Bejinget Gottes Bundertat, Die er vor viermal hundert Jahren Durch Luther ausgerichtet hat, Laßt wiederum die Belt erjahren: Es stehet wie ein Fels im Meer Das Wort des HErrn und Luthers Lehr'!

Im Mittelpunkte des Interesses in protestantischen Kreisen überall steht gegenwärtig die Feier des 400jährigen Jubiläums der Reformation. Jeder protestantische Christ sollte mit der weittragenden Bedeutung dieser Feier vertraut sein. Der nachfolgende, aus der "Abendschule" entnommene Artikel möge die Ausmerksamkeit unserer Leser beanspruchen:

Ein Bendepunkt der Beit brach an für alle Welt, als vor 400 Jahren — am 31. Oftober 1517 - Luther an der Schloßfirche ju Bittenberg in Sadyfen feine 95 Thefen wider ben Ablagunfug anfchlug. Es waren 95 Rägel in den Sarg eines entarteten Chriftentums! Der Biderhall feiner hammerichläge flang alljährlich und flingt sonderlich am 400jährigen Reformations . Jubiläum weit und breit in der ganzen Belt in den Serzen und den Lob. und Danfliedern aller, die fich der durch Luther ihnen wiedergegebenen offenen Bibel und damit der Fundamentallehre von der Rechtfertigung eines Günders vor Gott, nämlich des freien Seils durch Gnade, freuen und tröften und denen damit die religiöfe und zugleich die bürgerliche Freiheit zuteil geworden ift. Daß Luther ein Deutscher war - wahrlich, das Deutschtum der gangen Belt hat allen Grund, darauf ftolg zu fein! Reine andere Nationalität hat einen Mann von gleider Beiftesgewalt aufzuweifen. Selbft wenn er feine Sache nicht zum Siege geführt hätte - und er hatte in dem Papft und feinen 2011ierten gegen eine hierarchie und Beltmacht sondergleichen zu fämpfen—, schon seine un-beugsame Lapferkeit, sein Glaubenshelden-nut, seine gottesgewisse Versönlichkeit, schon der Schlaghammer feiner Rede, der den Deutichen die flangvolle Sprache ichmiedete, mürde ausreichen, ihn ju einem der größten der Menichenfinder ju machen. Aber er ift weit mehr

als der eherne Held, als der ungebrochene Kämpfer, er ist, mit einem Worte, der Neformator. Und damit gehört er keineswegs dem Deutschum allein, sondorn der ganzen Welt; er hat das Christentum nicht bloß für das deutsche Volk, sondern für die Menschheit gerettet. Bibt es überhaupt noch in der Welt eine "Humanith" und "Democracy", gibt es auf Erden noch heute christliche Lehre und wahres Christehren, daraus alle Segnungen für die Menschen, – durch die Reformation sind sie geworden!

Der amerikanische Staatsmann John Jay schreibt (1883): Kein Land hat mehr Ursache als diese Republik, sich mit Dankbarkeit der Segnungen zu erinnern, welche Luther sür die Welt erringen half durch seine Berteidigung der Gedanken- und Gewissenscheit. Obgleich zur Zeit seiner Geburt Amerika noch nicht entdeckt war, so ist doch sein weitreichender Einfluß verte sühlbar vom Atlantischen dis zum Sullen Meere und half den nördlichen Kontinent mit Kolonisten Bevölken, welche auf Grund der biblischen Wahrheiten für die Freiheit das Fundament legten."

