## PREFACE.

THE object of this manual is, to furnish our Pastors with a Pocket Diary, Visiting Book, and Church Directory in one volume. It is so arranged that it may answer their purpose two years if necessary. Hence we have omitted the unit in the figures representing the year except in the Calendar. Those who wish to use the book more than two years can do so by pasting in a new Calendar. We have also omitted the letters from the Diary indicating the day of the week, for the same reason. Thus the preachers have, in small compass, the information which they need in acting as agents for books and periodicals, and the benevolent societies of the Church.

It is not presumed that the book will please every one. Some will regret that we did not insert *this*, and others that we omitted *that*. But it must be remembered that the work is designed to be carried in the pocket always and everywhere, and if made to embrace too much it would be too large, and so complex as not fully to answer the purpose contemplated.

The blanks left for an index can be filled so as readily to find any memorandum that may be made.

**Agents.**—All the traveling ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church who are in full connection are regularly authorized agents of the Methodist Book Concern. Preachers on trial in the Conferences, and local preachers employed to fill vacant appointments, who act as agents for periodicals and purchase of books, are requested to forward the cash with their orders, or if they wish an account opened, to send a recommendation from the Presiding Elder of the District. A little reflection will show the propriety of this, as the brethren referred to are generally entire strangers to the Book Agents. Presiding Elders will please furnish a list of those they feel willing to recommend at an early period after the session of their Conference.

**Discounts to Preachers.**—On *General Catalogue Books* not prefixed by a \* we allow 30 per cent. for cash, and 20 per cent. on time. *Bibles*, 20 per cent. for cash, and 12½ per cent. on time. *Books on Sale* from other publishers, from net to 20 per cent. for cash, and from net to 10 per cent. on time. *Sunday-school Books for Libraries*, including those in General Catalogue prefixed by a \*, 20 per cent. for cash, and 15 per cent. on time. *Sunday-school Requisites*, including Questions, Cards, etc., etc., net prices.

**Cash and Credit.**—The cash discount above offered will be allowed of bills on books paid within *ninety* days of their date. Books purchased on time must be paid for in six months, or, at farthest, at the next session of the Annual Conference to which the purchaser belongs.

**Risk and Freight.**—The Concern assumes the risk of all shipments of books and pays the freight by transportation lines (not by express) where bills amount to \$50 or more. Shipments of less than \$50 are at the risk of the purchasers, who also pay the freight.

ORGANIZATION.—The Church Extension Society was organized by direction of the General Conference of 1864, and was incorporated by the Legislature of Pennsylvania, March 13, 1865. On recommendation of the Board of Managers, the Constitution was revised and more closely identified with the economy of the Church by the General Conference of 1872, which also inserted an important section in relation to the Society in the Discipline of the Church. The Society was organized in November, 1866, its object being to promote the mental and religious improvement of the freedmen of the South. During the ensuing seven years it received and expended over \$430,000.

The Trustees are elected by and are amenable to the General Conference. The Board has power to receive, hold, and administer on any property by gift, devise, or otherwise confided to it, in behoof of and for the benefit of the M. E. Church. It is also competent to receive and administer on any special benevolent trust not otherwise provided for in the other benevolent societies of the M. E. Church.

## BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE M. E. CHURCH.

THIS Board (consisting of six ministers and six laymen) was organized by the General Conference of 1868. By direction of the General Conference the charter (not then secured) empowers the Board "to receive, hold, and convey real and personal estate, and to receive and administer bequests and trusts of every kind relating to education, under such regulations as the General Conference shall from time to time prescribe." It is made the duty of the Board "to receive and securely invest the principal of the Centenary Educational Fund, and to appropriate the interest only from time to time. (1) to aid young men preparing for the foreign missionary work of the M. E. Church; (2) to aid young men preparing for the ministry of the Church; (3) to aid our Theological Institutions; (4) to aid our Universities, Seminaries, and Academies. The same Board is to "receive and separately invest" and "augment the Sunday-School Children's Fund commenced during the Centenary year, appropriating the interest only to assist meritorious Sunday-school scholars in obtaining a more advanced education." *Trustees—Ministers:* Thomas Bowman, John W. Lindsay, of the New England Conference; Daniel P. Kidder, of the New Jersey Conference; Charles A. Holmes, of the Pittsburgh Conference; and E. Q. Fuller, of the Georgia Conference. *Laymen:* John Elliott, of New York; Oliver Hoyt, of Connecticut; Charles C. North, of Sing Sing, New York; James Harlan, of Mount Pleasant, Iowa; William Claffin, of Boston, Mass.; and Francis H. Root, of Buffalo, New York.

