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
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

#### PREFACE


When we note the 100 years' history of Emanuel Church, many interesting and significant data are apparent. History has its own record, yet we wish to depict certain highlights which are noteworthy. Some of the information contained in this booklet has been edited from previous anniversary records.

The purpose of this booklet is not merely to record a challenging presentation of past history but also to inspire us to a more intensive effort in behalf of the program of our Church in the practices of worship, faith, fellowship, and prayer.

May God grant us wisdom, patience, humility, and courage to labor faithfully for the upbuilding of His Kingdom in our midst.

# HISTORICAL SKETCH EMANUEL EVANGELICAL REFORMED CHURCH 1852-1952

Emanuel actually began four years prior to its organization as a Reformed congregation. A number of dissenters from the Roman Catholic Church sent out an appeal for a Protestant clergyman in 1848 to administer to their spiritual needs. The small congregation met at several locations in the present downtown. A building was erected on Cherry Street and the first service held in the new church on May 29, 1851. During the first four years Pastors Giustiniani, Bogan, Winklemann, and Wier served the feeble but loyal congregation.

REV. ROBERT KOEHLER: 1852-1854

The congregation was organized under the name Emanuel German Evangelical Reformed Church March 24, 1852. The congregation received excellent inspiration to strengthen their faith and to grow in numbers.

REV. M. J. H. STERN: 1854

Emanuel was received into West New York Classis.

#### REV. SCHROEDER: 1854-1856

The congregation was incorporated under the name Evangelical Reformed Church.

#### REV. GROSSHUESCH: 1857-1864

A new parsonage was built and a new constitution adopted. The Ladies Aid was organized. Every member was present at a congregational meeting.

#### REV. BRASCH: 1864-1866

First salaried janitor and organist were hired. Location for a new church more central for the congregation was discussed.

#### REV. CLUDIUS: 1867-1869

A new church was built on the present site which was nearer to most members.

#### REV. C. KUSS: 1869-1874

The constitution was revised, parochial school started, an organ purchased, Choir and Concordia Society organized. German hymnals were introduced.

#### REV. HEISER: 1874-1878

Men's Choir and Young Ladies Society organized. An addition was built on the church school.

#### REV. CARL GUNDLACH: 1878-1898

During this pastorate the Women's Missionary and the Junior and Senior Christian Endeavor Societies were started. A debt of about \$3,600 was cleared. The parsonage was enlarged. A new church consisting of the present sanctuary and some of the church school was erected. A new church debt of \$3,400 was assumed.

#### REV. H. E. SCHNATZ: 1898-1903

Under Rev. Schnatz there was a considerable increase in the membership of both Church and Sunday School. A bell was installed in the tower. January 1, 1902, the first issue of the present Messinger was distributed.

#### REV. C. A. HAUSER, D.D., Ph.D.: 1903-1911

A new church school building was erected and an electric motor for the organ installed. Duplex envelopes introduced. The parsonage was renovated. The Cradle Roll and Home Departments commenced. The October, 1904, Messinger was the first German-English edition published.

#### REV. J. M. G. DARMS, D.D.: 1911-1914

During this pastorate, electric lights were installed in the church and individual communion cups used. The 60th Anniversary was celebrated with three former pastors participating. The church debt was materially reduced and a new organ dedicated. Onesimus Club and Willing Workers organized. As some indication of the widening scope of the Reformed Church, the Dewey Avenue Reformed Church with Rev. Clark as first pastor organized.

#### REV. L. D. BENNER: 1914-1916

This pastorate was short as Rev. Benner accepted a position as Field Secretary of the Mission House in Plymouth, Wisconsin.

#### REV. D. A. BODE: 1916-1925

The New Reformed Church Hymnal was introduced, church redecorated, organ completely electrified, and two new pianos purchased. Boy Scouts and Daily Vacation Bible School started. Chimes were added to the organ by the children of one of the church families in memory of their parents. At the close of this pastorate, the congregation voted that subsequent services be conducted in English.

#### REV. F. H. DIEHM, D.D.: 1925-1945

The choir began wearing robes. Four ladies of the church gave a harp stop to the organ. The Evangelical and the Reformed Churches merged. The Junior Willing Workers were organized. The sanctuary was redecorated, new lights installed, and the church debt cleared.