Ohne die Reformation würde in Europa, wie in Italien, Spanien und Portugal, noch heute der Papit herrichen, Nordamerifa würde wie die füdamerikanischen Länder, wo erst feit furzem das Licht der Reformation in Brafilien erstrahlt, noch heute unter feiner Sertschaft stehen. Luther war der erste, welcher feit taufend Jahren das Bort des SErrn: "Gebet dem Raifer, was des Raifers ift, und Bott, was Bottes ift," und: "Dein Reich ift nicht von diefer Welt", wieder dahin auslegte, daß Rirche und Staat getrennt fein follen. Luthers Schriften drangen nicht nur nach Eng. land, von England fam auch ein 28m. Tindale an Luther nach Bittenberg und übersette dort, in Köln, Worms und Marburg die Bibel (Ring James oder Authorized Bible), und gerade die Gründer unferer Republif, die aus England famen und die Unabhängigkeits. erflärung erliegen, ftellten an die Spite der Landesverfaffung den Grundfat, "daß alle Menfchen gleich erschaffen und mit unveräußerlichen Rechten ausgestattet find, zu welchen Leben und Freiheit gehören; und um dieje Rechte zu sichern, find Regierungen zu errichten, die ihre rechtmäßige Gewalt von der Bu-ftimmung der Regierten erhalten müffen." Bober hatten dieje Staatsmänner folche Erfenntnis? Etwa von Rom, der Belt-Sierarchie? Die bürgerliche Freiheit dämmerte, als Luther feine 95 bahnbrechenden Thefen an-

fchlug, aus dem quillenden Borne ber Beiligen Edrift entftrömte auch fie ben Böltern! Doch fie war nicht Gottes größte Gnadentat, die Luther als Gottes Rüftzeug ber Belt wiedergeben durfte. "Die Rrone feiner Lehre", fagt fehr treffend Dr. C. G. Barth, "welche feitdem das Kleinod der mahren evangelischen Rirche geblieben ift, war das, daß er der eigenen Bertgerechtigfeit Stumpf und Stiel ausrottete und den Glauben an die freie Gnabe Bottes in Chrifto 3Efu, der die Gottlofen gerecht macht, an ihre Stelle pflanzte. Seines namens und feines Bertes wird nicht vergeffen werden, fo lange es Chriften gibt, die burd Gottes Bort fich leiten laffen auf ihrem Bege." Mit der Reformation trat ein Bendepunft der Beit ein. Bendezeiten find aber oft behende Beiten, von denen das Bohl oder Behe von Sahrtaufenden abhängen tann. Auf der Beitenwage werden gegenwärtig durch ben ichaurigften Beltfrieg alle Bölfer der Erde gewogen: fie alle find direft oder indireft in Mitleidenschaft gezogen. Und an dem Bünglein der Zeitenwage hängt in diefer letten Gnadenzeit für alle Mitbeteiligten und alle Mitleidenben die eine, gleiche Sauptfrage: Goll es fich neigen auf die Seite des Fürften Diefer Belt, der wie noch nie mit einem Lügenfeldzug fie heute durchgiftet, oder auf die Seite 3Efu und feines Reiches? Sammerfchläge von Bittenberg, dröhnet, dröhnet wieder durch alle Belt, dröhnet jubilierend nach 400 Jahren! Bott ließ "einen Engel fliegen mitten durch den Simmel, der hatte ein ewig Evangelium, au verfündigen denen, die auf Erden figen und wohnen, und allen Seiden und Geichlechtern und Sprachen und Bölfern; und fprach mit großer Stimme: Fürchtet Gott und gebet ihm Die Ehre, denn die Beit feines Gerichts ift fommen, und betet an den, der gemacht hat Simmel und Erde und Meer und die Bafferbrunnen."

Longfellow, einer unferer besten Dichter, schrieb einft (in "Arfenal at Springfield"):

- Were half the power that fills the world with terror,
- Were half the wealth bestowed on camps and forts.
- Given to redeem the human mind from error, There were no need of arsenals and forts.

Mit Rübeln schöpft heute Mars hüben und drüben das Geld aus dem Borne der Volksvermögen, um es in den gurgelnden Schlund eines Ungeheuers zu schütten, das mit uner-

Nichtsdestoweniger sind wir der guten Zuversicht, daß uns der bevorstehende Sommer mitten in der Arbeit finden wird.

Nur die Liebe zur Sache fann die Glieder des Komites vor der Ermüdung in den beständigen Opfern an Zeit und Kraft bewahren. 

