

Pastor Schmieder verlieh dem tiefen Dankesgefühl der Gemeinde mit folgenden Worten Ausdruck:

Mit tiefem Dank und großer Freude nehmen wir diese Bibel als Jubiläumsgruß und Gabe des hochgeehrten Präsidenten des Deutschen Reiches, Herrn Reichspräsidenten, Generalfeldmarschall von Hindenburg, in Empfang. Diese Jubiläumsgabe aus dem Lande unserer Väter, aus dem Lande Luthers, erhöht unser Festfreude.

In solchem Geschenk liegt mehr als nur ein Festgruß aus dem Lande, wo die Wiege unserer Väter stand. Es liegt darin ein offenes Bekenntnis zu Gottes Wort, eine stille Aufforderung an diese Gemeinde an diesem Worte festzuhalten, diesem Worte treu zu bleiben.

An dem Geschenk erkennt man den Geber. Die tiefe, schlichte Frömmigkeit des deutschen Reichspräsidenten ist uns bekannt. Sonntäglich ist er, so oft er in Berlin weilt, im Gottesdienst der Dreifaltigkeitskirche. Im Glauben ist er mit uns eins und bekennt sich mit uns zu dem Erbe Luthers.

Wie wir, so stellt auch er sich unter das 1. Hauptstück des lutherischen Katechismus: „Wir sollen Gott über alle Dinge fürchten, lieben und vertrauen.“

Wie wir, so bekennt auch er mit dem 2. Hauptstück: „Ich glaube, daß Jesus Christus, wahrhaftiger Gott, vom Vater in Ewigkeit geboren, und auch wahrhaftiger Mensch, vor der Jungfrau Maria geboren, sei mein Herr, der mich verlorenen und verdamten Menschen erlöset hat, erworben, und gewonnen von allen Sünden, vom Tod und von der Gewalt des Teufels, nicht mit Gold oder Silber, sondern Seinem heiligen, teuren Blut und mit Seinem unschuldigen Leiden und Sterben, auf daß ich sein eigen sei.“

Wie wir, so beugt auch er, der Große, dem millionen zujubeln, demütig seine Kniee, wie das 3. Hauptstück und lehrt: Vater Unser, der Du bist im Himmel, geheiligt werde Dein Name“.

Wie wir, so tröstet auch er sich seiner Taufe, und bekennt sich auch zum 5. Hauptstück und tritt an den Abendmahlstisch und findet Trost und Stärkung in dem Worte des Heilandes: „Für euch gegeben und

vergessen zur Vergebung der Sünden“.

Daß dieses Geschenk uns von solch frommem Gottesmann gestiftet wird, der sich hält an „Gottes Wort und Luthers Lehre“ macht es uns um so wertvoller und erhöht für uns den Sinn und die Bedeutung dieser Feiertage.

Wir danken ihm aus tiefstem Herzen. Wir bitten Sie, Herr Gerhardt Kiebow, durch ihr Konsulat in Buffalo, dem Herrn Reichspräsidenten, Generalfeldmarschall von Hindenburg, den Dank der Ev. Lutherischen St. Johannis Gemeinde übermitteln zu wollen.

Möge Gott Gnade geben, daß der Wunsch, der in der Widmung ausgesprochen ist, sich an dieser Gemeinde erfülle.

Und möge Gott in Gnaden geben, daß, wie in den vergangenen Jahren, so auch in den kommenden Jahren, Reichspräsident, Generalfeldmarschall von Hindenburg dem deutschen Volk zum Segen werde.

Nach einem Gebet des Pastors wurden im Anschluß an seine Worte der erste Vers „Ein feste Burg unser Gott“ und der 4. Vers „Daß Wort sie sollen lassen stehn“ angestimmt.

Rev. John Schmieder von der Matthäus-Kirche in Kitchener, Ont. Kanada hielt die deutsche Predigt, Rev. Samuel Tregler, der Präsident der Ber. Deutschen Synode von New York die englische.

Der deutsche Chor unter Leitung von C. Baumbach sang „Wie lieblich sind deine Wohnungen“ von Rhys-Herbert sowie die übrigen Lieder der Feier gemeinsam mit der Gemeinde, und mit dem Segen, einem stillen Gebet und dem Orgelnachspiel fand die würdige und erhebende Feier ihren Abschluß.

Die Kirche war aus Anlaß der Jubiläumsfeier in wunderbarer Weise dekoriert worden.

My mother has been "cleaning house" and found this 60th Anniversary booklet. I am not certain whether you are the same congregation or not, but we are assuming you have relocated. If not, maybe you know former members of this congregation who would be interested in this historical information.

To explain who I am, my uncle (father's brother) was Paul Schmeidler, and my grandfather, H.C. Schmeidler preached a sermon in the church in 1932, Nov. 6 for the rededication service. I myself attended the church as a child in the early 30's. My father died in 1978 and my mother is now 87. I have just retired from teaching 34 years at

Othara College in Othara, N.Y. and have come to Daytona to help care for my mother who has been ill. (I taught Biology there)

When uncle Paul's wife (Mild) died in the early 1980's, (His wife while in Rochester died many years ago of cancer) there was no one else to take the many photographs he had accumulated. so I have them and have given books to Belharmon Church in Phila. (his last church) many of those photos. I have some from Rochester as well and would like to bring a send them the next time I'm home in Othara. I would appreciate a response as to whether or not you are interested in them.

I hope this 60th anniversary booklet is of interest to you.




