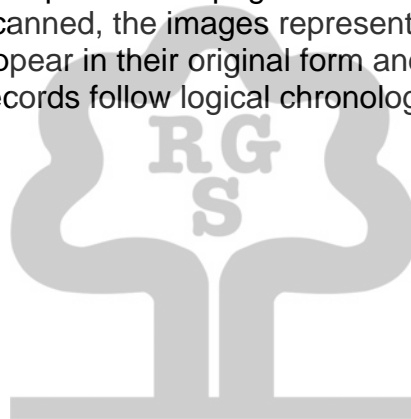

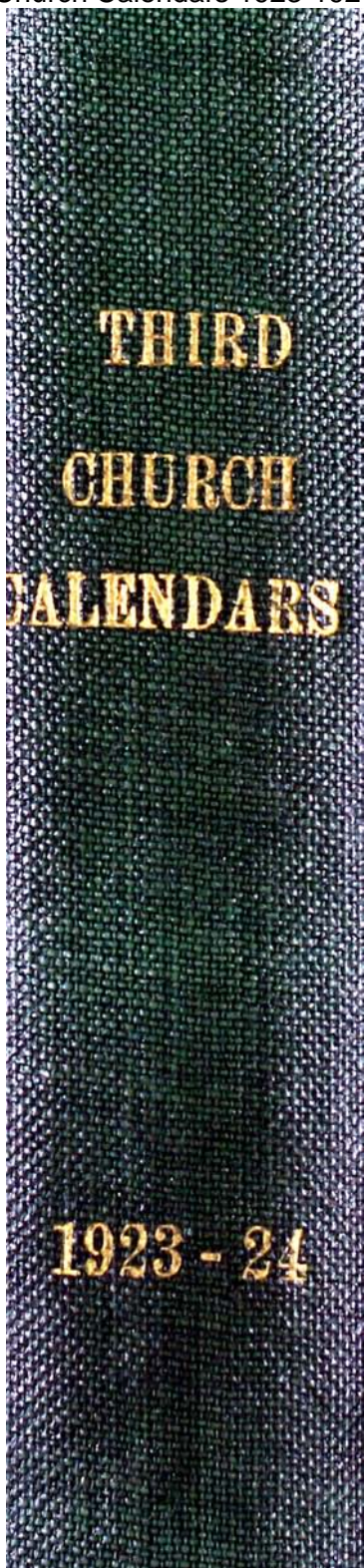

PROPOSING

A SUNDAY DINNER CLUB

For those who now go out to dinner and also those who remain at home to prepare the midday meal. To create for a few hours a home and family atmosphere for those temporarily without a home.

A good time and place to become better acquainted—a social hour in the Church Parlors—also for Church Committee Meetings.

If a sufficient number are interested, the Trustees and Session will grant the use of the dining room and other necessary rooms. Dinner will be served immediately after the morning service, at actual cost. Membership in the Club to be restricted to members of our church and congregation, and out-of-town friends attending service with them.

The entire management to be with club members who will decide the kind of dinner to be served and its cost. The cost should be less than downtown, and little if any more than it is at home. While not necessary to attend regularly it is necessary for those who attend only occasionally to make their reservations by the preceding Friday.

No one should be urged to attend. If a dinner immediately following the morning service doesn't meet a real need and perform a real service, we do not want it. If it will do either of these for you, fill in and return promptly the attached blank, showing whether you would attend regularly or only occasionally providing the dinner is good and the price right.

If there is sufficient demand to warrant, arrangements will at once be made for those interested to perfect plans for the first dinner and to continue them as long as found desirable. If before deciding you wish further information, the same can be secured from,

In addition to those whose names were printed on the calendar last Sunday, we received into the church on statement of faith Mr. Malcolm Cartwright McBride of East Avenue, Pittsford.

The preacher this morning is Mr. Swartz and this afternoon, Dr. Strayer.

The Presbytery of Rochester will hold its mid-term meeting in this church on Monday, January 15, at which time Dr. Taylor's resignation from the Brick Church will be acted upon and Mr. Swartz will be received into the Presbytery.

Members of the Congregation will be interested to know that through the generosity of its members, \$520.00 were telegraphed by Mrs. Strayer last Sunday afternoon to Mrs. Peabody for the Oriental Colleges for women. Mrs. Peabody writes that it seems probable that the whole amount will be realized and that Rochester will have its building.

The Church School, including the Boy Scouts, furnished Christmas cheer for 16 families this year. In 11 families a complete Christmas dinner was given. Besides the dinner, most of them received clothing, toys and a tree. The Kindergarten gave toys and a tree to a family where both father and mother had been in the hospital and the family had just been reunited for Christmas. The Primary Department provided clothing, toys and \$20.00 to buy specific gifts for a family assigned to them. The Junior Department looked after a family of 4 children where the father was ill and the mother just out of the hospital. Other classes had specific families with a need for specific articles, such as dolls, tool chests and clothing. These needs were in most instances generously and carefully met. The Committee also wishes to acknowledge gifts of food, money and toys from members of the Congregation.

Experience shows that every year it costs more to run the modern church successfully, as it does the modern home. A larger part of the Church's revenue is required for its own maintenance, and we do not raise enough to increase our Benevolences in the same proportion. None of us are content with this situation. The ideal of a Christian Church is to give more for benevolences than it spends on itself.

It would greatly help us if we had other sources of revenue so that a larger proportion of the money from living givers could be used for the Church's missionary and benevolent enterprises. The future usefulness of the church in this community would be safeguarded by some permanent income.

We would call attention to the opportunity which exists for perpetuating your interest in the Church by leaving funds for its endowment.

If the Church had a manse or manses, it would be that much easier to provide for its ministers. Some of you may be living in homes that no kin-folk will occupy after you. How better could you perpetuate your influence and memory in the Church than by leaving the house as a memorial manse, or to provide a permanent fund for the Church?

Your thanksgiving to God for the way this Church has served the community can take no better form than a bequest. Certainly there can be no more appropriate time than this anniversary to respond to this need by writing such a gift into your will.

It is new work, to enable these churches really to meet the needs of their growing fields.

Dr. Luce sails on Thursday of this week from Seattle on the "President Jackson," returning to his work in China. He has sent the following letter to our church:

To the Ministers and Members
of the Third Presbyterian Church

Dear Friends:

I had hoped that it might be my privilege to stop at Rochester on my way to China, but with very deep regret I was compelled to give up that pleasure on account of some urgent demands relating to the work of the University in the Middle West and especially on the Pacific Coast.

We have been greatly rejoiced lately because of the hopeful way the interest in Peking University has been developing. As yet we do not have enough funds to get out on the beautiful new site, but we are hoping that in some way or other we may be able to move out in the fall of 1925.

Ten of the buildings are now up and six more are assured, but we still lack two dormitories and about ten residences in order to house the University. One feels sure that these will come in time and that before many years we shall see a great Christian University worthy of the name arising there in that great capital city of China.

I am sure that, as your representative facing China again, I shall be followed by your ever growing interest in that great land; and I know on my part I will often be turning my thoughts to you in the homeland as we share together the world-wide task. I hope that it may be my privilege to welcome some of you to Peking in the coming years. In the meantime we shall be united in the bonds of a great and inspiring task.