## BAPTISM OF INFANTS.

## THE MINISTRATION OF BAPTISM TO INFANTS.

*The Minister, coming to the Font, which is to be filled with pure Water, shall use the following:*

DEARLY BELOVED; Forasmuch as all men are conceived and born in sin, and that our Saviour Christ saith, Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit he cannot enter into the kingdom of God; I beseech you to call upon God the Father, through our Lord Jesus Christ, that having, of his bounteous mercy, redeemed *this child* by the blood of his Son, he will grant that *he*, being baptized with water, may also be baptized with the Holy Ghost, be received into Christ's holy Church, and become *a lively member* of the same.

*Then shall the Minister say,*

Let us pray.

Almighty and everlasting God, who of thy great mercy hast condescended to enter into covenant relations with man, wherein thou hast included children as partakers of its gracious benefits, declaring that of such is thy kingdom: and in thy ancient Church didst appoint divers baptisms, figuring thereby the renewing of the Holy Ghost; and by thy well-beloved Son Jesus Christ gavest commandment to thy holy Apostles to go into all the world and disciple all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: We beseech thee, that of thine infinite mercy thou wilt look upon *this child*: wash *him* and sanctify *him*; that *he*, being saved by thy grace, may be received into Christ's holy Church, and being steadfast in faith, joyful through hope, and rooted in love, may so overcome the evils of this present world, that finally *he* may attain to everlasting life, and reign with thee, world without end, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

## BAPTISM OF INFANTS.

O merciful God, grant that all carnal affections may die in *him*, and that all things belonging to the Spirit may live and grow in *him*. *Amen*.

Grant that *he* may have power and strength to have victory, and to triumph against the devil, the world, and the flesh. *Amen*.

Grant that whosoever is dedicated to thee by our office and ministry may also be endued with heavenly virtues, and everlastingly rewarded through thy mercy, O blessed Lord God, who dost live, and govern all things, world without end. *Amen*.

Almighty, ever-living God, whose most dearly beloved Son Jesus Christ, for the forgiveness of our sins, did shed out of his most precious side both water and blood, regard, we beseech thee, our supplications. Sanctify this water for this holy sacrament; and grant that *this child*, now to be baptized, may receive the fullness of thy grace, and ever remain in the number of thy faithful and elect children, through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

*Then shall the Minister address the Parents [or Guardians] as follows:*

Dearly beloved; Forasmuch as *this child* is now presented by you for Christian baptism, *you* must remember that it is your part and duty to see that *he* be taught, as soon as *he* shall be able to learn, the nature and end of this holy sacrament. And that *he* may know these things the better, *you* shall call upon *him* to give reverent attendance upon the appointed means of grace, such as the ministry of the word and the public and private worship of God; and further, ye shall provide that *he* shall read the Holy Scriptures, and learn the Lord's Prayer, the Ten Commandments, the Apostles' Creed, the Catechism, and all other things which a Christian ought to know and believe to *his* soul's health, in order that *he* may be brought

up to lead a virtuous and holy life, remembering always that baptism doth represent unto us that inward purity which disposeth us to follow the example of our Saviour Christ; that as he died and rose again for us, so should we, who are baptized, die unto sin and rise again unto righteousness, continually mortifying all corrupt affections, and daily proceeding in all virtue and godliness.

Do *you* therefore solemnly engage to fulfill these duties, so far as in you lies, the Lord being your helper?

*Ans.* We do.

*Then shall the people stand up, and the Minister shall say:*

Hear the words of the Gospel, written by St. Mark. [Chap. x, 13-16.]

They brought young children to Christ, that he should touch them. And his disciples rebuked those that brought them. But when Jesus saw it, he was much displeased, and said unto them, Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of God. Verily I say unto you, Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein. And he took them up in his arms, put his hands upon them, and blessed them.

*Then the Minister shall take the Child into his hands, and say to the friends of the Child,*

Name this child.

*And then, naming it after them, he shall sprinkle or pour Water upon it, or, if desired, immerse it in Water, saying,*

*N.*, I baptize thee in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. *Amen*.

