

## FOREWORD

**B**ELIEVING that many who have prayed and worked and waited with us thru many years for the coming of this glad event in the life of Salem will welcome a simple statement of the various steps which led to the accomplishment of a great task, we present herewith in twelve brief chapters the story of our new Church School and Parish House. It is offered in grateful recognition of unnumbered services, faithfully rendered, and of many sacrifices, cheerfully made by men and women who were willing to translate a glowing vision into crowning deeds. The new building is not a realization of our first plan. The ideal, as we saw it in the beginning, must forever remain a pleasant dream. But it is a building which will enable us to carry on an adequate program of Religious Education, and which provides ample opportunity for the expressional needs of our church life. It represents a significant forward step by means of which we hope to develop a more intelligent and active membership, and thereby to assume our full share in bringing in the Kingdom of our Lord.

## AN URGENT NEED

**S**ALEM congregation was organized in 1873, and the church building was completed in the following year. The beautiful auditorium provided seating capacity for more than 1200 persons, but the first Sunday-school rooms could accommodate less than 400 pupils. In 1894 the average attendance passed the 600 mark and it became necessary to enlarge the existing quarters. This was done in 1895 at a cost of \$13,722, of which amount the sum of \$10,000 was borrowed. With these additions the school could house 600 pupils and this, apparently, met all requirements for a number of years. In 1910 a new era began as the following figures, denoting the average attendance for seven consecutive years, will clearly indicate:

This steady growth created a very uncomfortable and perplexing situation. Here is just one illustration of what happened.

To crowd 1300 persons into a space which was intended to take care of only 600 is little short of criminal and makes efficient teaching impossible. Some of the departments were compelled to meet in the church auditorium. Later we filled to capacity the "Little Red House." Then we rented the Y. W. C. A. where the Men's Bible Class and the Young Men's Department have held their sessions for several years. Since 1919 our school has been meeting in four different buildings every Sunday. Something had to be done. The need was urgent and had to be met.

## THE NEST EGG

**E**ARLY in 1913 someone had a strange dream. One night, after returning from a Workers' meeting, he saw in his sleep a beautiful new Sunday School building and in Franklin Street hundreds of men and women, boys and girls who were carrying their Bibles and trying to reach the entrance. He awoke, and he began to think. Such things do not just happen; they must have a beginning, somewhere. Was this to be only a dream? Recognizing the need and also the possibility of making his dream become a reality, this some one went to the telephone and had a rather unusual conversation with a carpenter known to all Salemites as Fred Kleiner. On the following Sunday a big surprise was announced for the approaching Easter season. It came, and here it is:



From the English Columns found in the April issue of the "Salem's Bote" 1913 we quote the following paragraph:

"Were you surprised or disappointed—which? If you did not attend the Easter Service, ask some one who did. And never mind, 'there'll come a time some day' when our hopes will be fulfilled. Just wait and see, but 'hustle' while you wait."

That was ten years ago. Fifty-thousand dollars for a modern Sunday School building? It nearly took our breath away. "Impossible," said some; "pipe-dream" others. But into this Nest-Egg went our spare pennies, and nickels, and dimes, and dollars, year after year, and out of it came the "Little Red House" and a new Church School and Parish House which, when fully completed and equipped, represents an investment of five times fifty-thousand dollars. What "mighty oaks from little acorns grow."

## A GROWING VISION

**C**ONDITIONS were getting worse and they impelled action. In the May issue of the "Salem Bote" 1917 we read the following important notice:

"It will interest our people to hear that at the annual meeting, held on the evening of April 16th, the congregation voted unanimously to purchase property adjoining the church on the South side for the sum of \$25,500. The two lots which have been secured measure 98 by 163 feet and furnish a splendid site for our new Sunday School building and Parish House to be erected at the earliest possible time."

In the June issue of the same year: "Since the annual meeting our Sunday School has acquired, merely as a means of future protection, the "Little Red House" for the sum of \$6000 of which amount \$4000 was paid in cash and \$789 of the fifth thousand is already on hand."

"For the purpose of securing the required funds (the amount has not been definitely fixed, but will not be less than one hundred thousand dollars) our Church Council has already arranged for a financial canvass to be conducted during the month of November, 1917."

November came and with it the great campaign. Under the efficient leadership of Mr. H. H. Patterson of Cleveland, Ohio, 300 men and 100 women secured 2285 pledges in six days, November 19th to 26th. These pledges amounted to \$154,101 (including the "Little Red House"), the individual contributions ranging from seventy-five cents to five thousand dollars. The entire expense of this great campaign, including the Commissary Department, was \$3,129.77. And here are some of the enthusiastic workers to whom we owe its success:

## AN UNWELCOME POST-PONEMENT

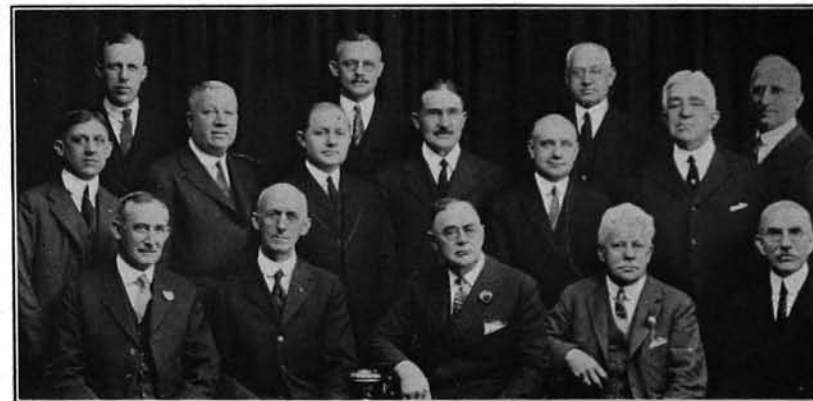
THE greatest significance of the financial campaign of 1917 lay in the fact that it was successful at a time when our country was already involved in the horrible world conflict raging across the sea. On the evening of November 26th, the closing day of our campaign, the honorable mayor of our fair city, Hiram Edgerton, expressed to the workers his great satisfaction "that the church in these days of stress would dare to undertake and to do successfully such a big thing." In a congratulatory letter received at that time from Dr. H. H. Barstow of Westminster Church we read: "I feel that if in the midst of all the pressure for money that is upon the people now, Salem Church can accomplish their great purpose it will put heart into ministers and churches, and make us all feel that we can trust the heart of the church still to support its own great tasks as well as those of the nation." Dr. A. W. Beaven wrote: "That was a fine piece of work, particularly under the present stress of the times." And our good people did not shirk their duty toward the nation. Salem bought more Liberty Bonds than any other church in this community. More young men responded to the call of the Colors from our Bible School than came from any other Protestant church school in Rochester. As a people none were more truly loyal than ours.

But the war forced upon us the unwelcome postponement of our cherished plans. By order of the Government all building operations which were not an absolute necessity had to be abandoned, for the time being. The payment of pledges was delayed. Our people needed their money to meet the high cost of living and they were urged to invest any surplus in Government Bonds. We were compelled to wait a little while longer. For a time it seemed as if the vision would be dimmed, and faith would falter, and the enthusiasm must wane. But this was only for a time. We learned "to labor and to wait" and to those who have truly learned life's great lesson all things which are really necessary, will come in due season.

## TO THE TASK

AS early as June 8th, 1916 a building committee was appointed consisting of Messrs. Geo. F. Roth, Chas. W. Weis, Chas. G. Gerhard, Geo. J. Hafner, J. George Kaelber, Chas. Suss and the pastor ex-officio. In view of the fact that the proposed new building was to meet primarily the needs of the Sunday School the members of the above committee requested the appointment of representatives from the school who were thoroughly familiar with the nature and the requirements of this important work. The request was cheerfully met by the Sunday School workers and the following men were chosen to represent the school on the Building committee: Charles T. Rau, J. J. Andersen, Fred J. Schminke, Wm. H. Brown and Henry Albrecht. The committee organized as follows: Geo. J. Hafner, Chairman, J. Geo. Kaelber, Vice-chairman, Chas. Gerhard, secretary, Chas. W. Weis, treasurer, Charles T. Rau, assistant treasurer. Mr. Kilian Schaeffer was engaged to serve as clerk and Mr. Emil Ludekans as Legal Advisor. Later Messrs. F. M. Dubelbeiss and Oscar Zabel were added to the committee in an advisory capacity. The good women of the church were also asked to appoint advisory representatives and they responded by choosing the following: Frauenverein: Mrs. B. Tischer, Mrs. R. Weis. Sister Society: Mrs. E. Norden, Mrs. J. Hoffman. Sunday School: Miss Emma Hempel.

