicable civil laws, all confirmed members in good standing* shall be eligible to vote in all congregational meetings.	* who have attained the age of 21 years,
Section 2. An annual meeting of the congregation shall be held in January on a date to be determined by the church council.	
Section 3. Special congregational meetings may be called by the pastor or the church council, and shall be called at the written request of one-tenth of the confirmed members in good standing. The call for each special meeting shall specify the purpose for which it is to be held, and no other business shall be transacted thereat.	
Section 4. Notice of all congregational meetings shall be given at the services of worship on the preceding two consecutive Sundays and by	

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mail to all confirmed members in good standing at least ten days in advance of the date of the meeting.	
Section 5. <del>* Any number of confirmed members in good standing who are eligible to vote in congregational meetings shall constitute a quorum.</del>	* At least six (6)
Article VII	
Elections	
Section 1. Election of a pastor shall be by written ballot at a properly called congregational meeting presided over by the president of the synod or his appointee. Balloting shall be limited at any one meeting to a single nomination presented by the church council with at least two thirds of its members concurring. Two thirds of the votes cast shall be necessary for election. After the congregation has determined the salary and other emoluments to be offered to the pastor-elect, the church council shall execute a call accordingly and forward the same to him. Unless otherwise agreed, the call shall normally become invalid unless a definite answer is received within thirty days after its receipt. If a nominee fails of election or declines the call, the church council shall make another nomination at a subsequent meeting.	
Section 2. If this congregation unites with one or more other congregations in calling a pastor, the church councils of all congregations in the parish shall meet jointly and agree on a single nomination for election, the balloting to be done separately in each congregation. Two thirds of all the votes cast, and a majority of the votes cast in each congregation, shall be required for election. The joint church council shall issue the call.	
Section 3. If this congregation receives salary aid for its pastor from the Board of American Missions of the Lutheran Church in America, prior approval	



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<p>of that board must be secured to the nomination of a pastor and the amount of compensation to be offered to him.</p>	
<p><u>Section 4.</u> Deacons shall be elected by ballot for terms of three years by a majority of those present at a special congregational meeting to be held in May of each year. Their tenure shall be so arranged that one third of the terms expire annually. A deacon shall be eligible to serve no more than two full terms consecutively. Vacancies occurring ad interim shall be filled by the church council, the appointee to serve until the next meeting of the congregation.</p>	
<p>Article VIII</p>	
<p>Church Council</p>	
<p><u>Section 1.</u> The church council shall consist of the pastor or pastors and 12 deacons. Any confirmed member in good standing who is of legal age may be elected a deacon, subject only to the limitation on the length of continuous service permitted in that office.</p>	
<p>Should a deacon cease to be a communing member of this congregation, or should he without excuse fail to attend four successive regular meetings of the church council, his place shall at once be declared vacant.</p>	
<p><u>Section 2.</u> All lay members of the church council shall be installed by the pastor according to the prescribed order of the church at the next public service following their election or as soon thereafter as convenient.</p>	
<p><u>Section 3.</u> The duties of the church council shall include the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. To have general oversight of the spiritual life and activities of the congregation, and in particular of its public worship, to the end that everything is done in accordance with the Word</li> </ul>	



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<p>of God and the faith and practices of the Lutheran Church in America.</p> <p>b. To provide schools and facilities for Christian education for children, youth and adults.</p> <p>c. To inculcate the motives and practice of stewardship in all members of the congregation, and to encourage liberal giving to the work of the church in all its aspects at home and everywhere.</p> <p>d. To support the pastor in fulfilling his calling, and in so doing to visit the sick, the infirm and the spiritually indifferent, to minister to the poor and distressed, and to seek to bring the unchurched into the fold of Christ.</p> <p>e. To promote a spirit of peace and good will within the congregation and, if differences arise, to endeavor to restore harmony and mutual understanding.</p> <p>f. To arrange for pastoral supply during the sickness or absence of the pastor.</p>	
<p><u>Section 4.</u> The church council shall be the board of trustees of the congregation, and as such shall be responsible for its property and the management of its business and fiscal affairs. It shall have the powers and be subject to the obligations that pertain to such boards under the laws of the state of New York. The church council shall not, however, have the authority to buy, sell or encumber real property unless specifically authorized to do so by a meeting of the congregation. It shall prepare an annual budget for adoption by the congregation, shall supervise the expenditure of funds in accordance therewith following its adoption, but may not incur obligations of more than \$1,000. unless approved at a congregational meeting.</p>	
<p><u>Section 5.</u> The church council shall see that the provisions of this</p>	