*Then shall the Minister offer the following prayer, the people kneeling:*

O God of infinite mercy, the Father of all the faithful seed, be pleased to grant unto this child an understanding



mind and a sanctified heart. May thy providence lead him through the dangers, temptations, and ignorance of his youth, that he may never run into folly nor into the evils of an unbridled appetite. We pray thee so to order the course of his life, that by good education, by holy examples, and by thy restraining and renewing grace, he may be led to serve thee faithfully all his days, so that, when he has glorified thee in his generation, and has served the Church on earth, he may be received into thine eternal kingdom, through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

Almighty and most merciful Father, let thy loving mercy and compassion descend upon these, thy servant and handmaid, the parents [or guardians] of this child. Grant unto them, we beseech thee, thy holy Spirit, that they may, like Abraham, command their household to keep the way of the Lord. Direct their actions and sanctify their hearts, words, and purposes, that their whole family may be united to our Lord Jesus Christ in the bands of faith, obedience, and charity; and that they all, being in this life thy holy children by adoption and grace, may be admitted into the Church of the first-born in heaven, through the merits of thy dear Son, our Saviour and Redeemer. *Amen.*

*Then may the Minister offer extemporary prayer.*

*Then shall be said, all kneeling:*

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive them that trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil; for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. *Amen.*

## FORM OF SOLEMNIZATION OF MATRIMONY.

[The parts in brackets throughout may be used or not, at discretion.]

*At the day and time appointed for solemnization of matrimony, the persons to be married—having been qualified according to law—standing together, the man on the right hand, and the woman on the left, the minister shall say:*

DEARLY BELOVED, we are gathered together here in the sight of God, and in the presence of these witnesses, to join together this man and this woman in holy matrimony; which is an honorable estate, instituted of God in the time of man's innocency, signifying unto us the mystical union that is between Christ and his Church; which holy estate Christ adorned and beautified with His presence, and first miracle that he wrought, in Cana of Galilee, and is commended of St. Paul to be honorable among all men; and therefore is not by any to be entered into unadvisedly, but reverently, discreetly, and in the fear of God.

Into which holy estate these two persons present come now to be joined. Therefore if any can show just cause why they may not lawfully be joined together, let him now speak, or else hereafter forever hold his peace.

[And also speaking unto the persons that are to be married, he shall say:

I require and charge you both, that if either of you know any impediment why you may not be lawfully joined together in matrimony, you do now confess it; for be ye well assured, that so many as are coupled together otherwise than God's word doth allow, are not joined together by God, neither is their matrimony lawful.]



## MATRIMONY.

*If no impediment be alleged, then shall the minister say unto the man,*

*M., wilt thou have this woman to be thy wedded wife, to live together after God's ordinance in the holy estate of matrimony? Wilt thou love her, comfort her, honor, and keep her, in sickness and in health: and forsaking all other, keep thee only unto her, so long as ye both shall live?*

*The man shall answer,*

*I will.*

*Then shall the minister say unto the woman,*

*N., wilt thou have this man to be thy wedded husband, to live together after God's ordinance in the holy estate of matrimony? Wilt thou love, honor, and keep him, in sickness and in health: and forsaking all other, keep thee only unto him, so long as ye both shall live?*

*The woman shall answer,*

*I will.*

*[Then the minister shall cause the man with his right hand to take the woman by her right hand, and to say after him as followeth:]*

*I, M., take thee, N., to be my wedded wife, to have and to hold, from this day forward, for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part, according to God's holy ordinance: and thereto I plight thee my faith.*

*Then shall they loose their hands, and the woman with her right hand taking the man by his right hand, shall likewise say after the minister:*

*I, N., take thee, M., to be my wedded husband, to have and to hold, from this day forward, for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part, according to God's holy ordinance; and thereto I plight thee my faith.]*

## MATRIMONY.

*Then shall the minister say:*

O eternal God, Creator and Preserver of all mankind, Giver of all spiritual grace, the Author of everlasting life; send thy blessing upon these thy servants, this man and this woman; whom we bless in thy name; that as Isaac and Rebecca lived faithfully together, so these persons may surely perform and keep the vow and covenant between them made, and may ever remain in perfect love and peace together, and live according to thy laws, through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

*[If the parties desire it, the man shall here hand a ring to the minister, who shall return it to him, and direct him to place it on the third finger of the woman's left hand. And the man shall say to the woman, repeating after the minister,*