Thru seven long years the Building Committee has been faithfully at work. It studied the needs, carried on correspondence with leading Sunday School men, held conferences with architects, secured the firm Gordon and Kaelber to make plans and draw specifications and submitted them to the congregation. When these were rejected they started all over again, had other plans and specifications drawn and upon final acceptance, awarded the contracts, paid the bills, held innumerable meetings, often till nearly midnight, and thus saw our building project thru to its final completion.

## A MEMORABLE MORNING

THE first plans prepared by our architects, Gordon and Kaelber, were those of an ideal modern Sunday School building and in almost every detail contemplated an equipment such as we had dreamed of for many years. These plans and specifications were completed on July 27th 1921 and the architects were instructed to secure competitive bids. On September 21st, 1921 the bids were opened. The total cost of the various contracts submitted amounted to \$293,000. Already the congregation had twice raised the original appropriation of \$100,000; first to \$150,000 and then to \$175,000. To invest three times the amount originally specified seemed an impossibility. The bids were rejected and the committee was instructed to revise the plans and reduce the cost. This was done thru numerous eliminations and changes. On December 22nd, 1921 the second bids were opened which called for an expenditure of \$195,000, without equipment. These were also rejected by the annual meeting held on January 9th, 1922. The Building Committee was again limited to \$175,000 and instructed to proceed accordingly. Entirely new plans were made in which many desirable features were of necessity eliminated. At a special meeting of the congregation held on Monday, June 12th, 1922 the new plans were submitted and approved, the total contracts, exclusive of all unavoidable extras and necessary equipment, amounting to nearly \$165,000. The committee was urged to award the contracts to the lowest responsible bidders without delay, and to begin work immediately. It did, and seven days later, on Monday morning, June 19th at 8:30 o'clock members of the Building Committee and of the Church Council assembled to break ground for the new structure. After an earnest prayer in which the pastor invoked God's favor and blessing upon the undertaking a new spade was vigorously thrust into the earth and the ground turned over in the manner here shown.

## A GLAD DAY

ONCE BEGUN the work on our new building progressed with greater speed than we had anticipated. Three months after the breaking of the ground we were privileged to celebrate the laying of the cornerstone. Sunday, September 17th, 1922 was a glad day for Salem. More than a thousand members and friends of our church assembled at three o'clock in the afternoon to witness the great event which marks one of the important mile stones in our history. Our heavenly Father blessed the occasion with glorious sunshine. The Reverend Richard Stave Ph.D. of St. Paul's Church delivered a splendid address in which he emphasized the need of Religious Education in the program of the church. Professor Ludwig Schenck, kindly accepted our invitation to lead the congregational singing, as in the days gone by, and the joyous strains accompanied by Professor Carl Paul on the organ and assisted by several brass instruments gave evidence of the enthusiasm which filled the hearts of many true Salemites. During the service and long after its close the photographer was busy with his camera to preserve the happy scenes for future generations. Here is one of them.

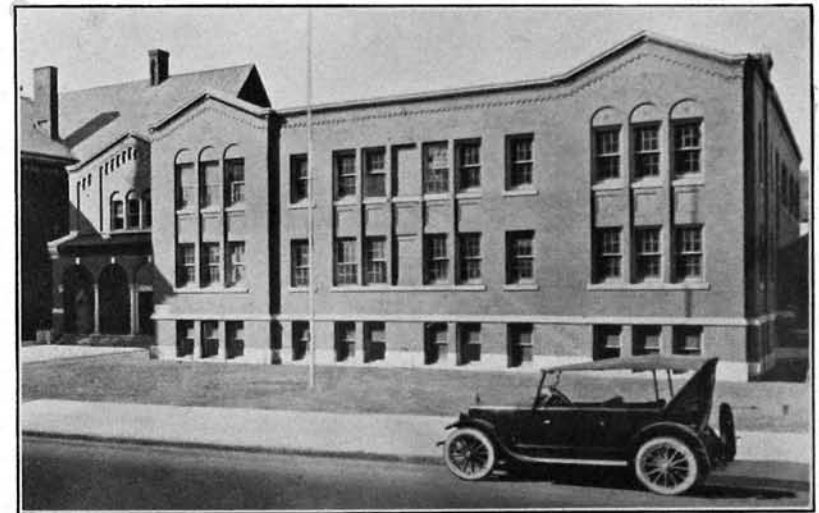


September 17th, 1922.

In the center of the cornerstone we have placed a copper receptacle containing the following documents: The Bible, Elmhurst Hymnal, Evangelical Catechism, "Our Evangelical Church," a copy of the Constitution; the picture and story of the Nest Egg; copies of the "Salem's Bote" giving information about the Financial Campaign of 1917, the list of contributors, Our Larger Program, Annual Reports 1921; a list giving the names of the Officers and Members of all Organizations, the Church Council, The Building Committee, the Architects and the Contractors; copies of "Der Friedensbote" Evangelical Herald, Evangelical Teacher, Year Book 1922; Copies of Democrat and Chronicle, Rochester Herald, Post Express, Times-Union, Rochester American, Die Abendpost; The Christian Flag and the American Flag.

Opportunity will be given each night to see the whole building. Well informed guides will conduct the several groups. Members of the orchestra the Church quartet and our choirs will furnish the music. The good Women of Salem will serve refreshments to all who come. Each night of Dedication week will be a spiritual, an intellectual and a social feast.

On the first floor are the church offices with every up-to-date equipment, a work-room for the secretaries, and others, a beautiful church parlor, comfortably furnished with kitchenette adjoining and a gallery which offers additional space to the dining room below. The second floor is devoted entirely to various departments of our Bible School, namely the Junior, Intermediate and Senior groups, each department being divided into three grades by means of folding partitions and equipped with blackboards built into the walls, and desk-chairs for the convenience of the pupils. The Beginners and Primary Departments and also the pastors' offices will be located in the old plant which will be completely remodeled and re-furnished. Most of the rooms are intended to serve many and varied purposes. Salem is to become a seven-day church open all week for worship and work.





## TOLD IN FIGURES

**N**O doubt everybody will be interested to know the cost of our building operations. In round figures this will be about \$250,000, or five times the amount mentioned on Easter Sunday 1913, when the congregation was surprised with the gift of our famous Nest-Egg. We are not in a position to present at this time all expenses in a complete financial statement. However, we can give the cost of the most important items now and we refer our friends to the full report of the Building Committee which will be prepared in detail and submitted to the congregation at the earliest possible time.

**W**E thank God for the spirit of 1873 which moved the Founders of Salem to erect the beautiful church in which we still worship, and which lives in their sons and daughters of 1923. The spirit of unfailing love and unfaltering faith has prepared the way; the spirit of cheerful co-operation and willing sacrifice has brought us to the coveted goal. But this spirit comes from God and therefore we say: "Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name give Glory."

**T**O the members of the Building Committee who in the face of many difficulties and much criticism have carried on thru seven long years, the writer must pay a special tribute. One of our number has gone home. Mr. Charles W. Weis who served our church for twenty-five years as Treasurer, and who was also the first treasurer of our Building Fund, is no longer with us. We honor his memory and his many services. The other members were permitted to continue in the work until the goal has been reached. Special credit must be given to our esteemed chairman, Mr. Geo. J. Hafner, and our loyal secretary, Mr. Charles G. Gerhard, who have not only attended all meetings regularly, but who gave so liberally of their time and talent to the accomplishment of the task. Brethren of the Building Committee, we appreciate you. May the work which you have done be your joy, and the many services which you have rendered, your great reward. And to all who have encouraged us with your interest and your gifts and your prayers we say a hearty Thank You!