#### REV. O. C. NUSSMANN: 1945-1951

A major renovation program was instituted and resulted in the relocation of the choir loft and organ. This renovation included redecorating Sunday School rooms, basement rooms, and the Sanctuary.

#### REV. H. RAYMOND VOSS: 1951-

Our present pastor has introduced a major program of religious education for both Church School and home. He is also seeking to revitalize and strengthen both the spiritual and organizational life of the parish through a program of Christian evangelism.

Emanuel is proud of the various organizations and their records of good fellowship and service in the Lord's work. There is at least one organization for every member of the church and a welcome is always extended to any prospective members.

#### THE CHURCH SCHOOL

It has ever been the Church's faith through the centuries that God has revealed Himself in history through the prophets, through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, and through His apostles. Furthermore, it is the Church's faith that God continues to reveal Himself to men today through the witness of a Church that dares to live in the fellowship of the prophets, apostles and Jesus Christ. The task of Christian Education, therefore, for both Church and Home, is that of acting as an agent for communicating God's revelation of love and redemption so that it reaches out and touches the hearts and lives of the Church's children, youth and adults.

But the Church, it must be remembered, is forever the living Body of Christ. Christ died for the Church and through it He continues to pour out His Spirit unto all mankind. Its members, therefore, are bound together in the bonds of mutual concern and love. As such membership in Christ's Body carries with it the obligations of discipleship and those obligations require that each member give himself with complete abandon to God for the loyal and devoted support

of his church in fellowship, worship, financial aid and the program of Christian education for himself and others.

Viewed in these terms, then, Christian education, as one of the most important parts of the Church's witness, is not the exclusive work or function of professionally employed workers in the Church or of those who work and teach in the Church School. It is the function of the individual member and the whole Church. This can only mean, for us at Emanuel Church, that every member, young and old, married or single, male and female, as a member of the Church, ought to belong to and actively and regularly participate in a church school class and the program of Christian education.

The new curriculum for our Church School and the homes of Emanuel's people was adopted by the Board of Christian Education and Publication of the Evangelical and Reformed Church a number of years ago. This curriculum has three great themes: THE BIBLE, THE CHURCH, and, THE LIFE OF CHRIST. It is the prescribed duty of our Board, as "The Constitution and By-Laws of the Evangelical and Reformed Church" states, "to develop, promote, and direct a comprehensive and unified program of Christian Education in accord with the doctrinal positions and policy of the E&R Church as determined by the General Synod. It shall assist congregations in making that

Emanuel is proud of its two choirs. At the present time, the Juniors rehearse on Thursday afternoons and the Seniors on Friday evenings.

The Junior Choir was organized on September 7, 1928, and has continued to meet regularly since that time. This group has its own special music which it sings at frequent intervals both within the church and without. The enthusiasm of the Junior Choir is a real inspiration to continue and expand the musical phase of the worship service.

The Senior Choir was organized in 1869 and has faithfully rendered its own special numbers each Sunday to beautify the service. The Senior Choir has also received enthusiastic praise and thanks after singing before outside

groups. On various occasions the choirs sing in combination.

It is our desire, through the singing of the choirs, to assist in creating a devotional atmosphere whether we lead the congregation in singing or render anthems, solos, duets, or special arrangements. We trust that our singing will always help to express with and for the congregation the feelings of prayer and praise. May we continue to render this service to the glory of God and His Son, the Christ.

### A FORWARD LOOK FOR OUR CHURCH

Today we at Emanuel Church stand at the threshold of a great venture, and that venture is none other than "seeking first the Kingdom of God" and establishing that kingdom in our lives. But such a venture requires faith and courage: faith in God and in one's fellow man; and courage to labor together humbly and unselfishly as servants of the Most High God. But more than anything else, our venture calls for a people dedicated and consecrated in their whole lives to their Lord and Master Jesus Christ.

Dr. John MacKay, President of Princeton Seminary, Princeton, New Jersey, wisely states that in order for a people to have a "forward look" they need first "to cultivate the habit of retrospection." We must learn "to look back if we are to succeed in moving forward." It is not presumptious to state that from Emanuel's pastoral and congregational activities of past history may be found something vital and interesting along this line. For example, our past contains records of glorious accomplishments for Christ and His Kingdom when Pastor and People labored together humbly, faithfully and unselfishly. At the same time, it also contains some serious danger signals where there was a lack of harmonious understanding, appreciation, conscious concern, and unity tor a concerted effort to advance the Kingdom of God in His Church.

