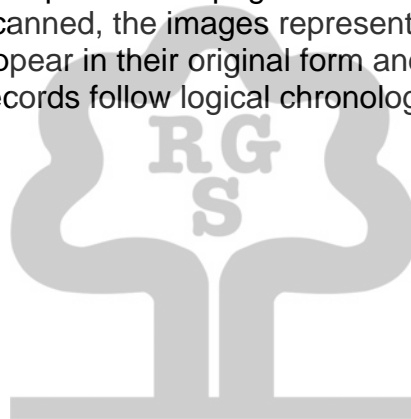

1. What is Social Service?

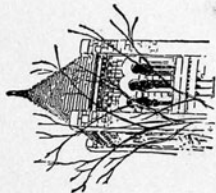