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<p>constitution and its by-laws are obeyed and that the resolutions of the congregation are carried out.</p>	
<p><u>Section 6.</u> The church council shall be responsible for the employment and supervision of the salaried lay workers of the congregation.</p>	
<p><u>Section 7.</u> The church council shall elect communing members in the congregation who are of legal age as delegates in the permitted numbers to the conventions of the synod and the meetings of the district to which this congregation belongs. The expenses incurred by such delegates in connection with their attendance shall be paid by the congregation.</p>	
<p><u>Section 8.</u> The church council shall normally meet once a month. Special meetings may be called by the pastor or the president, and shall be called at the request of at least one half of its members. Notice of each special meeting shall be given to all deacons.</p>	
<p><u>Section 9.</u> The church council shall submit a comprehensive report to the congregation at the annual meeting.</p>	
<p><u>Section 10.</u> A quorum for the transaction of business shall consist of a majority of the members of the church council.</p>	
<p><u>Article IX</u> Officers</p>	
<p><u>Section 1.</u> At its first meeting in each congregational year, the church council shall elect a president, a vice-president, a secretary, a treasurer and, if desired, a financial secretary, who will serve both the council and the congregation in their several capacities.</p>	
<p><u>Section 2.</u> The president shall be chairman of the congregation and the church council. In the event of the president's inability to perform his duties the vice-president shall serve in his stead.</p>	
<p><u>Section 3.</u> The president and the vice-president shall be chosen from the</p>	

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<p>memberships of the church council. The other officers, if not members of the council, shall be accorded the privileges of voice without vote in its meetings.</p>	
<p><u>Section 4.</u> All officers shall be confirmed members of the congregation in good standing. If any of them ceases to be such, his office shall at once be declared vacant by the council, which shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.</p>	
<p><u>Section 5.</u> The secretary shall keep accurate minutes of all meetings of the congregation and of the council in a volume provided by the congregation, which shall be preserved permanently in its archives.</p>	
<p><u>Section 6.</u> The financial secretary, if such an officer is activated, shall receive and keep record of all incomes from contributing members and other sources.</p>	
<p><u>Section 7.</u> The treasurer shall keep the books of account of the congregation. He shall receive all funds and disburse them on proper orders, making monthly remittance of benevolence receipts to the treasurer of the synod.</p>	
<p><u>Section 8.</u> The treasurer and the financial secretary shall make written report of all their transactions to the church council monthly and to the congregation, together with a satisfactory audit at its annual meetings. All financial officers shall be bonded by the congregation or by special arrangements with the synod.</p>	
<p>Article IX</p> <p>Standing Committees</p>	
<p><u>Section 1.</u> At its first meeting in each congregational year, the</p>	



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<p>church council shall appoint as many standing committees as the local and wider concerns of the congregation shall require. Each such committee shall be composed of one or more members of the council and, in addition, other confirmed members of the congregation in good standing. Although appointed by and responsible to the church council, these committees shall be recognized as representative of the interests of, and performing essential services for, the congregation as a whole. The pastor shall have voice and vote in all committees.</p>	
<p><u>Section 2.</u> Except as stipulated in the following paragraphs, the duties of all committees shall be assigned by the church council, along with such instructions as in its judgment are in the best interests of the congregation. All actions of committees shall be subject to review by the council.</p>	
<p><u>Section 3.</u> There shall be a Committee on Christian Education. This committee, in association with the pastor, shall oversee the conduct and promotion of the schools and the educational activities of all organizations within the congregation. It shall encourage the use of teaching and worship materials published or approved by the Lutheran Church in America, and seek to introduce the church's periodicals and books of family devotion into the homes of the congregation. One of the primary aims of the Committee on Christian Education shall be to bring the call to the ministry of the Gospel and to other full-time church vocations to the attention of qualified youth of the congregation.</p>	
<p><u>Section 4.</u> There shall be a Committee on Church Property. This committee shall see to the proper maintenance and protection of all</p>	