## THE SOLEMN CHALLENGE

WE dare not close this bit of history in the development of our beloved church without asking and answering several very important and vital questions. Why have we done this? To what purpose have we erected our new building? What is it all for? What use shall we make of our larger and better equipment? The real test has not been met in the accomplishment of yesterday; it must be met in the achievement of today and of tomorrow. Only the manner in which we shall make the fullest possible use of the larger opportunities now offered, can determine the real value of our new building in the life of the church and the community of which we are a part.

WE have named the new building "Church School and Parish House" and we dedicate it to a three-fold purpose: "Instruction, Inspiration and Expression." It is more than a Sunday School; we hope, God helping us, to make it a Church School of Religious Education in which the teachings of Jesus will be offered every day of the week, and in which people will be inspired to live the Christ-life. Here we shall endeavor to train Christian workers, and to develop religious leaders. It is Salem's work-shop where our Church life can find its true expression; where men and women, boys and girls, at all times can engage in ministries which will help to advance the Kingdom of God.

DO we believe in aggressive and progressive Christianity? Are we ready to accept the solemn challenge of a new and better day? Is Salem willing to assume her full responsibility in the world-task? Then let us make Dedication Week a season of renewed consecration to the Christ, whose we are and whom we serve. In the spirit of unfeigned love and unceasing loyalty let us join hearts and hands, and together

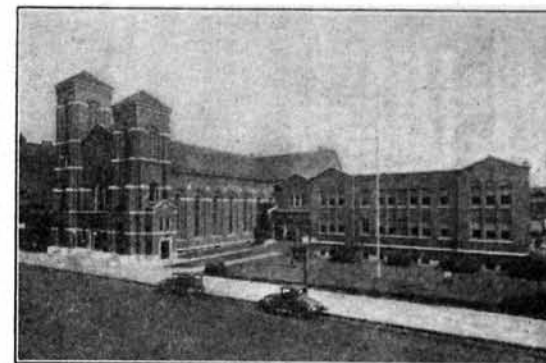

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The 873rd meeting of the Church Council of Salem Evangelical and Reformed Church was held Thursday, December 2, 1948.

A Christmas Cantata by the Young People's Choir and Junior Choir is to be presented December 26, 1948 at 7:45 P.M.

Boy Scout Troop 11 now has a new Scout Master, Dick Eggert. Plans are being made to form a new troop committee and to get more boys in the troop.

Dr. Schroeder announced that Radio Station WARC is to make a wire recording of the church service on February 13, 1949 and broadcast this service on February 20, 1949.

The card racks on back of the church pews need repairing as cards and envelopes fall through on many of these racks. It was suggested that masking tape applied to the under side of these racks would eliminate this condition, and several members agreed to take care of this work. It was also suggested that the racks in the rear of the balcony be replaced or new racks be installed.

The annual congregational meeting is to be held on January 17, 1949, and it is to be preceded by a supper.

It was suggested that the entire Church Council march in at start of service for the Communion Service on January 2, 1949. Mr. Thorne will arrange to have ushers for this service.

### CAMPERS

Junior campers are those boys and girls who are 9, 10, 11 years of age and who have completed grades 4, 5, 6. They must be in the Junior Department of the Church school or at least Nine Years Old and have completed the Fourth Grade.

### PROGRAM

Experience through which the camper passes will in a good many ways help to determine the program of activities. Campers and leaders together will seek to find the best in Christian living through exploration of all that the camp experience offers. Games, swimming, hikes, evening campfires, vespers will help fill the campers day with adventure, new friends, and a new understanding of the Christian way of life.

### LEADERS

Group counselors and cabin counselors have been carefully chosen on the basis of their understanding and working experience with Junior boys and girls. The director of each period supervises the total program with the help of the staff. A nurse and life guard are always on the camp grounds.

### CAMP FAMILY

Because we can do effective work with Juniors only if the camp family is small enough to give individual attention to each child, we are compelled to limit the enrollment to 100 campers. When that number is reached registrations must be closed.

### NOTE TO PARENTS

The campers should bring along a doctor's certificate indicating his physical fitness to participate in an active camp period planned on the basis of Junior pursuits. This examination should be made within ten days of the opening of the camp.

It is desirous that no cake or candy be sent to campers. The best of well balanced meals, prepared by competent cooks, are served. These meals will provide the energy needed for participation in full camp activities without the addition of "sweets".

If boxes do arrive, the "goodies" will be shared after meals through the counselor.

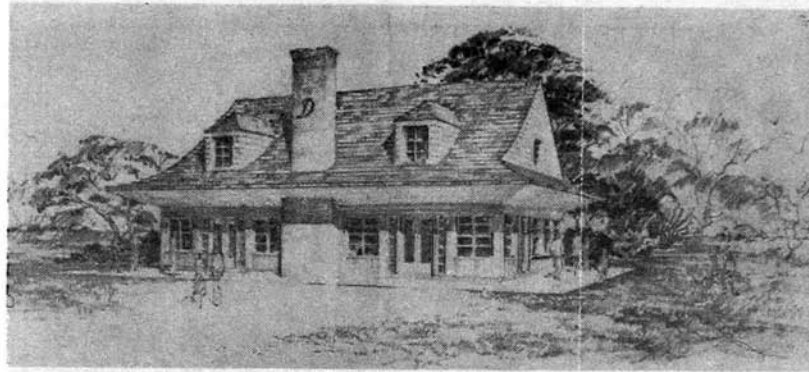
### SPECIAL INFORMATION

Camp begins with the supper meal, August 13 and closes after breakfast, August 25.

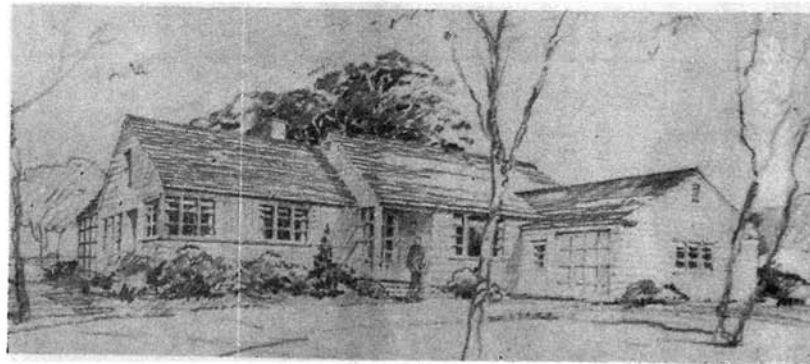


### FELLOWSHIP BUILDING

There were 40 different group conferences held on the grounds in 1949.

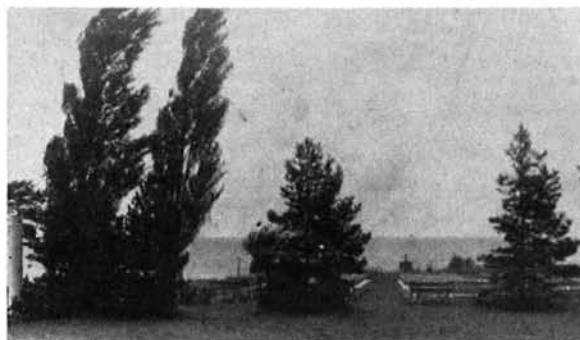
There were 3640 individuals registered in these conferences.

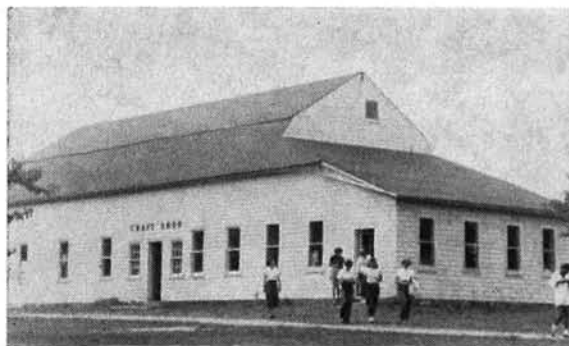

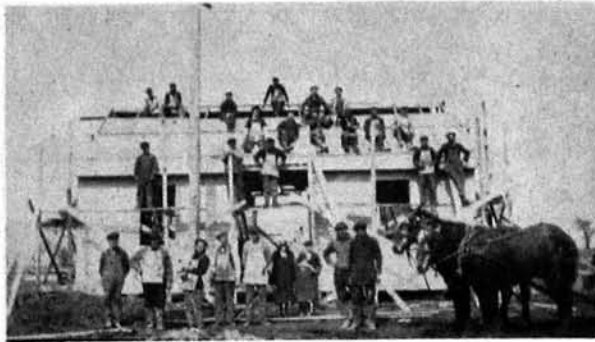

COTTAGE ERECTION

The 29-year story of the Dunkirk Conference Grounds is one of early visionaries, loyal followers and sincere moderns.

