





THE HISTORY OF ST. JOHN'S

1873 - 1948

In the fall of 1872, Zion Lutheran Church—the Mother Church of Rochester Lutheranism—saw the need of providing for its expanding membership in the northern part of the city. Consequently, a mission congregation was projected. The property at Joseph Avenue and Buchan Park was duly purchased and the Chapel, formerly used by the Methodists, became the first home of the mission. The Rev. Ernst Heydler, assistant pastor of Zion's Church, was placed in charge. The following year, on August 18, 1873, the congregation was formally organized with 69 members and adopted the name "Deutsche Evangelische Lutherische St. Johannis Gemeinde." Rev. Heydler was elected as the first pastor. In January, 1874, the building lot and the chapel were donated to the newly organized congregation by Zion's Church and the building of the new church was begun. A parochial school, with 131 children enrolled, was established.

In June, 1874, during the meeting of the Synod at Zion's Church, the corner-stone was laid. Pastors Von Rosenberg, Grotel, Stahlschmidt, Kuss and Erhardt officiated at the well-attended service. Enthusiasm for the new work was great and the membership grew rapidly. The members, all of whom were of the immigrant working class, labored industriously and brought many sacrifices. The Synod encouraged the young congregation and gave every assistance possible. The basement of the new building was occupied for the first time on November 29, 1874 and the dedication of the completed church was held on June 27, 1875. Pastors Halfman and Gomph preached at the dedication services. It was a time of great joy and the congregation now grew in numbers. Reports show that at the time of dedication there were over 500 families affiliated with St. John's. But the wave of prosperity and enthusiasm soon began to wane. Large bills became due and payments could not be met. Many of the members became discouraged; pledges were not paid and the membership began to dwindle. The outlook was dark and it appeared that this new venture, begun so gloriously, was doomed to failure. In September, 1877, Pastor Heydler resigned and with his leaving many more members left the congregation. The faithful few remained and this group became the nucleus of the St. John's which we know today.

In September, 1878, the Rev. John Muehlhauser was called as pastor and now again the future looked brighter. Addition of two rooms was made to the school house and a second-hand organ was purchased. Pastor Muehlhauser remained only six years, resigning in 1884. He had organized St. Matthew's Church on Morris Street and with it joined the Missouri Lutheran Synod.

The Rev. John Rechtsteiner was then called as pastor. His was a short pastorate of only three years. During those years, however, there was a real increase in membership and improvements in decorating and lighting the interior of the church were made. Pastor Rechtsteiner resigned in 1887 in order to assume the Presidency of Wagner College, then in its early years in Rochester.

In August of that same year, the Rev. Dr. John Nicum of Syracuse, N. Y. was called as pastor and assumed his office on October 16, 1887. A great task faced the new pastor. Much work needed to be done; the indebtedness of the congregation amounted to nearly \$30,000—truly a large sum for those

days. This was the period of reorganization for the developing congregation. St. John's had called the right man. Under the energetic leadership of Dr. Nicum much was accomplished. In the year 1891 the beautiful spires were added to complete the church building, the clock was installed and three bells were hung, a new cement walk was laid around the entire property. The parochial school, which had been discontinued, was begun again. By 1896 the good news could be proclaimed that through the self-sacrifice of its members and the excellent cooperation of the organizations the entire debt of St. John's had been paid. The year 1897 beheld further improvements in the church by the installation of a new gas reflector and the redecoration of the interior. 1898 was marked by the meeting of the Synod in St. John's. On August 21st a fitting celebration of the 25th Anniversary was held at which Pastors Richter, Hartman, Rechtsteiner and Junge preached. In 1904 the installation and dedication of the new pipe organ and the beautiful altar were possible. The weekly envelope system was introduced at this time.

After 22 years of leadership at St. John's, Dr. Nimum died on November 1, 1909. In his will he bequeathed the Morris Street Parsonage to St. John's Church. The Rev. Edward Quade, a son of St. John's, served as supply pastor until April 1, 1910 when the Rev. Andrew Blum of Lancaster, N. Y. entered upon his duties as the new pastor.