*With this ring I thee wed, and with my worldly goods I thee endow, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.]*

*Then shall the minister join their right hands together, and say:*

Forasmuch as M. and N. have consented together in holy wedlock, and have witnessed the same before God and this company, and thereto have pledged their faith either to other, and have declared the same by joining of hands; I pronounce that they are husband and wife together, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Those whom God hath joined together, let no man put asunder. *Amen.*

*And the minister shall add this blessing:*

God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, bless, preserve, and keep you; the Lord mercifully with His favor look upon you, and so fill you with all spiritual benediction and grace, that ye may so live together in this

life, that in the world to come ye may have life everlasting. *Amen.*

*Then shall the minister offer the following prayer :*

O God of Abraham, God of Isaac, God of Jacob, bless this man and this woman, and sow the seed of eternal life in their hearts, that whatsoever in thy holy word they shall profitably learn, they may indeed fulfill the same. Look, O Lord, mercifully on them from heaven, and bless them : as thou didst send thy blessings upon Abraham and Sarah, to their great comfort, so vouchsafe to send thy blessings upon this man and this woman, that they, obeying thy will, and always being in safety under thy protection, may abide in thy love unto their lives' end, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Almighty God, who at the beginning didst create our first parents, Adam and Eve, and didst sanctify and join them together in marriage, pour upon these persons the riches of Thy grace, sanctify and bless them, that they may please Thee both in body and soul, and live together in holy love unto their lives' end. *Amen.*

*Here the minister may use extemporary prayer.*

*Then the minister shall say,*

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread ; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive them that trespass against us ; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil ; for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. *Amen.*

### SCRIPTURE LESSONS.

#### FOUNDATIONS FOR HOPE.

For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world ; but that the world through him might be saved. John iii, 17.

The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness ; but is long-suffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance. 2 Pet. iii, 9.

Therefore, O thou son of man, speak unto the house of Israel ; Thus ye speak, saying, If our transgressions and our sins be upon us, and we pine away in them, how should we then live ? Say unto them, As I live, saith the Lord God, I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked ; but that the wicked turn from his way and live : turn ye, turn ye from your evil ways ; for why will ye die, O house of Israel ? Ezek. xxxiii, 10, 11.

He that spared not his own Son, but delivered him up for us all, how shall he not with him also freely give us all things ? Rom. viii, 32.

But we see Jesus, who was made a little lower than the angels for the suffering of death, crowned with glory and honor ; that he by the grace of God should taste death for every man. Heb. ii, 9.

Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me ; for I am meek and lowly in heart : and ye shall find rest unto your souls. Matt. xi, 28, 29.

Look unto me, and be ye saved, all the ends of the earth : for I am God, and there is none else. Isa. xlv, 22.

And the Spirit and the bride say, Come. And let him that heareth say, Come. And let him that is athirst come. And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely. Rev. xxii, 17.

Him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out. John vi, 37.

He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy. Prov. xxviii, 13.

## TERMS OF SALVATION.

If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation. For the Scripture saith, Whosoever believeth on him shall not be ashamed. For there is no difference between the Jew and the Greek: for the same Lord over all is rich unto all that call upon him. For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. Rom. x, 9-13.

Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost. Titus iii, 5.

Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you: but rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings; that, when his glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy. 1 Pet. iv, 12, 13.

For the Lord will not cast off forever: but though he cause grief, yet will he have compassion according to the multitude of his mercies. For he doth not afflict willingly, nor grieve the children of men. Lam. iii, 31-33.

It is good for me that I have been afflicted; that I might learn thy statutes. Psal. cxix, 71.

Before I was afflicted I went astray: but now have I kept thy word. Psal. cxix, 67.



## APPROPRIATE TO THE DYING SAINT.

Fear thou not; for I am with thee: be not dismayed; for I am thy God: I will strengthen thee; yea, I will help thee; yea, I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness. Isa. xli, 10.

Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints. Psal. cxvi, 15.

He hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee. Heb. xiii, 5.

Cast thy burden upon the Lord, and he shall sustain thee. Psal. lv, 22.

Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me. Psal. xxiii, 4.

Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on thee: because he trusteth in thee. Isa. xxvi, 3.

And the Lord, he it is that doth go before thee; he will be with thee, he will not fail thee, neither forsake thee: fear not, neither be dismayed. Deut. xxxi, 8.