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property of the congregation, and shall take care that the same is kept in good repair and is adequately insured.	
<p><u>Section 5.</u> There shall be a Committee on Evangelism. This committee shall stimulate and lead all members of the congregation in continuous and, from time to time, concerted endeavors to reawaken the spiritually indifferent and to reach others, who are as yet unwon, with the Gospel and attach them to Christ's Church. To this end, the committee shall devote itself to deepening spiritual life and shall periodically study the congregation in the context of its surrounding community.</p>	
<p><u>Section 6.</u> There shall be a Finance Committee, of which the treasurer shall be a member ex officio. It shall prepare a draft budget for the succeeding year, including this congregation's full indicated share in support of the wider ministry being carried on in its behalf by the Lutheran Church in America and the synod, and shall submit such draft budget to the church council for its action and later presentation to a congregational meeting. The committee shall exercise oversight of all the financial affairs of the congregation to make sure that they are being conducted efficiently, giving particular attention to the prompt payment of all obligations and to the regular forwarding of benevolence monies to the synodical treasurer. It shall, subject to the approval of the church council, be responsible for the congregation's investments, and shall also provide for annual audits of the accounts of the treasurer and the financial secretary, as well as of the accounts of the schools and organizations within the congregation.</p>	
<p><u>Section 7.</u> There shall be a Committee on Social Ministry. The</p>	

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<p>purpose of this committee shall be to extend Christian compassion and helpfulness to the ill, the aged, the orphaned, the underprivileged, the imprisoned and, in general, to persons of all ages in need of aid in body or soul. It shall strive to enlist in these efforts as many as possible of the individual members and organizations of the congregation. This committee shall further have the duty to study social conditions, primarily in the local community, in order to bring the cleansing and healing light of Christian truth to bear upon critical problems through thoughtful Christian discussion of facts and issues.</p>	
<p><u>Section 8.</u> There shall be a Committee on Stewardship, of which the treasurer shall be a member ex officio. It shall be the function of this committee to evoke and promote the expression of Christian faith in daily living; to teach the Christian use of money; to diffuse knowledge of the congregation's local, national and world-wide ministries; and to lead all its members to higher levels of proportionate giving for the Lord's work. This committee shall also be responsible for the annual Every Member Visit and other congregational efforts which lead to informed and grateful giving.</p>	
<p><u>Section 9.</u> There shall be a Committee on Worship and Music. It shall assist the church Council in seeing that the services of God's house are conducted regularly and in accordance with the liturgy of the Lutheran Church in America, that competent ushers are recruited and trained, and that hymnals and other devotional materials are provided and properly cared for. This committee shall supervise, and strive to advance the welfare and effective service of, the choirs of the congregation. It shall arrange for the care of paraments, vestments</p>	