The church basement was renovated in 1911. In the same year regular evening English Services were introduced. On November 30, 1913 the congregation celebrated the 40th Anniversary with appropriate services. The following year the English Service was made a part of the morning schedule. The year 1914 saw the addition of two figured windows, given in memory of Mr. and Mrs. C. Schnackel. Other new windows followed in 1918, gifts of individual members and organizations. During the Golden Jubilee year—1923—the renovated church, together with a most beautiful pulpit and lectern, given by Mrs. J. Nicum in memory of Dr. Nicum, as well as chimes, organ stops and other gifts were dedeciated. The Jubilee was fittingly celebrated on October 14th.

The title to the church property was cleared by Zion's Church in 1925. This fact encouraged the congregation and made possible the project of relocating the parsonage. In order to provide a more congenial environment for the pastor, a modern home was built at 39 Alcazar Street, two miles north of the church. Pastor and Mrs. Blum moved in on August 11, 1925.

In 1928 the new church doors were installed and a clarinet stop added to the organ. The basement of the church was again remodeled in 1929 and improvements made to the kitchen. The Birthday Bank offerings of the Church School made possible also the addition of the Baptismal Font.

After a severe illness, Pastor Blum, who had served faithfully for twenty years, was called to eternal life on July 1, 1930. Pastors Reichert and Lampe served as supply pastors during most of the year 1930. On January 1, 1931, Pastor Paul Schmieder, who had been called from Philadelphia, Pa., entered upon the duties of the new pastor. During that year, a new roof was put on the church and the choir was vested. In 1932 considerable damage was wrought upon the church by lightning. This proved to be a blessing for not only was the damage completely covered by insurance, but it made possible the complete redecoration of the interior. A new lightning system was also installed. The famous "Diamond Chart" was used with great success to raise the necessary funds. Rededication Services were held on November 6th at which the Rev. H. C. Schmieder (father of the pastor) and the Rev. Paul A.

Kirsch (brother of our present pastor) preached. At the evening service, greetings were brought by Pastors F. Knubel and E. Heyd.

In 1933, the Women's Missionary Society was organized and shortly thereafter the Luther League came into existence.

Pastor Schmieder's zeal for beauty and his appreciation for the best in church worship inspired many new features in the Church Services. The system of a rotating church council was introduced. The Building Fund and the Endowment Fund were established. The 60th Anniversary was observed on November 5, 1933, at which time an Historical Booklet was issued. Pastor John Schmieder (brother of the pastor) and Dr. Samuel Trexler were the anniversary preachers.

For a few months during 1943 St. John's benefitted by the services of Pastor Harold Haas who assisted the pastor and organized the youth work of the congregation.

After a ministry of almost 14 years, Pastor Schmieder offered his resignation in order to accept the pastorate of the Bethanien Lutheran Church in Roxborough, Philadelphia, Pa. where his father had served for almost 30 years. Pastor Schmieder left on November 1, 1944. For the next nine months the congregation was supplied by various pastors, chief among them Pastors A. Roeder and E. Goetz.

On August 1, 1945 the present pastor—John A. W. Kirsch—who had been called from St. Mark's Church in Elizabeth, New Jersey, assumed his duties. It is significant to note that our present pastor is the first in 58 years to have a family. In the brief period of three years Pastor Kirsch and his family have endeared themselves to all of us.

A most significant decision was reached by the congregation at its annual meeting in December, 1946 when, after a year's study had been made, it was voted to re-locate the church property. It was felt that the future development of the congregational life and service could be best served in a new location and that expansion and improvement of the church's facilities required a more desirable location. In order to prepare for the time of re-location and building a New Building Fund Program was begun. The Kirby-Smith Associates were engaged to conduct a complete visitation of the congregation and to solicit pledges. This was done during the weeks of January 26th to February 6, 1948 and proved a great success. Over \$42,000 was pledged over a period of three years. A special Building Committee was appointed. This committee has made prolonged and earnest efforts to obtain the proper site. As we await the time for the new building operations, we look to the members of the congregation to fulfill their promises by sacrificial sharing.

The 75th Anniversary, which we celebrate in a year of great national and international tensions, finds us grateful to God who has guided and blessed our beloved church on its journey. We seek to be loyal and confident as we face the challenge of this generation. We thank God for the noble souls who have labored here before us and we salute the stalwart and faithful ones of today. As we share the fruits of their labors may we be worthy sons and daughters of a Greater St. John's!