This property of 110 acres, with 2500 feet of lake frontage, was purchased by the Church September 22, 1921.

On July 27, 1922, a first convention of the Sunday School and Young People's League was held.

The first cottage was erected in 1923 and by 1926 most of the 25 cottages and present buildings had been erected. The last two buildings, Salem Cottage in 1938 and the Administration Building in 1939, complete the present Camp. The renovation of the barn to a Craft Shop has been a recent project, now almost complete. There is a large Auditorium, called The Mother's Memorial, an adequate Classroom Building, a Dining Hall where 325 may be served at one seating, a Store and two Bath Houses.

All of these buildings form a complete unit capable of serving a conference of 275 registrants.

The Board of Directors does not plan to expand these facilities in order to accommodate larger camps. This would imply the enlargement of the Dining Hall and other "basic service buildings".

## THE WILL TO DO

Recently I overheard two women talking to each other in the neighborhood grocery store where they had met to do their day's shopping. The one was relating how she had attended Church every morning for over six months. It was obvious that she had found real satisfaction in beginning the day early with prayer in her Church instead of going back to bed after her husband left for work as she had done prior to her new schedule. "How do you do it", asked the shopping companion. "You must make up your mind to do it", replied the faithful church-goer with a spirit of triumph in her voice.

The women had found the secret of progress and achievement in committing herself fully to that which she felt she ought to do. She had made up her mind to do it! Her resolution was not merely a happy decision of the moment. Therefore she continued with her new program.

I dare venture the guess that this is one of the main reasons why some Churches pay their apportionment in full. They have made up their minds to do so and do it. How else would the same Churches meet their goal year after year? We would like to see every pastor and every congregation "make up their mind" to support the benevolences of the Church at least to the extent of meeting the challenge in the Apportionment and World Service.

It is surprising what we can do if we make up our minds to do it. Pastors, members of our consistories and of our Church councils, and leaders of the various groups in our Churches must first make up their minds to fully meet the challenge. If they are convinced that this is what ought to be done, they should have little difficulty in winning the congregation over to a higher appreciation of its stewardship and to a fuller participation in the larger program of the Church.

## HOGS, EGGS, AND CROWNS

One of the most thrilling experiences since my return from the world study tour for the National Council of Churches was my visit to the Buffalo area of West New York Synod. Heartiest thanks to all of you for your interest, enthusiasm, and excellent support of World Service.

This week our E & R World Service will send 194 breeding hogs to Korea as part of a program of helping people help themselves. Again we are the first to send little pigs as we were the first to send hatching eggs (72,000 sent April 1st) to help the refugee farmers of Korea to rebuild their lost flocks and herds.

Equipment to distill intravenous fluids has been sent to the United Christian Hospital at Lahori, Pakistan. This will be the only hospital in all of Pakistan that will have this equipment. They will supply other hospitals and so extend the Christian witness through service in Christ's name.

Have you read the June issue of the 'E & R'? We believe it should be sent to every one of our fourteen thousand E & R young people in the armed service of our country. It contains the addresses of our E & R missionaries and other representatives in Japan, Hong Kong, Germany, and Switzerland.

We are happy to announce that enough money was contributed to meet all the costs of our support of work in the flood area this Spring. A special appeal for funds will not be necessary.

Twenty percent of all World Service funds goes directly to the Board of International Missions. This year these funds are supporting the new Japan International Christian University, Tokyo, where Christian Social Workers are being trained for relief work in Asia.

Our gift of wheat to our E & R hospitals in India will have arrived there by the time you read this brief report. Last week Church World Service sent 200,000 pounds of powdered milk, 20,000 pounds

### A SOLEMN TRUST

According to usage in the Evangelical and Reformed Church, following the election of persons to a Consistory or Church Council, those persons are publicly ordained and installed at a Church service. Our Book of Worship gives the approved form for this impressive service. The candidates to be ordained and installed, or simply installed if previously ordained, are at the very outset reminded that "as it is a great honor to bear office in the Lord's house, so it is also a solemn trust . . . you are not to regard yourselves merely as servants of men, but also servants of Christ." Church officials therefore are trustees, owing a service of strict integrity to their Lord and to the Church members who elected them.

When any group of Christian people organize themselves into a Christian Church they thereby obligate themselves to participate in Christ's concern for the needy — works of benevolence as they are called. As a denomination we of the Evangelical and Reformed Church give our benevolences, very largely, through the Apportionment and World Service.

Our denomination's record of benevolent giving during the past decade has been constantly improving. As a Synod we have shared in this increase, but our standing among the Synods has been consistently near the bottom. This is no honor to us, and the responsibility for our poor standing rests upon those churches which are not doing their best to support the Apportionment and World Service.

Since the amount of a congregation's Apportionment is determined by factors that indicate its ability to give, and many of our churches prove that this is so by consistently giving their full share, we can only conclude that churches which do not do their part fail, not because of lack of ability but of desire.

It is not reasonable to think that a member of the Church of Christ does not give for benevolent purposes during the year the small amount required by the Apportionment to carry on our benevolences. The conclusion we are drawn to is that we fail to reach our goal as a Synod because some churches are not passing on the benevolent contributions of their people to the Apportionment. And that brings us back to the obligation of Church officials: "As it is a great honor to bear office in the Lord's house, so it is also a solemn trust." By what authority has any church official or official board the right to withhold or divert benevolent contributions from the purposes for which they were given? We

did read something about service in the Lord's house being "a solemn trust."

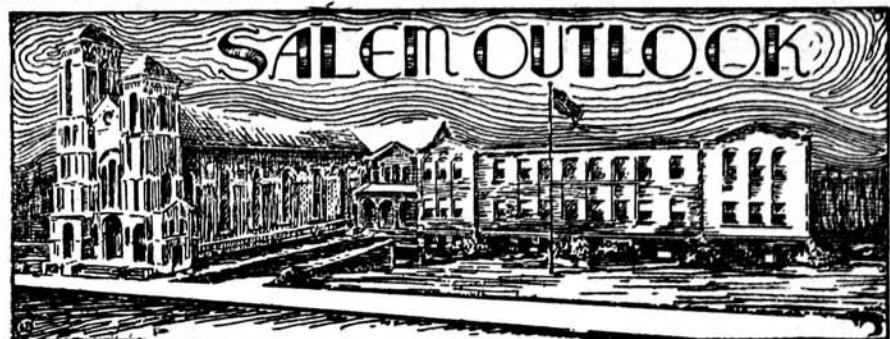

During the intermission, the assembly enjoyed a marvelous sound movie of the World Council meeting in Amsterdam, the first showing of the complete film in our city.

Following the devotional service by Rev. J. B. Fister, President Benjamin Stallman called the meeting to order. The secretary read the minutes of the previous meetings whereupon Mr. Charles Then, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, submitted the list of candidates for the Church Council. Mr. Stallman called for additional nominations from the floor, if any, and the following were nominated: For Trustee: Herbert Zimmer, Jr. by Thomas Keenan; for Elder: Jacob Sattel by Arthur Brodbeck; for Deacon: Norman Ackroyd by William Schlieter. Mr. Ackroyd however declined to accept the nomination. The nominations were closed and a committee of tellers with Walter Graeper as chairman was appointed by the president.

The newly elected members are hereby notified to present themselves for public installation next Sunday at 10:30 A. M. and to enter the sanctuary in the processional following the choir.

### REPORT OF THE PASTORS FOR 1948

Dear Members of Salem Church:

"O give thanks unto the Lord for He is good and His mercy endureth forever." Psalm 107:1.