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HISTORICAL

- 1862—February 18th. St. Paul's Evangelical Church organized. Charter membership 40. September 3rd. Present church building on North Fitzhugh Street dedicated.
- 1905—A modernly equipped Sunday School Building was constructed at rear of Church building.
- 1915—July. Because of the encroachment of business and the character of the community becoming essentially commercial, unanimous decision to seek a new and more promising field of activity and also to offer for sale the church property on Fitzhugh Street was adopted.

November. Lot purchased and Chapel established and regular church services begun at corner Norton and Jewel Streets. The tremendous success which has attended the efforts of this Chapel organization is a justification that the Congregation has acted wisely and well in proposing the removal from the downtown section to the new location.

1917—January. A campaign to raise \$10,000 proposed to be added to the \$25,000 now held by the Church Trustees in realty holdings and available assets.

NEW LOCATION

Corner Norton and Jewel Streets. Size of lot 213 x 143 feet. This location is at a strategic point in a rapidly growing section of the city of Rochester; St. Paul's is the only church organization in the midst of five thousand people living within the territory bounded by Clinton Avenue on the cast; Avenue A on the south; St. Paul street on the west; and the Ridge Road on the north—a territory comprising two square miles.

FIELD

Possibly no greater field of endeavor is so promising and fertile in Rochester to-day. Practically all the citizenship is made up of native-born Americans, thrifty and progressive, in this purely residential section. A test of the field has been made; regular well attended chapel services for the last fifteen months and a present enrollment of one hundred and twenty-five children in the Sunday School, representing parents of several denominations, Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist, Episcopal, and many children who have never been identified with any church Sunday School, confirm the test. The people of this community, regardless of denomination or church affiliation, are heartily rejoicing over the prospect of this new church building in their midst inasmuch as distance, carfare and time are elements in their consideration.

BUILDING PLANS

The building plans as now formulated call for a modern, fireproof structure of brick with concrete and stone foundation; the main entrance being at the corner facing Norton Street. The addition of a modern, up-to-date Sunday School building to be postponed some years until needs become so pressing that additional room is imperative. The dimensions of Church Auditorium proper to be 76 feet front on Norton Street with a depth of 82 feet on Jewel Street.


BASEMENT plan consists of accommodations for Sunday School work, being divided off into three large apartments with rolling doors between so that they can be made into one. Primary department, 17 x 45 feet; Junior department 30 x 64 feet; Intermediate department, 17 x 50 feet. These rooms also will be used as dining room and social parlors. A modern, well equipped kitchen, 12 x 22 feet, with serving room, 12 x 17 feet to be featured also; a trustees' room, 17 x 20 feet, will also feature the basement. Adequate place having been allowed for Janitor's room and coal bin. AUDITORIUM will consist of a circular amphi-theatre seating upon an inclined floor with capacity for 500, with gallery 155 extra. The Chancel, located in the side center, will include altar, pulpit, choir and organ; to the left will be the pastor's study, 10 x 14 feet; to the right the choir room, 10 x 18 feet. The south side of the building proper to be constructed in a temporary manner, thus making allowance for the addition of Sunday School building in future years.


CHURCH GOVERNMENT


St. Paul's Evangelical Church belongs to that branch of the Protestant Church known as the German Evangelical Synod of North America. As a church it is in alignment with the Lutheran Church of America (both German and English) and the Reformed Church of America and in its government and policy very much akin to the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. In Rochester, there are four churches of this same denomination, as follows:

St. Paul's Evangelical Church. Salem Evangelical Church. Trinity Evangelical Church. Christ Evangelical Church.

The Map constitutes the major portion of our field: although in all directions beyond the map boundary we have children and parents living, identified with the present chapel organization.

Not a church of any denomination within the boundaries indicated above; the residents of the southern 5th Ward and the western 17th Ward, regardless of denomination, are welcoming most heartily St. Paul's Church and its activities into their midst.