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<p>and musical instruments and, in consultation with the pastor, the organist and the choir director, it shall furnish music supplies appropriate for use in the worship of a congregation of the Lutheran Church in America.</p>	
<p style="text-align: center;">Article XI</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Organizations Within the Congregation</p>	
<p>Section 1. All organizations within the congregation shall exist to aid it in ministering to its members and to all whom it can reach with the Gospel of Christ. As outgrowths and expressions of the congregation's life, the organizations are subject to its oversight and direction. The congregation at its meetings, or the church council, shall determine their policies, guide their activities and receive reports concerning their membership, work and finances.</p>	
<p>Section 2. Special interest groups, other than the congregational units of the official auxiliaries of the Lutheran Church in America, may be organized only after authorization has been given by the church council.</p>	
<p style="text-align: center;">Article XII</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Disciplines of Members</p>	
<p>Section 1. Jan 11, 1892	<p>Organization of Christ Lutheran Church. The Rev. H. E. Rommel, pastor of Concordia Lutheran Church, West Henrietta, New York, had been called as Assistant Pastor by the Norddeutsche Evangelische Lutherische Concordia Gemeinde of Rochester New York, on August 13, 1890 and was installed on October 5, 1890. It was incumbent upon Pastor Rommel, as assistant Pastor, to hold regular preaching services in Bethlehem Chapel, corner of Fourth Street and Central Park, property of the Lutherische Concordia Gemeinde, and "to perform such duties as were required by the Rev. C. N. Conrad, senior Pastor." Eventually the desire was expressed by the people worshipping in the chapel, to be permitted by the mother church to organize themselves as a congregation. This request would be granted if one hundred and fifty persons would sign such a petition. In a very short time a petition with one hundred and seventy-three signatures was forwarded to the Concordia congregation. The request, however, was "energetically refused." The outcome of this refusal was the organization of the Deutsche Evangelische Lutherische Christus Gemeinde on January 11, 1892 at a meeting held in the hall of Eugen Helber. The organization having been effected, a church council was elected consisting of Phillip Zuck, Frederick Schmidt and C. H. Rathke, elders; Christian Henkel, H. Buber, C. Chleyfeldt, Jacob Thomann, William Heins, J. Oldenberg, deacons; and H. Dummer, H. Leaten, J. Rathke, A. Henkel, C. Toack, and J. Meyer, trustees. This Council in the name of the congregation extended a call to the Rev. H. E. Rommel, who had resigned as assistant Pastor of Concordia Church.</p>
Jan 19, 1892	<p>The formal organization of the congregation was carried out by the Rev. Theodore H. Becker, President of the Fourth District Conference of the Ministerium of New York and Adjacent States and Counties, later to be called the Western Conference of the United Lutheran Synod of New York. Professor Jacob Steinhauser of Wagner College assisted in the act.</p>
Feb 21, 1892	<p>Womenverein organized February 21, 1892. Little School organized February 27, 1892 with instruction in German language.</p>
Mar 3, 1892	<p>The congregation desired to purchase the Concordia owned Bethlehem Chapel for a house of worship, but it was not for sale. It was then decided to build a new church. Two lots on the north-west corner of Fourth Street and Central Park were purchased from Mr. Treckman for \$1,800<sup>00</sup>. A building committee consisting of Phillip Zuck, Henry Dummer, Henry Leaten, Fred Rathke, Christ Henkel, Carl Toack and J. Meyer were appointed. A plan calling for a brick building with a tower one-hundred-forty feet high, not to cost more than \$15,000 was presented by the committee to the congregation, but was rejected. A second plan for a frame building, fifty-two feet wide and eighty-two feet long with two towers, one to be sixty feet high, the other less. Walter Krammide participated. Congregation presented Pastor Roeder with \$1,000 check with which to buy his first automobile.

1941	The Congregation reached the decision to call an assistant to Pastor Austin V. Roeder. At a Congregational Meeting held on July 27, 1941 a call was extended to the Rev. Alfred J. Schroeder, of Brooklyn, New York as Assistant Pastor to Rev. Austin V. Roeder. Pastor Schroeder was installed on October 5, by the Rev. Eugene L. Howell, president of the Western Conference. The sermon was preached by Pastor August V. Blumke, D.D. of St. John's, Greenpoint, Brooklyn, N.Y.
1942	Fiftieth Anniversary of the Congregation celebrated January 11th to 17th. The Rev. Dr. Samuel Trecker, President of the Synod preached at the service, Pastor Henry C. Erbes at the Children's service. The Rev. John M. Strodel at the Community Service in the evening. Pastor Herbert Bosch spoke on The Wednesday Evening Organization Night Program. At the Anniversary Banquet held at the Church Pastor George Boek of St. John's, Lancaster spoke and greetings were brought by sons of the congregation, Rev. Paul E. Arnold of Utica, N.Y. and Rev. Waldemar Liefeld, of New Douglas, Illinois. The Banquet was held, January 16th. On May 24th, A missel stand given by Frederick Carl Ratz in memory of his sister Anna Caroline Ratz was dedicated. Sept 21, 1942 the Congregation voted to make every effort to clear off the mortgage. Mr. Henry H. Neumann on Sept 27th presented one hundred new hymn books in memory of his wife, Emma A. Neumann. Women of the Congregation made up Christmas boxes for men and women in the service.
1943	Reported at Annual Congregational Meeting, Jan 11, that Mortgage had been reduced \$5,540, leaving a balance of \$10,820. The Congregation participated in its first project of Lay Evangelism, by which forty-five new members were added to the congregation at the Palm Sunday Service. May 29th the congregation at a reception celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the ordination of Pastor Austin V. Roeder with Pastor Frederick H. Kunkel, Pastor of Reformation Church as the speaker. Dr. Samuel Trecker, President of the Synod preached at the Anniversary Service May 30,