As we conclude the seventy-fifth year of Salem's history, we call to mind this fervent word of the Psalmist to express our deep emotions at this moment. Truly God has been good to Salem and our hearts are filled with gratitude to Him tonight. I shall not review the anniversary year in detail because it has been reviewed in the Seventy-fifth Anniversary Book, which has been placed in your hands tonight.

I propose reducing the statistical review of the year's activities to a minimum. I would omit the statistical report altogether, but it seems necessary for the purpose of analysis and study of trends in the congregational life.

We again express our hearty thanks to the workers of our E. M. C. campaign. Mr. Henry Sheve and Mr. Jacob Vogel deserve much credit for their inspiring and enthusiastic leadership.

### Our Benevolences

Mr. Then has reported a total of \$21,371.65 received for benevolences during the past year which represents an all time high for Salem Church. In addition to these funds reported by our treasurer, a goodly number of contributions have been made by our organizations directly to charitable and benevolent causes. We are happy to report also that our church school has recently donated a very powerful Bausch & Lomb hospital microscope to the medical clinic in Parsabader, India.

Gift packages are still being sent to Germany and Mr. Arthur Brodbeck informed us that 400 packages of food and clothing have been sent to Europe in 1948 with a total valuation in excess of \$4,000.00.

The number of food and clothing packages is tapering off because of slowly improving conditions in Germany, but the need for world service contributions for the rebuilding of churches, schools, and hospitals is still very urgent.

### Our Salem Missionaries

We learned with deep regret a few weeks ago that Dr. and Mrs. Harold Freund have resigned from the staff of our Board of International Missions. We had hoped that they would again represent us in the foreign field but the unfortunate accident several years ago in which Dr. Freund lost the use of one eye made his return to the foreign field inadvisable. Dr. and Mrs. Freund have done much to arouse interest in missionary work among our people. May God continue to use them with much blessing here at home for many more years.

Miss Anna Bechtold will complete 25 years of service as our Missionary in Honduras in 1949 and we rejoice in her faithful and effective leadership in the educational field in our mission at San Pedro.

### The Endowment Fund

### Religious Education

We have secured the services of Mr. Charles Gordon, a student at the Colgate-Rochester Divinity School to assist us in our religious education and youth program.

The Board of Education is grappling with the problem of enlisting more of our children in our church school. The inability or the unwillingness of parents to make the necessary effort to bring their children to Sunday School has tended more and more to send the children into neighborhood Sunday Schools. We must counteract this trend with energetic measures if Salem shall continue to be a growing church.

### The Music Department

The most important change in this field was the resignation of Dr. Herman Genhart as Director of Music and of Mrs. George Humby as organist during the past year. Both have served our church with distinction for many years and their efforts have lifted the music of this church to a very high degree of excellence.

The music department has secured the services of Mr. Lawrence Parker, head of the music department of Irondequoit High School, as director of music and Miss Wilma Jean Hoyle, a student at the Eastman School of Music, as organist, who with the loyal cooperation of the choir are continuing to give to Salem Church a program of music that is worthy of the best tradition of the past. We bespeak for them your cooperation and support.

Mr. Herbert Zimmer, Jr. and Mrs. William Meehan have again served the church faithfully as volunteer directors of the Young People's Choir and the Junior Choir.

### The Church Council

Membership in this growing body of our congregation is the highest honor that can be conferred upon any member. Most of the members have endeavored honestly and sincerely to measure up to the requirements of their high office. Some we must confess have not taken their responsibility as seriously as the congregation has a right to expect. The absence of some was unavoidable because of school, and work responsibilities. It must be stressed however that members should not accept this office if they know in advance that they cannot fulfill the duties pertaining to the same.

It would be too time-consuming and fruitless to list the innumerable meetings attended, the almost daily consultations in our study and the services to the community and the denomination.

If some of our members feel that the pastors should make more pastoral visits (one member has suggested that every family should be visited at least once a year) let me remind them that it is utterly impossible in our present situation. I know that my predecessors also found it impossible under much more favorable circumstances. Members of a large church like Salem must be prepared to sacrifice this personal intimate relationship with their pastor for the advantage of having a church home, which provides a spiritual, educational and social program that meets their deepest needs. We shall continue to go where there is need and no person will ever need to call upon the pastor in vain. We suggest, however, to see the pastor in his study for consultation whenever possible. This makes for a greater economy of time and a more effective service.

Dear Pastor:

I would not dare send this letter without words of deepest gratitude. One again can hope for better days when a package arrives from across the ocean from unknown friends. You should have seen how the children rejoiced when the package arrived. Everything in it was very precious. We refugees must build up our life again from the beginning. I cannot myself participate in the activities of the outside world at the present time, but I hope that with time my condition will improve. Both of my legs have been partially paralyzed, but the children bring life, joy, and sorrow into the home. Winter is knocking at the door and with it the many difficulties and hardships. The most beautiful festival which formerly brought the children so much joy is approaching but this time it will probably not be much better than the last Christmas. May the Heavenly Father protect us from still more terrible days ahead. With hearty greetings,

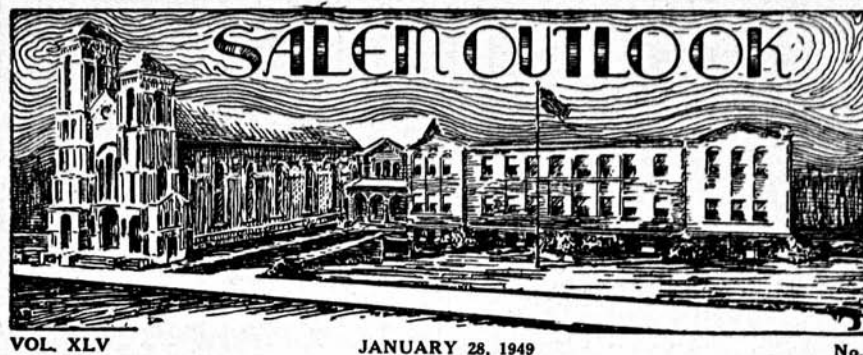
**100 MILLION POUNDS OF RELIEF  
FOR GERMANY**

According to Religious News Service (October 28, 1948) Arthur J. Joice, executive secretary of CRALOG (Council of Relief Agencies Licensed for Operation in Germany) reported that more than 100,000,000 pounds of food, clothing and medicines, with an estimated value of about \$50,000,000 have been shipped to Germany since the sixteen member agencies of CRALOG started their voluntary relief programme in February, 1946.

The supplies were contributed by church agencies, namely, Church World Service, War Relief Services of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, Mennonite Central Committee, American Friends Service Committee, and Lutheran World Relief.

FEDERATION OF CHURCHES AND  
COUNCIL OF CHURCH WOMEN

**Supply the answers.** The Federation office (1010 Temple Building, BAKER 7150) is a service center for the religious life of Rochester and its outlying area, furnishing information, representing the Protestant and Orthodox Churches in public discussion,—such are some of the numerous and varied activities of the central office.

**Promote Inter Group Friendliness** by cooperating with all community welfare agencies. They give leadership to the Christian concern for world order and support to local efforts to combat juvenile delinquency and provide more wholesome surroundings for our youth.

**Serve the School-age Population.** This is the only department with a full-time director, the Rev. Daniel W. Staffeld. Last year about 33% of the Protestant public school pupils above the second grade were enrolled in regular classes, meeting in churches on excused time.

**Strengthen the Church Schools** through the Department of Christian Education and Evangelism. At the opening of the 1948 classes nearly 400 Church School and Bible School teachers in 54 churches enrolled themselves for further training in the materials and methods of teaching.

**Provide Helps for Audio-Visual Education.** Slides and film strips are available to all churches at a reduced cost.

**Minister to the listening community** through the activities of the Department of Radio and Television, which correlates and schedules the various religious broadcasts over the six Rochester stations, in behalf of all of the churches.

**Arrange** the Highland Bowl Vespers, Noon Lenten Services, and the great Eastman Theatre Thanksgiving Service. They also guard against unwelcome and costly religious rivalry through consultation as to the placing of church buildings. Through the Federation, the Rochester and vicinity churches are in touch with other churches in New York State, the United States and throughout the world.

**Minister to the sick** in the seven Rochester hospitals by maintaining a Hospital Chaplain. He serves patients from out-of-town churches and often is the first to notify city pastors of the hospitalization of their own members.