The City

The city is at once an ancient and a modern problem. It has always been an essential factor in the civilization of the world. In the Old Testament times the center of interest lay around three great cities, Jerusalem, Nineveh and Babylon. In New Testament days, besides Jerusalem, there come into view Antioch, Ephesus, Corinth, Rome. Later in the history of the Church great controversies centered in Rome, Constantinople, Alexandria, and in the great cities on the Continent of Europe and in Great Britain. In America the same situation has prevailed. "As goes the city, so goes the country." In this country we have today fourteen cities with a population of more than half a million each, and seven of these have more than a million each. More than half the population in the United States lives in the cities. The growth of the city is one of the marvels of our day. Everywhere cities are extending their boundaries and are taking in large areas of suburban communities.

Many factors are contributing to this changing condition in our present civilization. Our great industries, our shops and factories are practically all located in our cities. Modern social life with its attractions and diversions brings multitudes to the city. This massing of the people in great centers has come to be a permanent thing.

Here crime is prevalent, here lawlessness prevails, here worldliness predominates. Unless the city can be saved our civilization is doomed. 

The Church in the City

THE SUPERINTENDENT—The Church faces a serious problem in the city. How to provide adequate religious facilities for these ever increasing and rapidly changing masses of city population taxes the full resources of the Church of Christ. In many instances the Church is scarcely equal to the task. Once flourishing churches find themselves stranded in the maelstrom of this seething life. Others find it necessary to change their programs and methods of approach. But nowhere in our cities has the Church kept pace with the growing population. Most of our large cities have today Councils or Federations of Churches which seek to apply principles of Comity between the different denominations and to allocate fields of responsibility to the various churches so that cooperatively the Church may provide adequate religious facilities for the people and make a united impact upon these communities. All this demands a new type of leadership, adequate equipment, a staff of workers and large sums of money. Unless the Church is prepared to make this investment of life and money it will not be able

Yet the Church is set to be the spiritual force in human society. It must lift up worth while ideals and create the atmosphere in which such ideals may prevail. It must seek to make our cities the city of our God.

Has the Reformed Church a contribution to make to the salvation of the city? We have missed many golden opportunities because of lack of vision, of men and of money. But even now, if we will, we may contribute our part. Of the 287 Missions on the Roll of the Board of Home Missions, by far the greater majority are located in our cities. It seems unfortunate that at a time when so many calls come to us the resources are not at hand to respond to the same. The importance and the bigness of the task have never captured the imagination of our people.

The Dewey Avenue Mission

THE PASTOR—The Board of Home Missions is making a demonstration of city work in the great and growing center of Rochester, New York. In 1912 it established a mission in the northwestern section at the corner of Dewey Avenue and Flower City Park. It is a most excellent location in a rapidly developing community, a few blocks away from the Eastman Kodak plant, which employs many thousands of workers. The work was started in a temporary frame chapel. This soon gave way to a brick structure which forms the Sunday School unit of the plant. The time is now come when the main body of the church must be provided. The congregation numbers 128 members with a Sunday School enrollment of 202. To erect the needed church building \$65,000 will be required. The members alone cannot furnish this amount of money. They have, however, already secured in pledges the sum of \$15,000. The Board of Home Missions has pledged the Reformed Church to match this special Home Mission Day Service. This should be an easy matter for the 1,100 Sunday Schools of the Reformed Church. If the Dewey Avenue Mission is furnished an adequate plant it can command the attention of the community for which it has assumed responsibility and minister in a more effective way to the spiritual life of the people who live under its shadow. Other Phases of Home Mission Work

TEACHER OF ADULT BIBLE CLASS—The Board of Home Missions has a vast and varied work entrusted to it. Its Missions are widely scattered throughout the United States and Canada. It preaches the Gospel in seven different languages and carries forward a successful work among English, German, Hungarian, Czech, Japanese and Indian people. It operates a Church Building Department through which it assists Mission Churches to build suitable houses of worship. It works through a Department of Evangelism through which it seeks to win members for the Church and to vitalize the spiritual life of all of our people. The year 1930 marks the 1900th Anniversary of Pentecost and this furnishes a suitable occasion to deepen the springs of our religious life. The Board also maintains a Department of Country Life which makes direct contacts with rural churches, aiding them in the solution of some of their problems. Through a Commission on Social Service the Board seeks to apply the principles of Christianized and the vision of the City of God realized on earth. To make America a Christian Nation is the supreme ambition and effort of the Board of Home Missions.