And I heard a voice from heaven saying unto me, Write, Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors, and their works do follow them. Rev. xiv, 13.

Marvel not at this: for the hour is coming, in the which all that are in the graves shall hear his voice, and shall come forth: they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation. John v, 28, 29.

Jesus said unto her, I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die. John xi, 25, 26.

Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright; for the end of that man is peace. Psal. xxxvii, 37.

My flesh and my heart faileth: but God is the strength of my heart, and my portion forever. Psal. lxxiii, 26.

The wicked is driven away in his wickedness: but the righteous hath hope in his death. Prov. xiv, 32.

For whether we live, we live unto the Lord; and whether we die, we die unto the Lord: whether we live therefore, or die, we are the Lord's. Rom. xiv, 8.

O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory? . . . Thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. 1 Cor. xv, 55, 57.

I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed unto him against that day. 2 Tim. i, 12.

As the children are partakers of flesh and blood, he also himself likewise took part of the same; that through death he might . . . deliver them, who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage. Heb. ii, 14, 15.

O death, I will be thy plagues; O grave, I will be thy destruction. Hosca xiii, 14.

He will swallow up death in victory. Isa. xxv, 8.

Let me die the death of the righteous, and let my last end be like his. Num. xxiii, 10.

And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away. Rev. xxi, 4.

And there shall be no night there; and they need no candle, neither light of the sun; for the Lord God giveth them light: and they shall reign for ever and ever. Rev. xxii, 5.

Is there not an appointed time to man upon earth? are not his days also like the days of a hireling? Job vii, 1.

For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain. Phil. i, 21.

For I am in a strait betwixt two, having a desire to depart, and to be with Christ; which is far better. Phil. i, 23.

I would not live always. Job vii, 16.

Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me. Psa. xxiii, 4.

There the wicked cease from troubling; and there the weary be at rest. Job iii, 17.

If a man die, shall he live again? Job xiv, 14.

For I know that my Redeemer liveth, and that he shall stand at the latter day upon the earth. Job xix, 25.

Now that the dead are raised, even Moses showed at the bush, when he calleth the Lord the God of Abraham, and the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. Luke xx, 37.

For this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality. 1 Cor. xv, 53.

Jesus said unto her, I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live. John xi, 25.

So when this corruptible shall have put on incorruption, and this mortal shall have put on immortality, then shall be brought to pass the saying that is written, Death is swallowed up in victory. 1 Cor. xv, 54.

For we know that, if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens. 2 Cor. v, 7.

And God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away. Rev. xxi, 4.

And there shall be no night there; and they need no candle, neither light of the sun; for the Lord God giveth them light: and they shall reign forever and ever. Rev. xxii, 5.

And though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God: Job xix, 26.

Whom I shall see for myself, and mine eyes shall behold, and not another; though my reins be consumed within me. Job xix, 27.

For he is not a God of the dead, but of the living. Luke xx, 38.

And whosoever liveth, and believeth in me, shall never die. John xi, 26.

O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory? 1 Cor. xv, 55.

The sting of death is sin; and the strength of sin is the law. 1 Cor. xv, 56.

But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory, through our Lord Jesus Christ. 1 Cor. xv, 57.

We are confident, I say, and willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord. 2 Cor. v, 8.

## SCRIPTURE LESSONS.

WHEREFORE, as by one man sin entered into the world, and death by sin; and so death passed upon all men, for that all have sinned. Rom. v, 12.

What man is he that liveth, and shall not see death? shall he deliver his soul from the hand of the grave? Psa. lxxxix, 48.

For dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return. Gen. iii, 19.

Your fathers, where are they? and the prophets, do they live forever? Zech. i, 5.

When a few years are come, then I shall go the way whence I shall not return. Job xvi, 22.

For I know that thou wilt bring me to death, and to the house appointed for all living. Job xxx, 23.

There is no man that hath power over the spirit to retain the spirit; neither hath he power in the day of death: and there is no discharge in that war; neither shall wickedness deliver those that are given to it. Ecc. viii, 8.

The days of our years are threescore years and ten; and if by reason of strength they be fourscore years, yet is their strength labor and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away. Psa. xc, 10.

For he knoweth our frame; he remembereth that we are dust. Psa. ciii, 14.

As for man, his days are as grass: as a flower of the field, so he flourisheth. Psa. ciii, 15.

For the wind passeth over it, and it is gone; and the place thereof shall know it no more. Psa. ciii, 16.