**Cultivate the interests** of all the churches in the vicinity, and sponsor emphases of peculiar value to them.

## THE COUNCIL OF CHURCH WOMEN

The Council is an autonomous organization that joins with the Federation of Churches in an annual united financial campaign to raise operating funds. The Council unites the members of 243 churchwomen organizations from thirteen denominations. Its office is in the Temple Building, at 1013.

It carries an extensive educational program for church women through its departments and committees of work and attempts to stimulate and assist in the building and enrichment of local churchwomen's programs.

It initiates and cooperates in many social service community projects with the consecrated volunteer service of hundreds of churchwomen. It is affiliated with the State and United Councils of Churchwomen and promotes their programs and projects on the local level.

## YOUTH FEDERATION

During the year several rallies are scheduled, each with its own appeal. The central executive group meets monthly and its made up of one representative from each denomination.

Cooperation with the YMCA-YWCA makes possible the popular New Year's Eve dance. With the Federation of Men's Bible Classes, and the Christian Endeavor, the Youth Association has planned and carried out the Easter Dawn service.

## THE PASTOR'S TRAVELOGUE

(Conclusion)

There is hardly anything significant that I can add in this report which has not already appeared in the newspapers and magazines reporting the World Council. Permit me therefore to summarize here—

## 1—The Limitations of Amsterdam

I have been slightly amused by the comments of journalists who covered the World Council Assembly, that they saw no signs of a new Pentecost in this historic gathering. There were no tongues of fire nor rushing of a mighty wind as reported in the New Testament. But that the Spirit of God was present in this meeting, I have no doubt.

We Protestants are prone to underestimate our contribution to the service of humanity and the Kingdom of God. We are quick to point up our own shortcomings lest we be guilty of spiritual pride and self deception. Therefore we face frankly and confess humbly the limitations apparent to all observers of the Amsterdam Assembly.

1—The World Council is, as the name implies, a federation of denominations on a world level in which each denomination maintains complete sovereignty in its internal affairs.

2—It is a union that is maintained by a careful balancing of the major denominational groups which have tended in the last fifty years to solidify into confessional blocs on a world wide basis. The Anglicans, the Lutherans, the Presbyterians, the Baptists and other groups now have their national bodies organized on an international world-wide basis. The World Council had to guard carefully against alienating any of these confessional groups and to provide adequate representation of all groups in the organization. This was dramatized most strikingly in the establishment of a Presidium of six presidents instead of a single head of the World Council, and by the inclusion of four separate communion services; namely, Reformed, Anglican, Lutheran, and Greek Orthodox to satisfy the doctrinal implications in the tradition of



these historic branches of the Christian Church.

3—The cautious and tentative character of the pronouncements on the nature of the church, war and pacifism, communism and capitalism, again pointed up the vast areas of disagreement within the world wide fellowship of the church. The Council did little more than to state the various points of view on each major problem and to recommend them to the churches for study!

It is clear that those who may have come to Amsterdam expecting a miracle to transform the widely divergent groups to suddenly become one body and one spirit, were due to disappointment. There was no miracle at Amsterdam.

#### 2—The Achievements of Amsterdam

And yet, to those who had eyes to see and ears to hear, there was a miracle! The mere fact that representatives of 150 denominations in more than forty countries did get together and did form a World Council is in itself a miracle. The fact that no denomination regarded itself as the only true church and completely sufficient unto itself to remain aloof from this gathering is deeply significant. The mere presence of every major body outside of the Roman Church was evidence of the deep and fervent passion for Christian unity which is sweeping over the world. We are deeply conscious of the ignominy and the open shame of the spectacle of a divided and broken church in the presence of the world's desperate and appalling need.

1—Amsterdam achieved a permanent unity on a truly world-wide basis. Its statement "We have come together and we intend to stay together" is no mere wishful thinking. It was the mood of that vast delegation of church leaders assembled in Amsterdam.

2—The mechanics for the continuation and the development of the World Council had been perfected and placed in operation. With a world headquarters in Geneva, with a modest competent staff, the World Council is in a position today to speak to and to speak for the great body of Christians who cling to the freedom and the simplicity of the Apostolic Church.

3—The Assembly at Amsterdam has given tremendous impetus to the ecumenical movement everywhere. A wealth of literature has been and is being prepared for information and discussion. The churches have demonstrated that a vital Christian unity can be achieved on the basis of our common loyalty to Christ without compromising our separate cherished convictions in the fundamentals of our faith.

#### 3—The Challenge of Amsterdam

In a debate which your pastor had with a Congregationalist leader in Boston on the proposed merger of our two denominations several years ago, my opponent said with much emphasis: "You cannot make a union by tying the tops of trees together." How true! Christian unity will not stand or fall by what is done at Amsterdam, but by what the Christian people will do about it in America and Europe and Asia and Africa.

We must think in terms of a world wide Christian church. We must forget our denominational slogans and shibboleths and truly feel ourselves a part of a world-wide church of

Christ. We must feel an awareness of brotherhood with Christian believers of every nation and every race.

At Albany I heard Bishop Oldham speaking on the World Council refer to a recent biography of Mahatma Gandhi in which it is related that a Christian missionary asked this Hindu saint how more people could be won for the Christian faith. Gandhi answered, "Practice what you believe!" This is equally true of our responsibility for promoting the ecumenical movement. We must show forth the ecumenical spirit in our attitudes to other Christians in our daily life.

We bring our observations to a close by quoting a paragraph from the message of the World Council at Amsterdam to the Christian people of the world:

"We bless God our Father, and our Lord Jesus Christ who gathers together in one the children of God that are scattered abroad. He has brought us here together at Amsterdam. We are one in acknowledging Him as our God and Saviour. We are divided from one another not only in matters of faith, order, and tradition, but also by pride of nation, class and race. But Christ has made us His own, and He is not divided. In seeking Him we find one another. Here at Amsterdam we have committed ourselves afresh to Him, and have covenanted with one another in constituting this World Council of Churches. We intend to stay together. We call upon Christian congregations everywhere to endorse and fulfill this covenant in their relations one with another. In thankfulness to God we commit the future to Him."

#### MY CHURCH

It is a justifiable surmise that too often Protestantism has been ineffectual in teaching its members the true meaning of the Church. Judging by the marked dissimilarity in the understanding and attitude of people in regard to the Church, it is not to be wondered at that there is such devaluing apathy and niggardly support among those who make up the mass of nominal members.

But those who know and love the Church think of it in these ways:

**My Church** is the custodian of "the faith which was once for all delivered unto the saints." In its history, traditions, ideals and sacraments the faith of the fathers has been preserved from generation to generation. I am the beneficiary of these spiritual blessings.

**My Church** offers spiritual renewal and refreshment, moral regeneration, and intellectual enlightenment through its services, teaching and fellowship. Through these my life is in the continuing process of development.