He was pastor of the Texan church for three years, during which time he met and married a young German lady, who was born in a town only half an hour's journey from his own birthplace.

NEW CHURCH

Many fond memories and happy recollections that tied the people to Old St. Paul's made the "farewell" difficult. For three years worship services were held in a small portable chapel located on the side of the present edifice. Many became discouraged with the new venture, and sought other church homes. Transplanting anything, be it a flower, a tree, or a church, is a precarious undertaking fraught with many difficulties—but a loyal handful persevered. Additional members won in the new field gave strength and encouragement.

In 1922, the cornerstone of the new church was laid, and in June of the following year, the newly elected pastor, the Rev. Herman E. Koenig, dedicated "New St. Paul's." The new church represented an outlay of about \$100,000, half of which was covered by the amount realized from the sale of the old property and by pledges made by members. A reorganized Sunday School and numerous organizations came into being to meet the needs of a residential community. More than 400 new members have been added to the church in the ten years of its ministry on the new site. The debt on the church and parsonage has been steadily reduced until only \$30,700 remains. Birthday gifts are being collected for the "Church Treasure Chest" through anniversary banks, of which 700 have been distributed.

THE PASTOR ELMER HENRY HOEFER, B.A., B.D.

The present pastor reversed the advice, "Go West, young man, go West," and came East from Illinois, where he had served since his graduation with the Diamond Jubilee Class of Eden Seminary in 1925. The pastor represents the third generation of Hoefers that have served in the Ministry of the Evangelical Synod. Elmhurst College and Washington University gave him his academic training. His theological studies were pursued in Eden Seminary, St. Louis, Mo., and in Berlin and Tuebingen Universities, Germany. St. Paul's is the field of his second pastorate, and among ministers who have served this church, he is the eleventh. Since his assuming the pastorate of St. Paul's, in 1929, a fine spirit of loyalty and cooperation, characteristic of the church through many years, has been accorded him, making the continued growth and development of the church inevitable. 188 new menbers have been received by letter or by confession of faith in addition to 59 confirmands.

TWENTY YEARS AGO TODAY December 12, 1915 Highest temperature, 29 degrees; lowest, 16 degrees. The chapel erected at St. Paul Street and Northview Terrace by St. Paul's German Evangelical Church was dedicated at a service in which the Rev. Richard Stave and Herbert P. Lansdale of the Y. M. C. A. took part. Governor David I. Walsh of Massachusetts, addressed a mass meeting at Convention Hall under the direction of the Catholic Men's Charitable League. He was introduced by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey.

"There is a Santa Claus!" At least that it what the members of St. Paul's Evangelical Church, Rochester, N. Y., wanted to tell the world, when the pastor, Elmer Henry Hoefer, announced among other Christmas gifts received by the church, one of \$10,000 from the estate of Elizabetha Fisher. The presentation was made by Philip Fisher, a brother. St. Paul's church, built in 1922, has carried a considerable debt-load. Thanks to this gift, and to the receipts from campaign pledges and special offerings, this debt has been reduced from \$46,000 to \$16,000 within ten years. The experience of this church has been that when the larger Kingdom causes, such as the synodical budget, are given first concern, God will take care of the local needs. Since we have definitely pledged to raise the synodical quotas in full, there has never been a deficit in current expense funds for maintainance of the local church work.


The six Evangelical and Reformed churches of Rochester, N. Y., report participation in a Loyalty Crusade sponsored by the Rochester Federation of Churches including more than a hundred churches. The Crusade was an adaptation of the visitation evangelism plans that in recent years have been supplanting the mass revival meetings.