Man that is born of a woman is of few days, and full of trouble. Job xiv, 1.

He cometh forth like a flower, and is cut down: he fleeth also as a shadow, and continueth not. Job xiv, 2.

Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was: and the spirit shall return unto God who gave it. Ecc. xii, 7.

Watch therefore; for ye know neither the day nor the hour wherein the Son of man cometh. Matt. xxv, 13.

Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might; for there is no work, nor device, nor knowledge, nor wisdom, in the grave, whither thou goest. Ecc. ix, 10.

Let your loins be girded about, and your lights burning; Luke xii, 35.

And ye yourselves like unto men that wait for their lord, when he will return from the wedding; that, when he cometh and knocketh, they may open unto him immediately. Luke xii, 36.

Blessed are those servants, whom the lord when he cometh shall find watching. Luke xii, 37.

For we must all appear before the judgment-seat of Christ. 2 Cor. v, 10.

## SCRIPTURE LESSONS.

BUT when David saw that his servants whispered, David perceived that the child was dead: therefore David said unto his servants, Is the child dead? And they said, He is dead. 2 Sam. xii, 19.

Then said his servants unto him, What thing is this that thou hast done? thou didst fast and weep for the child, while it was alive; but when the child was dead, thou didst rise and eat bread. 2 Sam. xii, 21.



And he said, While the child was yet alive, I fasted, and wept: for I said, Who can tell whether God will be gracious to me, that the child may live? 2 Sam. xii, 22.

But now he is dead, wherefore should I fast? can I bring him back again? I shall go to him, but he shall not return to me. 2 Sam. xii, 23.

And they brought young children to him, that he should touch them; and his disciples rebuked those that brought them. Mark x, 13.

But when Jesus saw it, he was much displeased, and said unto them, Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not; for of such is the kingdom of God. Mark x, 14.

Verily I say unto you, Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein. Mark x, 15.

And he took them up in his arms, put his hands upon them, and blessed them. Mark x, 16.

And he took a child, and set him in the midst of them: and when he had taken him in his arms, he said unto them, Mark ix, 36.

Whosoever shall receive one of such children in my name, receiveth me; and whosoever shall receive me, receiveth not me, but him that sent me. Mark ix, 37.

And they brought unto him also infants, that he would touch them: but when his disciples saw it, they rebuked them. Luke xviii, 15.

But Jesus called them unto him, and said, Suffer little children to come unto me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of God. Luke xviii, 16.

Verily, I say unto you, Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, shall in no wise enter therein. Luke xviii, 17.

## ORDER FOR THE BURIAL OF THE DEAD.

*The minister, going before the corpse, shall say:*

I AM the resurrection and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth, and believeth in me, shall never die. [John xi, 25, 26.]

I know that my Redeemer liveth, and that He shall stand at the latter day upon the earth; and though, after my skin, worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God, whom I shall see for myself, and mine eyes shall behold, and not another. [Job xix, 25-27.]

We brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out. The Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away: blessed be the name of the Lord. [1 Tim. vi, 7; Job i, 21.]

*At the grave, when the corpse is laid in the earth, the minister shall say:*

Man that is born of a woman hath but a short time to live, and is full of misery. He cometh up, and is cut down like a flower; he fleeth as it were a shadow, and never continueth in one stay.

In the midst of life we are in death: of whom may we seek for succor, but of thee, O Lord, who for our sins art justly displeased?

Yet, O Lord God most holy, O Lord most mighty, O holy and most merciful Saviour, deliver us not into the bitter pains of eternal death.

Thou knowest, Lord, the secrets of our hearts; shut not thy merciful ears to our prayers, but spare us, Lord most holy, O God most mighty, O holy and merciful

Saviour, thou most worthy Judge eternal, suffer us not at our last hour for any pains of death to fall from thee.

*Then, while the earth shall be cast upon the body by some standing by, the minister shall say:*

Forasmuch as it hath pleased Almighty God, in his wise providence, to take out of the world the soul of the departed, we therefore commit *his* body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust; looking for the general Resurrection in the last day, and the life of the world to come, through our Lord Jesus Christ; at whose second coming in glorious majesty to judge the world, the earth and the sea shall give up their dead; and the corruptible bodies of those who sleep in Him shall be changed and made like unto His own glorious body, according to the mighty working whereby He is able to subdue all things unto Himself.