Emanuel Church lives today amid one of the most violent, world-shaking crises in human history. But while these are dangerous times in which to live, it is also a time of unparalleled opportunity for the Church. Now as never before, men's hearts fail them and their souls tremble with fear. It is in such a time as this that the Christian faith and the fellowship of Christ's Church may have real significance for men and become a source of personal power in their lives.

But it we of Emanuel are to be a church with a future, we must learn to discipline our individual and congregational—and also our organizational—life and activities toward greater participation in the total program of our church. This program may be described in terms of: Christian worship, Christian education, Evangelism and stewardship. Such a program, to be effective and successful, must warrant the attention and participation of every member, which simply means that every member must make fullest use of his church membership by regular attendance at our worship services, by joining in our program of Christian education in the church school, by affiliating himself with the organizational life of our Women's Guild, a Churchman's Brotherhood and the Youth Fellowship. The church with a "forward look" is the fellowship of people who know that they are bound together in Christ and that all their activities must be resolved in that spirit.

The worship services of Emanuel Church are so constituted as to include every family and every member. We must learn to worship regularly, not merely as individuals but as a Christian family. Each Sunday, worshipping before God's high altar, we should resolve and pledge anew our loyalty to Him Who is Lord of Life. Only sickness or absence from home should keep

us away.

Another aspect of our common Christian witness lies in the program of Christian education. Here our Evangelical and Reformed Church has adopted a new curriculum with a three-fold theme for both Church and Home: THE BIBLE, THE CHURCH, and THE LIFE OF CHRIST. The very purpose in mind by our Board of Christian Education and Publication was to tie together more closely the church and every home and to make them power houses in

The Reverend H. Raymond Voss. Pastor of Emanuel Church, was born on October 29, 1918, in Rochester. New York. After attending the Pardee Rural Free School in Irondequoit, New York, which later became Laurelton School, he attended and was graduated from Webster High School, Webster, New York. Upon graduation he attended Elmhurst College, Elmhurst, Illinois, where he received the Bachelor of Arts degree. The Bachelor of Divinity degree was conferred upon him upon graduation from Eden Theological Seminary, Webster Groves, Missouri, Rev. Voss was married to Miss Elizabeth R. Foster, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J. B. Foster of Webster, New York, on June 10, 1944, Mrs. Voss is a graduate of Webster High School and Cornell University. They have two children, Peter Raymond and Karen

Upon graduation from seminary, Rev. Voss entered the United States Naval Chaplaincy and served aboard the U.S.S. Navarro in the Pacific Theatre during World War II.

Before coming to Rochester, Rev. Voss served two other pastorates: first, St. Matthew's Church, Evansville, Indiana; the second, Saron Church, Linton, Indiana.

program a vital part of congregational life and work."

As a member of the Evangelical and Reformed Church, it is therefore our solemn Christian duty to so utilize the materials which our Board of Christian Education and Publication provides that we shall strengthen the Gospel of Jesus Christ in every life and thus extend the bounds of the Kingdom of God. It is in the lives of the Church's people that the real Church of tomorrow must be built. As parents, teachers, officers of the Church School and as members of the auxiliary organizations of the Church, we must contemplate seriously our responsibility to produce full-fledged adult Christians at some later date. God reveals himself to children, youth and adults at various stages of their development, and the call to discipleship is not contingent upon a person's reaching a certain age. For Emanuel Church, therefore, to be a living Church, she must be a teaching Church, and periods of instruction are necessary. In this task and program we all have a share and a responsibility.

No one can do the job alone. "In unity there is strength." And as Jesus Himself said, "A house divided against itself cannot stand." Matthew 12:25; Mark 3.25.

Finally, as your Pastor, let me remind you that our Church Constitution defines a contributing member as "one who contributes to the financial support of the Church in accordance with the manner in which God has prospered him and by the dictates of his own conscience." Today the need for financial support of Christ's work in the church is great. As members we must learn well the meaning of the stewardship of life and its gifts, and we must adjust our giving habits so as to carry on effectively the total program of the Church.

Your Pastor and Consistory know that the program of our Church is extensive. But we also know the rewards which come to every Christian heart and mind and life excited by the appeals and demands for greater service and witness for Christ and for His Kingdom. The character of human life comes only as a result of an accumulation of choices. The choice to know and to serve the Lord Jesus Christ and His Church is before us.