	and the Rev. Henry C. Eden spoke and special program of the Bible School. Pastor He led Prayers of Concordia Church. Buffalo spoke the evening service. First Lutheran World Action Drive for \$245 goes over the top. The Rev. Austin H. Roeder, having given forty-five years of service in Christ Church, presented his resignation as pastor of the congregation effective, Sunday, November 21st, at which time a special tribute was paid to Pastor Roeder by the congregation. The Rev. J. John Blank, President of the Western Conference was the speaker. Pastor Roeder will retire with the title of Pastor Emeritus. The Rev. Alfred J. Schaefer, Assistant to Pastor Roeder was called as Pastor of Christ Lutheran Church on October 31st. He was installed as Pastor on Sunday, December 19th, by The Rev. Howard Kuehnle, Conference President. Pastor Alfred L. Beck was the speaker.
1944	Congregation voted to continue its drive to wipe out its Mortgage at its Annual Congregational Meeting. Church Council voted to install Christ Church in United Lutheran Church Co-sponsorship. Pension Plan at the April Meeting. Memorial Service was held on Sept. 24th for Gerald C. Nettum, who died in action on July 22 at Guam. The Mortgage was reduced to about \$2,500 through the present drive. During the Month of October the outside trim of the Church and Parish House received a new coat of paint.
1945	Altar Steps, the Petal, and Altar Candelsticks given on Easter day by the Choir and Luther League in memory of Gerald Charles Nettum. The Altar Shield of Christ Lutheran Church was organized. The Death of Pastor Emeritus Austin H. Roeder on April 30 saddened the congregation. Services in his memory were held at the Church on May 3rd. According to the terms of Pastor Roeder's will his home at 359 Central Park became the property of Christ Lutheran Church for a parsonage. An investment of \$1,000 was made in government bonds to care for the upkeep of the Roeder family plot at Mt Hope Cemetery.
1946	At the Regular Congregational Meeting it was voted that German services shall be held on the first Sunday of each month on Festival Days and Communion Sundays. The Church Council authorized the use of a Parish Paper to reach all members called "the Christ Lutheran Messenger". A Banquet was held, May 24th, as a reception to the returned service men and marking the end of the II World War. Dr. William Bely, Ph.D. was the speaker. Pastors Schaefer and Davis, ex-chaplains were special guests. Lutheran World Action with greatest appeal for relief ever goes over the top in Christ Church more than \$2,000. Red Channel Vestments were given in memory of Martha Phipps by her husband, Fred Phipps and son Harold. An Electric Water Fountain was given by an unknown friend in memory of Pastor Austin H. Roeder. Pulpit Bible was dedicated in memory of Dorothy Johnson given by her Mother, Mrs. Marion Johnson and sister, Janette Johnson. Tower Music System was dedicated in memory of Gerald C. Nettum given by his Aunt, Mrs. Emma Louch, his brother, Robert Nettum and friends.
1947	Serious thought was given to the possibility of relocating Christ Church near the Laurelton Area, also congregational