*Then shall be said:*

I heard a voice from heaven saying unto me, Write, From henceforth blessed are the dead who die in the Lord: Even so, saith the Spirit; for they rest from their labors.

*Then shall the minister say:*

Lord, have mercy upon us.

*Christ, have mercy upon us.*

Lord, have mercy upon us.

*The Collect.*

O merciful God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is the resurrection and the life: in whom whosoever believeth shall live, though he die, and whosoever liveth and believeth shall not die eternally: We meekly beseech thee, O Father, to raise us from the death of sin

unto the life of righteousness; that when we shall depart this life we may rest in Him; and at the general resurrection on the last day may be found acceptable in thy sight, and receive that blessing which thy well-beloved Son shall then pronounce to all that love and fear thee, saying, Come, ye blessed children of my Father, receive the kingdom prepared for you from the beginning of the world. Grant this, we beseech thee, O merciful Father, through Jesus Christ our Mediator and Redeemer. *Amen.*

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven. 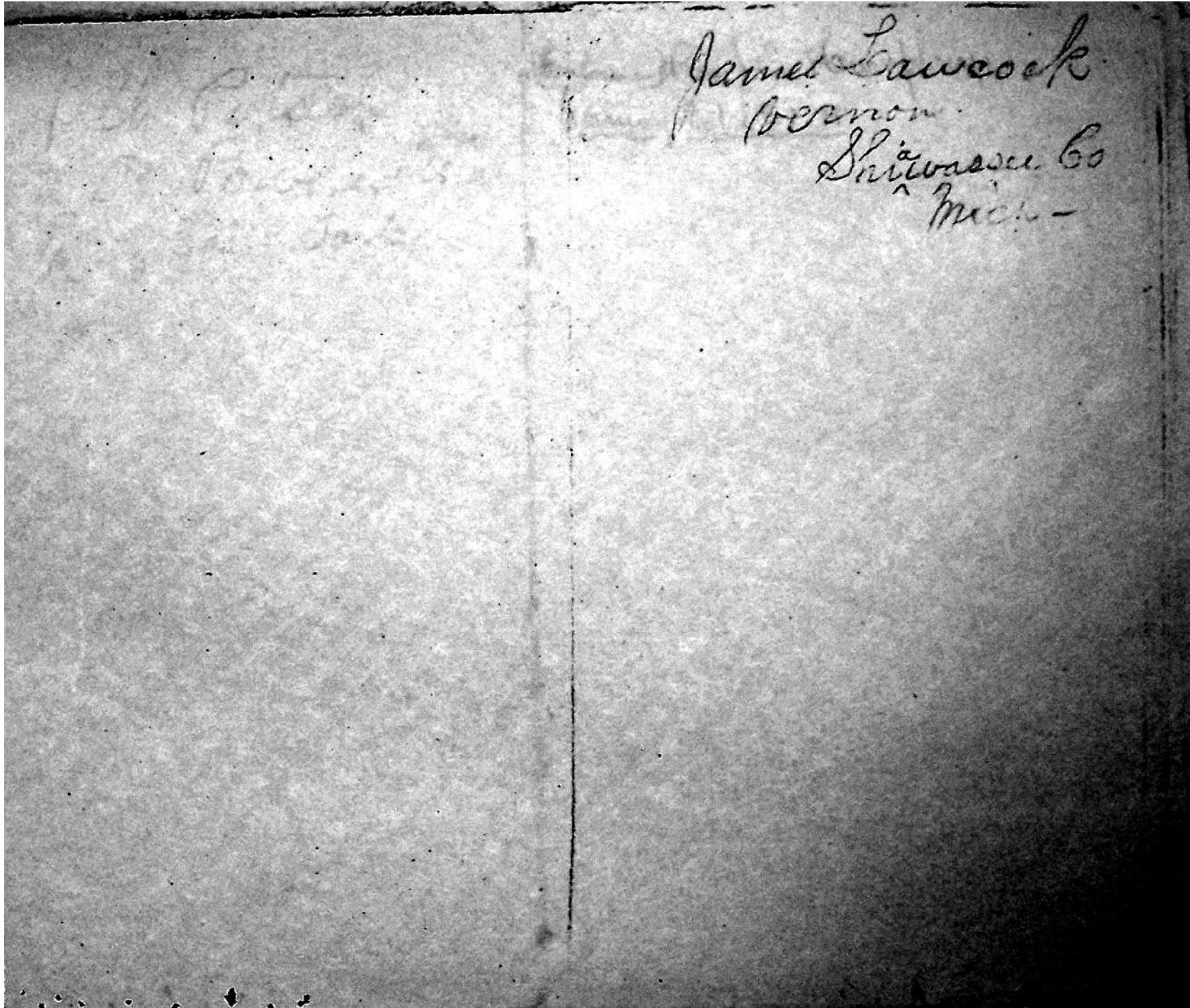