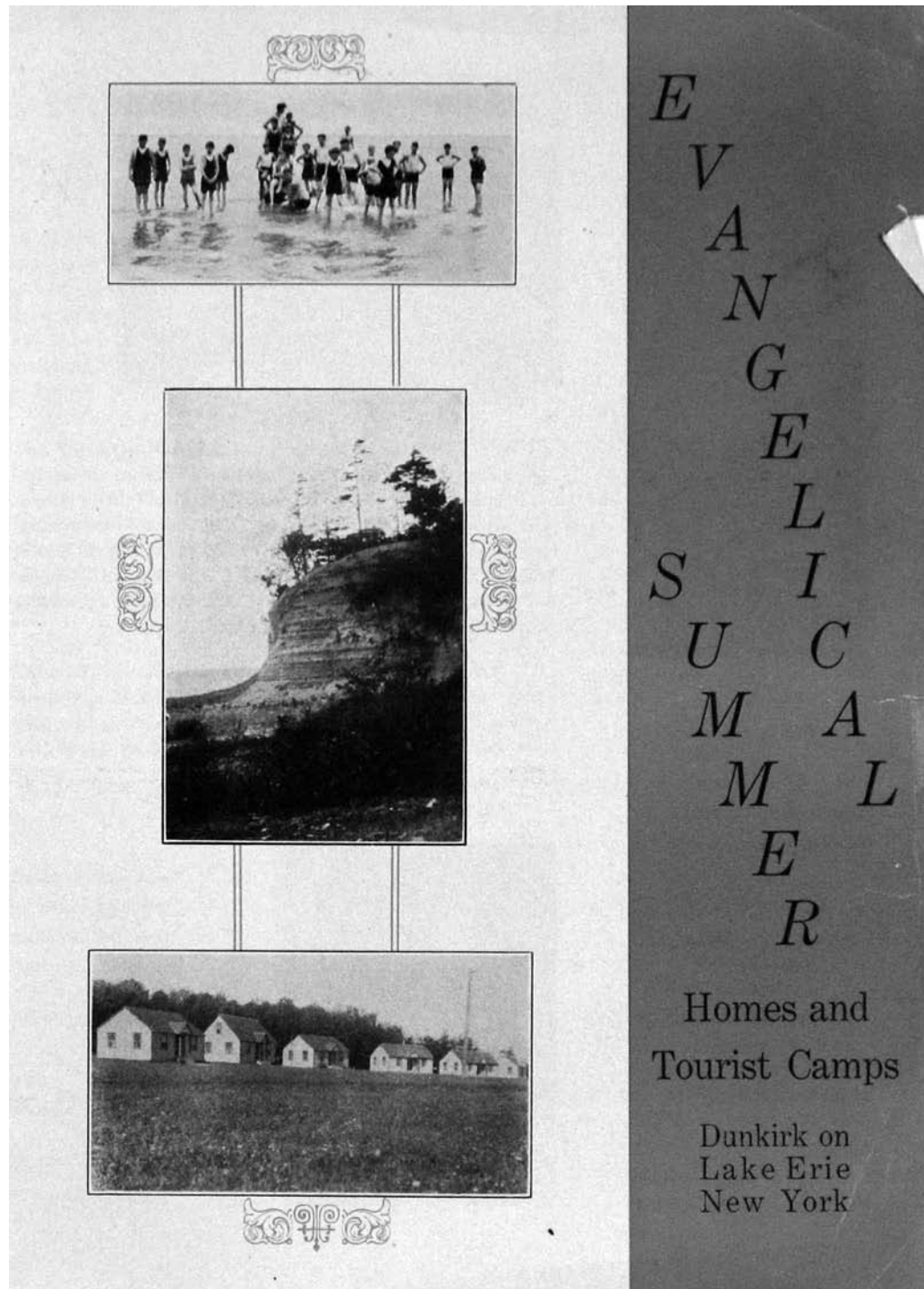
**My Church** is a training center, preparing its peoples to be "The Light of the World" and "The Salt of the Earth." Each member is to radiate light, beauty, goodness, love wherever he happens to be in action.

## In the Springtime

In the Spring a fuller crimson comes upon the robin's breast;

In the Spring the drugstore counter's piled with bottles big and brown;

Sarsaparilla, bitter tonics, sweetened tonics, herbs galore;

Now is the winter of our discontent  
 Made glorious summer by this sun of (New) York.

**T**AKING these liberties with Shakespeare and Tennyson, we may congratulate ourselves on emerging from the black pall of smoke that hangs over most of our

cities nowadays in the winter season, and facing the healthiest period of the year. The old tradition that there is some subtle influence in the springtime that saps our vitality, contributes to anemia and debility, and renders necessary spring tonics and invigorators, is an unadulterated superstition, but one that is hard to down.

The real situation is this: In the wintertime, the worst season of the year, when we are assailed by a multiplicity of deadly enemies, we accumulate disabilities and the springtime exhibits the hangover from them. If we are fortunate in living through the winter—which is really a piece of good fortune because winter is man's deadliest enemy—there are usually some scars of battle. The folly of taking spring tonics to remedy something that should have been prevented in November or December, is easy to demonstrate; but it is not so easy to take this lesson to heart and transmute it into intelligent action.

Of course the most sensible fundamental correction of this situation is to have the periodic health examination in the early fall, to find one's weak spots and repair the chinks in one's armor so that the coming battle with streptococci, micrococci catarrhalis, or "what have you," will be at least conducted on a plane of equality with these desperadoes. The next best thing is to have a periodic health examination after the battle is over and find out what scars it has left.

Yes, there is usually something to do in the spring—but it is not to buy a bottle of medicine. More likely it is to get out into the open and have sun baths and take normal exercise. Perhaps, in a fair number of cases, there is some medical supervision or treatment that will set one up. If the doctor orders a spring tonic, take it from him with confidence. There may be something in it that will really tone up the system. But to pay good money for bottles of colored water will do no good at all except perhaps in a very mild way to exert some psychic influence.

Why be a dumbbell? Why do something that is stupid and that has no warrant in scientific principle, instead of something that is supported as an intelligent measure of sound scientific effort? Unquestionably civilized man has not learned to adjust himself to the winter season in the temperate zones. He does not know how to live in the wintertime—in spite of his comforts. Every year the mortality and morbidity pile up in that season and but little impression is made upon them by preventive medicine. The best gift that preventive medicine could convey to the public would be some efficient means of preventing winter ills. That gift and the gift of prevention of the chronic organic diseases are the two big responsibilities that rest upon modern preventive medicine.

No doubt the degenerative diseases are favored by the yearly attacks of these winter enemies. Indeed, there is a vicious circle constituted by the organic damage inflicted by these winter ills, and the death rate among people who are organically damaged and yield to the acute diseases prevalent in wintertime, such as gripe and pneumonia.

Let the springtime be a season of house-cleaning but not by the taking of drugs—rather by considering one's ways of living and taking full advantage of the opportunities that are offered to live a really hygienic existence in adjustment with the world around us.

### Preparing Spinach Palatably

OUR recent reference to the whispering campaign being made against spinach has brought forth several comments from our readers. "All people and children in particular," says one, "would take much more readily

to eating spinach if it were prepared more palatably as they do in Central Europe, namely, chopped fine and seasoned with some fat and salt. Occasionally one comes across finely chopped spinach but only in 'creamed' form, in which form the characteristic spinach flavor is completely destroyed."

"Spinach is excellent when intelligently prepared," writes another reader. "But if creamed or macerated as the restaurants think they must do as evidence of the Gallic origin of the chef, then it is deserving of all the epithets in the calendar. Why don't you start a campaign for intelligence in cooking?"

While recognizing the health value of foods properly prepared, a "campaign for intelligence in cooking" is rather outside the field of this magazine. There are sound psychological reasons for catering to the sense of taste, and in order to establish in childhood, as well as in maturity, an appreciation of wholesome food, every effort should be made to prepare it as attractively and palatably as possible.

"The American Home Diet,"\* that valuable and practical guide for those interested in the proper preparation of foods and the fundamental facts concerning nutrition, says in reference to the preparation of spinach, that if it is not steamed it should be cooked in as little water as possible which method not only preserves the essential nutritive elements of the vegetable but its characteristic flavor.

### A Gift to Humanity

DR. Graham Lusk in a recent lecture on the use of insulin in the treatment of diabetes makes the following interesting observations:

"The picture of a diabetic boy, dying in coma, restored to health by the use of insulin is only one illustration of this precious gift to humanity. Insulin enables the body to oxidize sugar and therefore destroys diabetic acidosis; and it enables the deposition of glycogen in the liver. The oxidation of sugar limits the destruction of body protein. With all the great literature which has appeared upon the subject these are the fundamental facts. . . .

"Since the discovery of insulin it has been a matter of comparative ease to prepare patients for operation. Wilder and his associates report from the Mayo Clinic that there were 20 deaths in 667 operations upon diabetics, and that none of the deaths was attributable to the disease."

## How to Die Earlier

**"T**HERE is considerable available advice on how to live longer," says a leaflet issued by the George Washington Life Insurance Company, "but very little on how to die sooner. We feel that the time is opportune to present some simple, specific advice and instruction for those who really do care. We can guarantee that any person following these rules will be in his grave from ten to twenty years earlier than he would otherwise be."

Instruction to this end is presented in the following rules:

Avoid all possible contact with fresh air. Stay indoors in rooms with all windows closed and overheated. Sleep in rooms without any ventilation.