	meeting held on October 8th. Another study was advised by the congregation. The Vassar Festival on Oct 12, was the occasion for the beginning of the singing of the Antiphons by the Choir. November 30, the Austin D. Roder Memorial Endowment Fund of \$1500 was Dedicated and Presented to Dr. Walter C. Langoan, President of Wagner College. This fund will provide an income which is to be awarded to a faithful, man or woman, studying for full time service in the Christian Church, and shall be awarded to a student from Christ Church Rochester in years when such are enrolled at Wagner College.
1948	Brotherhood undertook the project of washing lower Sunday School Room and refinishing the floors of the social room of the Church. After several months of intense effort, the congregation gathered the funds necessary for completely wiping out the mortgage on the Church's Property. The Mortgage was burned on December 12th with The Rev. John M. Strodel, President of the Conference, presiding the service. During the months of July and August, by order of the congregation, Mr. John Sanborn, of Philadelphia Seminary was employed by the congregation to make a survey for the congregation to discover new prospects for evangelization and the possibilities for relocation.
1949	Special Congregational Meeting on March 21st called upon the request of a group of twenty-four members of Christ Church calling themselves "Fundamental Bible Believing Lutheran Members of Christ Lutheran Church" resulted in a vote of confidence in the leadership of the Church council and, in spite of the loss of some members, increased the unity and loyalty of the congregation. Ushers Society of Christ Church is organized. April 13, Mr. Rudolph Hummel, last surviving charter member of Christ Church died at the age of ninety years. May 2nd, Pastor's Bible Hour was begun for serious study of the Bible by members of the congregation. Special Congregational Meeting held on July 10th for purpose of accepting Resignation of Pastor Alfred J. Schroder to accept a call to St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Bronx. Pastor Schroder preached his farewell sermon on Oct 9th. The heating system of the Church was improved at a cost of over \$3,000, new boiler was installed and conversion to oil heat. The last German Service in Christ Lutheran Church, by vote of the congregation, was held on Sunday, October 2nd. Pastor Schroder preached "Farewell" sermon Oct 9th.
1950	Rev. Walter Casper, pastor of Incarnation Lutheran Church, Jamaica, N.Y., accepted the call to the pastorate of Christ Church and was installed Sunday May 21, 1950. Pastor Elmer Hoppe, liturgist, Rev. Henry E. Rbes, change to pastor, Rev. Elmer Scheartel, delivered charge to congregation. A Junior Choir of eleven voices was organized; the congregation pledged \$3500.00 to Christian Higher Education Year appeal \$700 over our quota of \$2800.00.