In preparation for the Crusade, mass meetings for the church councils of all churches, women's organizations, brotherhoods and Sunday school workers were held. Nearly 1,400 members of official boards sat down together at a dinner in the Bausch and Lomb dining room to discuss the things of interest for Protestantism in Monroe County. So far as anyone knew, this was the first time that a gathering of this type had ever been arranged. The mass meeting of Sunday school workers took place in Salem Church, and nearly filled that spacious auditorium.

Each of the seven Sundays of the Crusade had a special name and emphasis. The first Sunday was designated "Roll-Call Sunday." Every church had mustered visitation committees who called upon all church members leaving with them roll-call cards which were to be signed and brought to church on the following Sunday. The effort met with unexpected success. Churches were crowded to overflowing, one of our churches having to install loud speakers to carry the message to the overflow crowd shunted into the Sunday school hall. Other Sundays followed in the order of "Family Sunday," "Neighbor Day," "Symphony Sunday," "Stewardship Day," "Recruiting Sunday" and "Goal Day." The Revs. George Dowey and Ira Vayinger were directors of the Crusade.

Though the enthusiasm of the first Sunday of the Crusade failed to carry through until the last, yet there were ample rewards that justified this united movement to stir the church people of our community. New members were added to the churches; church finances were given a decided lift; church attendance showed an average 50% increase; and a new sense of working together for a common goal has been generated among the Protestant churches. The success of the plan was due to able leadership, carefully planned programs, the regular visitation of members by the Crusading teams, and the spirit of expecting great things from God, if men would lend themselves wholeheartedly to his cause. 
Ordination Scheduled **J** At St. Paul's





City's Head Fuddy and Somewhat Unplowed on Fourth Day of Battle with Snow 1944












Many motorists disregarded officials' warning not to park in streets. This view looks south in Exchange Street from Broad.








Herewith three proofs of work I did the other day when you were away.

Interior is good, needs a bit of dodging. Probably should use more of negative on sides for P.C. proportion, since you probably want as much of the ceiling and as much of the pews showing as is shown on this 5x7. The two front windows can be printed in a bit more and two dark areas either side of altar where you have the two secrements should be held back a bit so as to be lighter. This is a straight print, no dodging.

EXTERIOR; - that was a head-ache. I thought your building faced West toward the river, so went down in the middle of the afternoon. It was a bit overcast now and then, but by the time I got mother to the Doc. and down to your church it ceased to be overcast. A Great Artist

The career and achievements of Charles Paul Gruppe constitute a more eloquent tribute to genius and industry than any editorial writer can pen.

Although a native of Ontario and the last years of his life were spent far from this city, Rochester can claim this distinguished landscape and portrait artist as its own. His youth and young manhood were spent here; he took a Western New York woman, Miss Helen Mitchell, for his wife; and his daughter and two sisters are still residents of Rochester.

Mr. Gruppe celebrated his 80th birthday anniversary on Sept. 3. But to him birthdays were of passing interest. His work was all that counted and he never thought age was any reason for resting on the laurels he had won.

It was only two years ago that he remarked "I never expect to reach my peak."

This was not uttered in any spirit of braggadocio, but only expressed a warranted confidence that he still had within himself greater things than he had yet accomplished.

Mr. Gruppe was an artist whose work the layman can enjoy. As Miss Croughton, The Times-Union's art critic wrote in her appreciation of him, he had no love for the so-called "modern" color and distortion of form.


Pastor Marks 15th Milestone

Evangelical Pastor Resigns Post

The Rev. Elmer H. Hoefer, pastor of St. Paul's Evangelical and Reformed Church, Norton near St. Paul, has resigned after 16 years of service to accept a pastorate at St. Peter's Church, St. Louis, Mo., it was announced today.