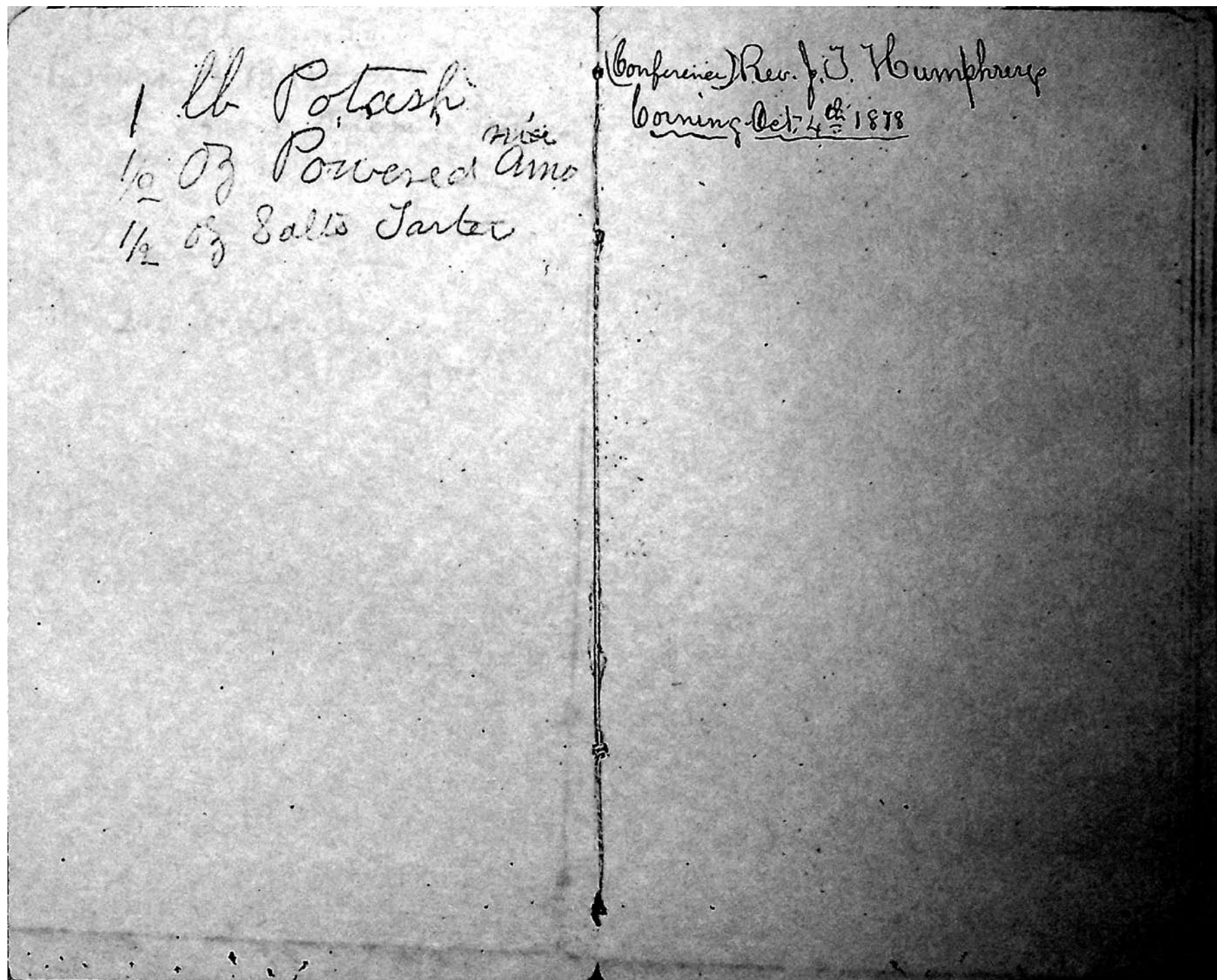