1951	<p>The congregation authorized the council to engage professional assistance and to prepare a plan for the re-decorating and remodeling of the church. The firm of Farragher &amp; McCormick, architects were engaged to draw plans and at a later date submit same for bids. After several congregational meetings on July 10<sup>th</sup> the congregation voted 1. To paint interior of church (sanctuary, rear rooms), tower. (2) to paint exterior trim of the church and parish house (3) to sand and refinish floor of church (4) To put new frames &amp; glass in main windows and to reglaze tower windows (5) To repair and refinish the floors (6) Reel &amp; replace rose windows. (7) To remove by deduction existing balcony, installing iron rail to match new iron altar rail, (8) to paint wall radiator to blend with color scheme. Estimated cost of work was \$10,000.00. The congregation authorized the church council to accept bids for the work and to let contracts. The congregation authorized the president, Rev. Walter Loren and for Secretary Margaret Brames and Treasurer Raymond W. Olson to negotiate a mortgage against the church real estate in amount of \$12,000.00 in behalf of the congregation to obtain funds to redecorate and remodel the church. An appeal for funds to finance the redecorating and liquidate the mortgage was authorized, said appeal was to be conducted in October 1951 and seek to obtain \$15,000.00. An amount of \$4500.00 was pledged by end of year, with calls still not all completed.</p>
1952	<p>June 17<sup>th</sup>, the congregation marked the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the ordination of Pastor Walter Loren with a special service at which the Rev. David Jarheim, Assistant to the President of Synod preached.</p> <p>June 22, the pastor was selected Secretary of the revived Lutheran Mission Union of Rochester, N.Y., and took the initial step that preserved the area allocated to Christ Church for the Lutheran Church, which finally in November resulted in the acquisition of the Winter Road Congregational Church for the United Lutheran Church Extension Society of Rochester and vicinity.</p> <p>November 14<sup>th</sup> 1951 The congregation held a special service commemorating 50 years of teaching in the Sunday School for Mr. Paul Kahler, a presentation purse was presented, an album of photograph of the occasion, a group of women from his first class were present. Mr. Kahler who served almost the same length of time was honored and presented with an orend. The sudden death of Mr. Paul Kahler on August 9<sup>th</sup> 1952 called to mind that it is well to show honor and appreciation to those who have served well while they are among the living. Approximately \$150.00 from 1st teacher, individual &amp; in lieu of flowers were given as a memorial. Fall of 1952 ten men of the church began the project of painting parish house Sunday School rooms and hall. 1952	<p>Good Shepherd Lutheran Mission, Winter Road, newly organized. Junior Choir was organized among ages 10-16. Ladies Aid took on project of Kitchen painting cost approximately \$200. Nov. Ever Faithful Mission Guild sponsored Rev. Mr. Lifer, Missionary at a Thank offering service. Sunday School continued \$50.00 support of parish in India. Pastor organized "Confidential Fund" gifts totalling \$132.50 were received and distributed. 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary was observed with an Anniversary Dinner - on 1952 and an anniversary service at which Rev. Herman Miller, President of Western Conference preached the sermon.</p>
1953	<p>Jan 11, saw baptism of Ashbaugh triplets, as the church font, the first such in the history of the congregation. Work by men members in painting parish house interior completed in March. Men decided to proceed with painting of gymnasium. Congregation responded spontaneously in March-April to appeal for aid to a member Ruth Dueninger, whose mother Mrs. Caroline had been bedridden for 5 years. Without special envelopes over \$500 was contributed in two weeks. Ruth Dueninger died Easter April 5<sup>th</sup>, 1953 - her mother April 6<sup>th</sup>, 1953. Both were buried in a single service April 8<sup>th</sup> at White Haven Cemetery. In April a new roof was put on the parish house at a cost of \$1100.00 by Fleck &amp; Co., Rochester. Members were asked to raise \$1200. - in Self-Denial Envelope - of which \$500 - came in through the means.</p> <p>April 15<sup>th</sup>, the congregation was host to the Western Conference Convention at which time division of synod into ten conference was discussed. In the evening Dr. Frederick Kruebel <sup>synod</sup> President met with the church councilmen of Rochester Area.</p> <p>On March 8<sup>th</sup> a Ekotape type, Tape Recorder was dedicated to the memory of Mr. Paul Kohler from Florida in amount of \$157.00 given in lieu of flowers from friends within &amp; without the church, his Bible Class and Sunday School. A plate recording of the service was sent to Mrs. Kohler.</p> <p>April 16<sup>th</sup>, 250 Women's Missionary Society women attended Spring Inspirational Dinner. Our Ever Faithful Mission Guild and Ladies Aid served the dinner. Rev. Jekke, chaplain Riverside Teen-age Narcotic Hospital, N. Y. C. spoke. Ladies Aid purchased 5 new 30" x 8 ft tables.</p> <p>June 1953 Mr. John Hartman, organist &amp; choir director resigned after serving 14 years due to press of business. Normanly Lilk purple stole was presented by the confirmation class of 1953. A prayer bench was made from the old balcony facing boards by the pastor and presented to the church. Special Congregational meeting held December revised the constitution.</p>