Heat your garage on cold mornings by running your automobile engine for an hour or two.

Make every effort to increase your abdominal girth beyond all normal measurements. Stuff yourself at all times, eating lots of sugar and several pounds of meat daily.

Take no exercise. Ride to and from your work. Don't ever cut the grass or clean off the snow.

Never take a vacation. And burn your candle at both ends, particularly when tired. (Fatigue furnishes a fertile field for tuberculosis.)

Always worry from morning until night—learn to enjoy it. If possible, stay awake to worry over things during the night.

Be as glum and sour as possible—don't ever play. Subdue and kill all sense of humor.

By all means, keep constipated. Drink no water at any time, and eat no fruit.

Should your tonsils be bad or your gums have pus, be glad and do nothing about it for these are forerunners of rheumatism, heart trouble and Bright's disease.

After age forty pay no attention to lumps that may suddenly appear and persist, or any other signs of cancer, for with prompt attention and care cancer can generally be checked or cured.

If you get out of breath easily, sleep poorly, feel run down most of the time, or experience pain, keep to these rules. At all times try to "get" some preventable disease or illness. Try to die.

If any one should tell you that you should have a health examination every year and visit your dentist regularly, tell him that you do not believe in such stuff. Tell him you want to be uncomfortable, inefficient, and short lived.

**Dr. William H. Burnham**, Professor Emeritus of Education and Mental Hygiene of Clark University, speaking at the conference of the Parents Council in Philadelphia, advised parents not to "rob children of their legitimate tasks," declaring that "the only sound method of giving the child success is to give him opportunity for worthwhile tasks, to be done in his own way." As a preventive for a harmful sense of inferiority, Dr. Burnham advocated group competition on a cooperative basis instead of individual rivalry.

## Defective Eyesight and Juvenile Delinquency

**I**NVESTIGATION by the Eyesight Conservation Council has shown that "bad eyes make bad boys," according to Mr. Guy A. Henry, General Director, and that the experience of juvenile courts proves that defective vision makes children truants. Each year more than 200,000 come before these courts, and eye conservation in the home and in the schools should be employed as a factor in checking criminal tendencies.

"Juvenile courts," Mr. Henry continued, "are finding that bad eyesight leads to inattention in school, to unfair competition, and to disrespect for authority. Bad eyes lead to truancy and the truant child is a criminal in embryo.

"Seventy-five per cent of all adult offenders start as criminals before they are twenty-one years old, and progress from petty to capital crimes is rapid. Parents must try to understand their children, for with understanding comes the explanation of wayward tendencies, which if uncorrected may develop unfortunate consequences even in the best of children.

"It has already been demonstrated that fully 25 per cent of the 24,000,000 school children of this country are suffering from manifest defective vision, and this situation is likely to grow worse if practical steps, with parents and teachers cooperating, are not taken. Much has been done by the Eyesight Conservation Council in the schools of the country, and much more will be done in the future, but lasting results are impossible without the aid of the home.

"It seems evident, from a general review of the entire subject of eyesight conservation, that approximately 25 per cent of all school children in the United States are retarded in their studies and that fully one-third of the retardations are in all probability due to defective vision. If this is correct, there are at least 2,000,000 school children in the United States one or more grades behind in their studies because of defective vision. The annual loss of retardation due to this cause alone," Mr. Henry concludes, "is about \$130,000,000."

## Popular Beliefs About Teeth Are Mostly Untrue

**P**OPULAR beliefs do not always coincide with scientific knowledge, and fallacies about the teeth are especially prevalent, probably because of the influence of tooth paste, dentifrice and chewing gum advertisements. Dr. W. M. Gardner debunks a long list of these in a recent issue of *Hygeia*. These are some of the things that he says are not true:

1. That gums normally bleed when the teeth are brushed.

2. That gums normally bleed because they are brushed too hard or because the brush is too stiff.
3. That the health of the mouth depends on the type of tooth paste used.
4. That decayed teeth are due to an acid condition of the stomach.
5. That chewing gum cleans and whitens teeth.
6. That pyorrhea is caused by a germ.
7. That antiseptics or germicides in the form of mouth washes can prevent or cure pyorrhea.
8. That bad breath can be corrected by means of mouth washes or mint flavored lozenges.
9. That mouth washes are deodorants.
10. That the bleaching agents on the market for whitening teeth can be safely used.

### Book Reviews and Notes

**PROHIBITION STILL AT ITS WORST.** By Professor Irving Fisher and H. Bruce Brougham. New York, Alcohol Information Committee. 358 pp. Price \$1.75.

**THIS** book, appearing so soon after Professor Fisher's original treatise "Prohibition at Its Worst," is of high value in that an attempt has been made to rule out any inconsistencies or inaccuracies that appeared in the earlier volume.

In a subject so complex and so difficult to investigate in a final way, it is but natural that inaccuracies and inconsistencies should appear in any such discussion. But no one will question the deep sincerity of the authors of this volume and their desire to present the actual facts for the consideration of the public.

After all it is along these lines that the liquor problem will be settled, if it is ever settled, that is, on the basis of full knowledge on the part of the public as to just what is going on in relation to alcoholic indulgence and what it means to society. In the final analysis, regardless of propagandists or of the views of various groups now debating this question, society at large will make the ultimate decision.

As pointed out in these columns before, alcohol has probably been used and abused by the human race for thirty thousand years and it is expecting a good deal that any experiment, however "noble," should offer a complete solution of the problem in the course of a few brief years. A vast amount of light is thrown directly upon this question in the present volume.

Those who think they detect any inconsistencies or inaccuracies in this book, we feel sure are welcome to bring these to the authors' attention, confident that any such criticism will be fairly considered and the matter in dispute investigated so far as may be.

In the final chapter, the following conclusions are expressed:

- (1) Present conditions of law enforcement under National Prohibition are intolerable and must be corrected.
- (2) Even so, they are not so dark as they have been painted. Moreover, if we do ultimately correct them, they are now in the nature of temporary evils, destined to fade away in a few years, while the good from Prohibition will go on indefinitely. Mrs. Elizabeth Tilton does well in calling attention to the length of time taken for the effectual prohibition of the African slave trade—from 1807, when it was legally abolished, to 1871, when the last act was passed to enforce the law. William Allen White points to the generation needed for making prohibition of the liquor traffic effective in Kansas. A period of eight years for the nation is short indeed, and, in view of the material and spiritual gains attainable, thrice that number of years spent in more effective enforcement and public education would be well rewarded.
- (3) Prohibition has already accomplished incalculable good, hygienically, economically, and socially.
- (4) Real personal liberty, the liberty to live and enjoy the full use of our faculties, is increased by Prohibition.
- (5) Light wines and beer cannot be legalized without another Constitutional Amendment.
- (6) No such Amendment can be passed.
- (7) All that the wets can possibly accomplish is laxity of enforcement, or nullification; in other words, enormously to increase the very disrespect for law which they profess to deplore.
- (8) Therefore, the only satisfactory solution lies in fuller enforcement.

Those who read the volume will form their conclusions variously based upon emotion, prejudice, interest, and what not. But no one can question the value of this book or fail to appreciate the industry and public spirit of the authors in presenting it for public consideration.

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**CULTIVATING THE CHILD'S APPETITE.** By Charles Anderson Aldrich, M.D. New York, The Macmillan Company, 1928. 127 pp. Price \$1.75.

**IN** the January, 1929, issue of *How to Live*, we quoted the *New England Journal of Medicine* and commented on this book. A close examination of the volume convinces us of its high value to parents.

The book has the merit of not scolding parents or ridiculing them for their insufficiencies, but rather dealing patiently with the grave problems that concern them in the behaviorism of children as related to their food habits. It is a helpful book leading the parent to a rational consideration of the child's needs and characteristics and we think that most cases of fastidious and difficult appetite in children can be met with profit by the suggestions in this book.

It is recognized that the child has a personality and that it is desirable for nurses and parents to have some rudimentary knowledge of psychology in order that the child may be dealt with intelligently and not forced into some narrow routine which may be the very worst possible thing for the child. It has the merit of being a short, simple discussion of these matters which the average parent can read with interest and profit. It is a good investment for any parent or any student of child needs.