The congregation voted last night to accept, with regret, the resignation of the Rev. Mr. Hoefer, who has been active in many Rochester church activities.



ing. St. Paul's took its place as a separate church in 1862 when the Rev. P. H. Conradi and a group of members seceded from Trinity Evangelical and Reformed Chur-ch. A new church was built on a site in North Fitzhugh Street next to Brick Presbyterian Chur-ch. That building is now Carpen-ters' Hall, sold in 1919, 57 years after its dedication on Septem-ber 21, 1862. Indicative of the relatively low

Indicative of the relatively low costs of those times was the es-tablishment of a parochial school with a tuition fee of six cents per student. Maintained for thirty years, the school was finally abanded because of the expense invol-ved in operation. Further hinting at the lower economic level was the salary of the second pastor, the Rev. John Ulrich Hoffman-\$550 a year.

Other pastors of the church were as follows: The Rev. Fred-erick Heinle, the Rev. Albert Zel-ler, the Rev. William Baur, the Rev. H. F. Grotefend, the Rev. F. D. Oberkircher, the Rev. Rich-ard Steve the Rev. Harmon Key ard Stave, the Rev. Herman Koe-nig, and the present pastor, the Rev. Elmer Henry Hoefer.

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It was the Rev. Oberkircher, conversant with both German and English, who introduced the latter language into the services, effecting a compromise between old-fecting a compromise between old-er and younger members by hav-ing services in each language. It was the first time that English had been used in the services in half a contury


had been used in the services in half a century. The new \$100,000 church was dedicated in 1923 at the same time that the Rev. Koenig was in-stalled. Situated at Norton and Jewel Streets, it grew out of a desire to move out of the down-town area and had its origin in a chapel erected at Northview Terrace and St. Paul Street, soon torn down because of building re-strictions. strictions.

With 400 new members added in the past eight years and the debt greatly reduced through var-

debt greatly reduced through var-ious campaigns, the church is be-ing aided materially by its vari-ous organizations. Included in the organizations are: the Altar Society, founded seventy years ago, consisting of women; the Brotherhood, a men's class; Senior and Junior Leagues, for the youth of the church; the Symposium, a group meeting monthly and consisting of young-er married couples and youths; an Old Timers Club, and a scout troop. troop.

Having joined the Evangelical Synod of North America ten years after its founding, the chur-ch began to enjoy a wider sphere of influence with the union of the Evangelical Synod and the Reformed Church in the United States in 1936

Oldest Ex-Policeman **Recalls Life on Beat**

Bill Otto, Rochester's oldest former policeman, says there was nothing enjoyable about his 22 years on the force.

"How are you gonna enjoy it?" asked Otto, who celebrated his 95th birthday yesterday. "You ain't out there to have any fun. You're out there working with the crooks, and you're there to protect people."

Nevertheless, William J. Otto's voice is filled with pride when he talks about the days when police walked their beats. because there weren't any cars or motorcycles.

"Those were the days," he says. "You had to have it or you didn't make it." Apparently "big Bill," as he was called when he joined the force in 1904, had it.

A newspaper clipping in his well-filled scrapbook tells how Otto singlehandedly captured two burglars.

They "were in the very act of plundering the saloon of C.F. Nolan, 332 State St.," ing a dog, any dog, a home. "The homeliest dog I ever saw in my life I got from a bum on West Avenue," Otto said.

"I asked him what he had under his coat, and he showed me this mongrel. He said he'd sell it for \$25, so I reached in my pocket, pulled out \$7 and took the dog," Otto says.

For fun Otto took the mongrel to dog shows. "They'd look at my dog, then tell me to get out of there," he said.

Otto retired as a lieutenant on a disability pension. During a strike he was struck on the head by a brick.

The injury impaired his visision and hearing, he said.

Otto spends most of his time watching television at St. John's Home for the Aging, 1262 South Ave., where he now lives.

"A lot of guys my age just sit around and fade away," Otto says. "But I don't have time for that."

He spent his birthday with his son, Edwin W. Otto, 262 Townsend St., a retired fire lieutenant.