1953	Marked a slight loss of communing membership, general state condition of numerical strength of congregation, an increased enrollment of neighborhood children in the Sunday school.
1954	At the congregational meeting funds of approximately \$500 <sup>00</sup> raised to aid Ruth Dueninger and unused due to her death, were voted to be designated as Dueninger Memorial Aid fund, to be used to aid members in need. The annual Thanksgiving offering be used to supplement the fund. Class of 15 enrolled for two year confirmation instruction, an encouraging number, with 3 of the senior class a junior choir of 18 were organized - which continued to sing through the year Mtg. was reduced to 4500.00.
1955	
1956	On May 13 <sup>th</sup> a Revised Standard Version Rection Bible of Red Seal Skin binding was dedicated in memory of Mrs Rosina Heinkel by her daughter Rose Ann Heinkel Gustafson at cost of \$100.00 an additional \$50.00 was given to be used at discretion of pastor In May \$500.00 legacy was received from the Estate of Williams and his wife Edna (nee Zimmerman) Schrott in appreciation of the faithful ministry of the Church to Mr Schrott in his long illness. Class of 14 confirmed - Mrs Mrs Fredrick Fricke, daughter Brigitta, and child member Hester were received. Refugees who came through Lutheran Refugee Service, sponsored by Mr Ray Doell and congregation, who provided housing, furniture, clothing for start. Council voted to use Thanksgiving and Christmas offerings for Lutheran World Action and Synodical Quota to insure 100% payment of both. June 1, Mrs May Raymond Doell and family, Mr & Mrs Harold Muller, Mr & Mrs Harold Ford were released of financial responsibility so they might put there support into Atonement, new mission Congregation to be organized in Feb 1957.
1957	Congregation co-operated with six other Lutheran Churches on a Lenten Series "The Lutheran Church Teaches" based on the Augsburg Confession, each pastor taking on theme and presenting it at the six churches, Christ Peace, St John, Transfiguration, Redeemer, Concord, Grace.

1957	April 18, Mr. Roy Bondschnieder, president of the church council was called to rest suddenly. He had been active and zealous for the work of the Lord up to time of his death. Encouraging was the fact that of ten pupils confirmed in 1956, six joined the senior choir and remain firm. Remained regular in attendance; parents of these were strong influence in this good result, plus two years training in the Junior choir. Congregation maintained its numerical strength, became debt free.
1958	<p>Congregation set July, 1958 as time to transfer half of the organ pipes to the chamber over the sacristy at a cost of \$1500.00, to replace visible set of disposition pipe with one in chamber. Congregation vote May 19<sup>th</sup> to purchase 170-180 New Lutheran Hymnals at \$3.85, 50 copies given by Ruth Bondschnieder in memory of her husband 12 copies by Mrs Emma Lauch, 7 by Freda Lepenske in memory of her husband Harold. On May 25<sup>th</sup> a gift of \$100.00 in memory of Mr. Helen Jelenberger was given by her sons, Eugene and David Jelenberger. Pastor Larson served as Vice-president of Rochester Conference and chairman of Evangelism &amp; Social Mission Committee of Conference.</p> <p>In June 200 Lutheran Hymnals and Service Books were ordered - by Memorials, Individual purchase, confirmation class, and Ladies Aid the cost was completely subscinded.</p> <p>July 20<sup>th</sup> work was begun to relocate part of organ over sacristy, a chamber 12' x 12' by 18' was constructed, completely insulated to house the pipes. George Brown, William Kattel, Clarence May, Jr., George Verdoner and son Edward Verdoner, Talbot Wilson, Robert Morris and Eugene Reng, George Eisenbraun took part in the work.</p> <p>July 7<sup>th</sup> Pastor Lowen resigned to accept a call to Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Atonement, Saugerties, N.Y. effective Sept 15, 1958. At a special congregational meeting July 27<sup>th</sup> the congregation accepted the resignation with regret and wished the pastor blessing and success in his new charge.</p>
1959 April 15, 1959	The Rev. Gustave Wedemeyer Jr. was extended a call to serve as Pastor of Christ Church.
June 31	Installation of the Rev. Gustave Wedemeyer Jr.
1963 Dec. 31	Resignation of the Rev. Gustave Wedemeyer Jr. to accept a full time position with the New York Synod.
1964 March 8	The Rev. Hubert L. Hinman of Lanesboro, Mass. was unanimously extended a call to serve as Pastor of Christ Lutheran Church.
March 39	Pastor Hinman preached his first service - Holy Thursday.
April	Old Board Room upstairs converted to church office. Walls repainted and floors refinished.
