

Foreword

0

The one great aim of the Church is to bring humanity into that close relationship with one another as brothers and sisters and into that great relationship with God as our Father, and Jesus Christ, our Brother. To establish these relations we should know about our Church and its members. Furthermore this Directory will give the members a better understanding of the past history of the Church and its present activities. We trust that as it goes into our Church homes it will be of interest and service to each member and friend.

We take this opportunity of expressing our appreciation to the advertisers, whose cooperation made this Directory possible.

The Town of Penfield

N describing the town of Penfield as it was previous to the years 1824, an early writer of local history said: "It is a post township in the north east corner of Monroe County, ten miles east of Rochester. On the west it embraces a part of 'Teoronto Bay', the boundary towards Brighton, and has some streamlets that run into the lake, and one, the largest, into the head of the Bay. The area of the town (which then included Webster) is about sixty-seven square miles, and it has the greatest aggregate population of anyone in the county (population in 1820 was 3,224). The land all descends northward." Such was a reasonable and fair description of Penfield as it was in 1824. In its present limits Penfield is about six and one-third miles in length, and four and one-sixth miles wide, giving it an area of about twenty-five and one-half square miles, comprising twenty-four thousand four hundred and twenty acres. Its surface is rolling and in the west it is much broken. Irondequoit Creek flows through the south west corner and forms part of the western boundary, it falls about ninety feet in the village of Penfield. The soil is comprised of drift-sand and argillaceous loam, with considerable clay in some places, rich and productive, with a generally level surface, though slightly rolling in some places.

The original proprietors of the town of Penfield were Phelps and Gorham who acquired title from Mass. and the Indians of this state. About 1790 they sold the township to General Jonathan Fasset, a Vermont Yankee, who visited his purchase and made some small improvements, but the situation of the town and its malerial districts were too much even for a Yankee and he abandoned his purchase and subsequently sold it to Mr. Ham, of New Jersey, for less than he paid for it. Proprietor Ham sold the town to General Silas Pepoon, reserving to himself a two hundred acre tract a mile north of Penfield Village. Pepoon sold to Samuel P. Lloyd and the latter in 1810 disposed of all that remained to Daniel Penfield. March 30, 1810 the town was organized and named for the landed proprietor, Daniel Penfield, who was a Commissary in a New York Regiment during the Revolutionary war.

Caleb Hopkins made the first permanent settlement near Irondequoit Falls as early as 1791. Long before this, however, hunters and trappers had settled temporarily along the shores of Irondequoit bay and creek. They were a wild and reckless class, who associated and mixed with the Indians. They bought no lands, but squatted there with their families in rude log cabins, and, clearing only small garden patches, they followed trapping entirely as a livelihood. They raised large families, some of them with Indian wives, and as settlements became numerous they packed up and moved to the mouth of the Genesee river. The settlement of all this country round about was preceded by this wild element which hovered between the two extremes of savage and civilized life. In 1804, John Hipp, of New Jersey, purchased the property of Mr. Ham which he had reserved for himself and moved on it with his wife and six children. Among others who migrated to Penfield in 1804 were Josiah Kellogg, Daniel Stillwell, Benjamin Minor, Henry

Paddock and Herrington Baker. The first birth was that of a child to Mrs. Fiske and the first death that of B. Stillwell in 1804. Joseph Hatch taught the first school, Daniel Stillwell kept the first Inn 1806, and William McKinstry the first store. The first mills were built by Daniel Penfield. Irondequoit Creek furnished excellent water power and upon its banks many industries were early started. The old trip hammer was started in 1800 by Mr. Bronson. Nathaniel Case and Nelson Fuller built mills along the creek about 1815. About 1805 Captain Ben. Minor built a fulling mill on the creek and in 1815 a cloth factory was erected. The first town meeting was held at the school house April 20, 1811, at which time William McKinstry was elected supervisor and Brooks Mason town clerk. Dr. Van Dake commenced the practice of medicine in Penfield in 1804, died in 1810; Dr. Rich in 1808, died in 1814; Dr. Arms in 1810, died in 1838. The first church organized was the Baptist Church, in 1804, and the first preacher, Rev. Elijah Case the same year. A post office was located here previous to the war of 1812, with the mail carried on horseback to and from Pittsford. The old school house which stood on the site of the Presbyterian church building was the first one in town, and was memorable as the place of the first town election and the first religious meetings and church organizations. The Presbyterian church was built over an old cemetery. The graves with stones were removed to the then new cemetery (on Oakwood) and the unmarked graves were left. The bones were still there when the cellar for the present apartment building was built.

The above history is very fragmentary but sufficient to picture for us the interesting beginning of our little town. At the present time Penfield is populated by about 3,000 inhabitants, some of which have moved to this beautiful little village from Rochester. It has a thriving business center and is served by five churches including the Baptist Church of East Penfield.


HISTORY OF METHODISM IN PENFIELD

EARLY records tell us that Methodism in Penfield began in the year of our Lord 1806, when a class of seven members was formed by the Rev. Stephen S. Graves from Lima. They met at the home of John Hipp but later the place of meeting was changed to Penfield Center. The seven original members of the Class were: John Tillotson, who became Class Leader; Lucy Owen, Phoebe Chase, Phoebe Hill, Sarah Barrett, Lucy Williams and Lois Mann.

In 1829 or 1830 the first Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Penfield was organized at the home of James Chase, located a little south of Penfield Mills, by the Rev. Philo Woodworth and the charge was considered as belonging to the Victor Circuit. It was soon changed, however, to the Penfield Circuit by the Rev. Jonathan Hustis as it has since remained. For about two years they met at the home of Jonathan Barrett, south of the corner. Afterward, site of Advent church, the old Penfield store, about fifty rods west of the corner, later converted into a foundry, was used. In 1834 two-thirds of the Globe Building, on the North west corner, was purchased and fitted up for services which were held in that edifice until the present building was completed and dedicated June 29th, 1843, by the Rev. Samuel Lucky, D. D. of Rochester. This Building is a wooden structure north of the corner having a seating capacity of four hundred and costing nine thousand dollars including the lot.

The first pastor was the Rev. Philo Woodworth and those who succeed him with the number of years of their pastorates are as follows:


