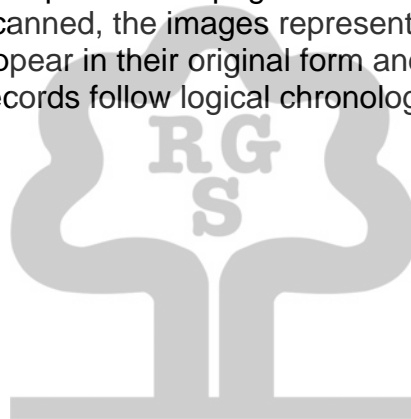

BARTOLOME ESTEBAN MURILLO (1618-1682). *Spanish*

"The Holy Family" (1670), now in the Louvre, Paris.

Murillo loved the world in which he lived. He also loved the world of unseen things, and it is between these two worlds his pictures seem to hang. Sweetness rather than strength is his distinguishing characteristic.

FRANZ DEFREGGER (1835-). *German*

"The Holy Family" (1873).

Defregger, a contemporary painter has achieved great fame from his sympathetic portrayal of peasant life in the Tyrol.

PASCAL A. J. DAGNAN-BOUVERET (1852-). *French*

"Madonna of the Workshop" (1885), now in the Pinacothek, Munich.

Dagnan-Bouveret is distinguished for his great sincerity and painstaking care in all his work. He shows the influence of Holbein. His characteristic is tenderness and sympathy in his madonnas and women.

RAPHAEL SANZIO (1483-1520) *Roman*

"Madonna di San Sisto" (about 1515), now in the Dresden Gallery.

To many people, the "Sistine Madonna," as this is popularly called, is the most wonderful picture in the world. No artist has so captivated the heart and soul of Christendom. All his work is permeated with the spirit of joy. He represented the loveliness of childhood and motherhood with a grace unexcelled. Our subject is said to be "the most perfect of Raphael's spiritual creations, the perfect embodiment of ideal womanhood."

	Hofmann's work is perhaps more widely known to the public than that of any other modern painter of religious themes. His portraits of Christ are characterized by peacefulness and repose. They are illustrative essentially rather than artistic.	
	W. HOLMAN HUNT (1827-).	Pre-Raphaelite
	"The Finding of the Saviour in the Temple" (1860), now in a private gallery, England.	
	Holman Hunt, now a venerable old man, is without doubt the greatest modern religious painter. He, with Millais and Rossetti, was one of the founders of the Pre-Raphaelite Brotherhood. Throughout his career, Hunt has faithfully stood for the principles of this movement. He has spared no pains in all his work to make every detail finished. He went to Palestine to secure models for his religious paintings. No artistic career was ever more romantic than his. He is the great symbolic painter of the nineteenth century.

"The Temptation."

Cornelius has departed from the conventional method of representing the "Temptation," and has shown it to us from the psychological point of view.

Sir CHARLES EASTLAKE (1793-1865) English

"Christ blessing the Little Children" (1839), Manchester.

This picture was received with intense enthusiasm and approval. It is somewhat conventional in its composition.

FRITZ VON UHDE (1844-) German

"Suffer the Little Children to come unto Me."

Uhde, at first considered ultra-radical, has come to win a foremost place in contemporary German art. He loves the open-air life of to-day. He conceives of Christianity as a gospel for the lowly and humble. Hence his pictures represent Christ among the poor and lowly of modern German life. As Mr. Lewis Fraser has said, "His aim has been to separate the divine Founder of Christianity from the smoke of incense, from priestly tradition and sacerdotal enthronement, and to make him live again as he lived nineteen hundred years ago, the homeless wanderer, the man of sorrows."

HENRI SIEMIRADSKY (1843-) Polish

"Christ at Home of Mary and Martha" (1885).

This is, perhaps, the best known of this artist's works. It shows the influence of a realism that places Christ in His oriental environment.

ERNST ZIMMERMANN (1852-) German

"Christ and the Fishermen" (1886).

This subject is attractive for its strong masculinity. It portrays Christ as a man with men.

RAPHAEL SANZIO (1483-1520) Roman

"The Transfiguration" (1519), now in the Vatican Gallery.

The upper portion of this great painting was the work of Raphael. He was interrupted in his work on it by a fever which resulted in his death. The greater part of the lower portion was the work of Giulio Romano. See note on Raphael in Calendar for 1 March, 1903.

TIZIANO VECELLIO, or TITIAN (1477-1576)

"Christ of the Tribute Money" (1514), now in the Dresden Gallery
Some critics consider Titian the greatest of all artists. The distinguishing characteristic of his work is his color. He excelled in a school preeminently noted for the richness and luxuriant use of color. One has said of the subject above named that it "stands alone in Titian's sacred art." The technical qualities are thoroughly characteristic of his hand, but a new note is struck in spiritual feeling. Virile without coarseness, gentle without weakness, the chief figure is perhaps the most intellectual ideal of Christ which has been conceived in art.

FRITZ VON UHDE (1844)

"The Last Supper" (1889)

The Christ in this picture is the Christ of love. FORD MADDOX BROWN (1821-1893)

"Christ washing Peter's Feet" (about 1852), now in the National Gallery of British Art.

Madox Brown was the teacher of *Rossetti*. The Pre-Raphaelite Brotherhood was influenced largely by *Madox Brown*. The latter practiced its principles long before the former proclaimed them to the world. *Brown* had been influenced by *Holbein* and other Flemish masters. Though invited to join the Brotherhood, *Madox Brown* declined preferring to work quietly and independently along similar lines. In connection with this subject two works, one by *Veronese* and the other by *Tintoretto*, will be shown for the contrast of old and modern conceptions.

This picture was painted as an altar-piece for a convent at Palermo. It is known by the name of "Lo Spasimo di Sicilia," the word "Spasimo" having reference to the anguish and fainting of Christ's mother.

ALBERT DÜRER (1471-1528) German

"The Crucifixion," now in the Dresden Gallery.

Dürer was an intimate friend of Martin Luther. His religion was influenced by Luther's. His work shows great thought and intellectuality. He showed character and no little grace in his drawing. He is accredited with having invented etching and printing in two colors with wood cuts. He also wrote several treatises on art. In his love of details we see the inspiration of the Pre-Raphaelite painters of our own day. His figures lack beauty, but are unsurpassed for intensity of inner feeling. His "Crucifixion" is an example of his powerful conception and his profound thoughtfulness.

PETER PAUL RUBENS (1577-1640) Flemish

"The Descent from the Cross," now in Antwerp Cathedral.

Rubens was probably the most favored of all artists in the means and opportunities afforded him for the exercise of his best efforts and talents. He was widely read, thoroughly trained in the technique of his calling, with great natural gifts for invention and a marvelous sense of color. On the latter Guido Reni is said to have remarked once on beholding a picture by Rubens, "Does he mix blood with his paints?" His pictures are notable for their intense dramatic action. His master work is "The Descent from the Cross."
