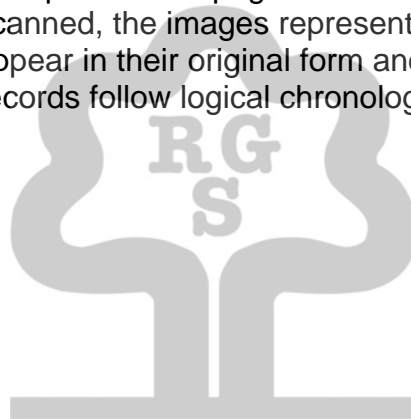

Facts About Our Finances

In preparing for your consideration a budget for the coming year April 1, 1933 to March 31, 1934, your committee has tried to face honestly and frankly the difficulty of the times thru which we are passing. Most incomes have been drastically curtailed. Retrenchment has become the order of the day. Our Church organization can not hope to escape these circumstances, and the proposed expenditures reduced to a minimum for the coming year reflect the cooperation of all departments in recognizing frankly the present situation.

There is, however, another side to this present day picture—the very anxiety of the times creates an unparalleled opportunity for the Church. If ever the idealism, the hopefulness, the inspiration of the Christian Church was needed, it is now. Our Church School work—our splendid Scout organization, both for boys and girls—our Church quartet—our entire benevolent work can be eliminated. There is no minimum short of closing the Church to which we may not go in reducing expenses if we so determine. Now is the time to decide. Your committee has assumed that Third Church in the face of this present emergency will not want to cut down the service it is rendering. While expenses have been cut drastically as evidenced by a study of the budget, it is planned to carry on the work of our Church in all its departments as hitherto.

The budget presented on the accompanying page is as usual divided into two parts. First, the operating expense of our local church; second, our benevolent giving—the share our Church contributes toward the work of the church at large.

Last year the budget passed upon called for \$34,336.00 for operating expenses. In June your committee revised this figure to \$32,190.00, while the proposed figure for next year is \$28,000.00. This saving of over \$6,000.00 from last year's budget is made up in part by salary cuts taken by all our staff from Ministers to janitor—in a 20% reduction in expense of the Church School, and in a like reduction in our Music department. Our Presbyterian Benevolent budget last year called for \$15,586.00. Here a saving of \$3,000.00 is contemplated in the 1933 budget. For General Benevolences last year we anticipated an expenditure of \$4,600.00—while this year the figure has been cut to \$2,500.00. Without seriously curtailing the work of the Church the contemplated expenditures for this year's work total \$43,000.00 as against last year's budget of \$54,522.00.

This past year, however, we have incurred a deficit which we anticipate will amount to close to \$5,000.00. This, in spite of the fact that since last June every expenditure has been held to a minimum.

Your Board of Trustees agrees with the Finance Committee, and we are sure that all will concur, that we do not want Third Church to accumulate another fixed debt. We have, therefore, added the anticipated deficit of \$5,000.00 to this year's budget making a total budget for the year of \$48,000.00.

Going forward with the proposed budget will in many cases involve real sacrifices. There is no special group unaffected by present circumstances to whom we may look for the major part of our income. Our pledges for two years have been on a continuing basis and the budget of 1933-34 is based upon the money assured by the pledges now on our cards. Every reduction in these pledges outside the usual loss due to deaths and removals from the city will mean a serious handicap in the work we have undertaken for the year.

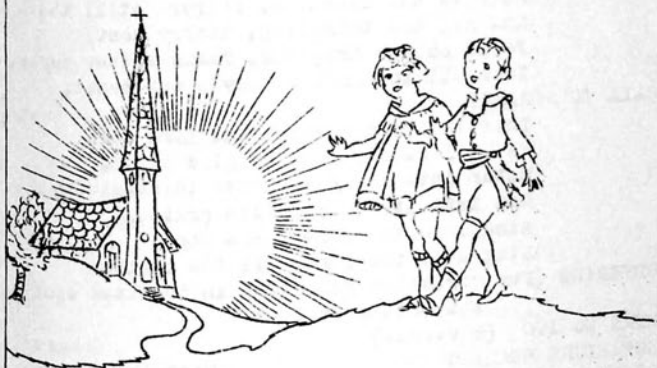
The Hall of Religion is one of the buildings that church people visiting the Century of Progress Exposition will want to see, one of its outstanding features being the exhibit of the silver Chalice of Antioch which, after its long burial, was found in 1910 by Arabs digging in the ruins of the once great city of Antioch. Dr. Gustavus A. Eisen, scientist and archaeologist, after nine years of study, published a monograph on this Chalice of Antioch, affirming that it was Christian, of first century date, and the earliest known object connected with the Eucharist. It is beautiful in design and of rich historical and ecclesiastical significance.

McAllister, our missionary representative in Porto Rico, is President of the Rio Piedras Evangelical Seminary and recently has been elected Moderator of the Presbytery of Porto Rico. "The Seminary," Mr. McAllister says in his recent letter, "tries to be up-to-date in all the worthwhile methods and movements. It is essentially conservative in its theology. Our graduates are accepted by Princeton Seminary, Union Seminary, Chicago University and other schools of like standing with full credit for their three years work." Mr. and Mrs. McAllister have been in Porto Rico since 1901. At present their older son is at Leland Stanford University doing graduate work and their other son was to graduate from Wooster College this month.

Dr. Herman F. Burkwall, a medical missionary, left this country about a year ago for Hainan, China, where he is representing this church. In his latest letter he reports that he is making progress in learning the language of the people, but is concerned about the very imminent threat presented particularly in this island by communistic ideals and anti-foreign feeling. He encountered one section, however, which had changed from a nest of communism to an almost quiet state, with the people even asking for the aid of foreign missionaries in the re-establishment of their churches.

Through the courtesy of the Westminster Presbyterian Church Dr. Gillies' sermon, "What Is Christianity?", has been printed and copies are available in the rear of the church this morning. The sermon was preached at the ordination of the Rev. George E. Ulp in Westminster Church on May 18.

Do you, the People of this congregation, continue to profess your readiness to receive Whitney M. Trousdale, whom you have called to be your Minister?

Do you promise to receive the Word of Truth from his mouth, with meekness and love; and to submit to him in the due exercise of discipline?

Do you promise to encourage him in his arduous labor, and to assist his endeavors for your instruction and spiritual edification?

Do you engage to continue to him, while he is your Minister, that competent worldly maintenance which you have promised; and whatever else you may see needful for the honour of religion and his comfort among you?

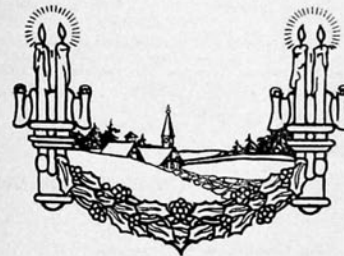

An expression of appreciation comes to you, too, from Mr. Trousdale for the many gracious Christmas greetings sent to him by the church people. Such evidences of friendship and loyalty add greatly to the enjoyment of the holiday season.

Copies of Dr. Gillies' printed sermons and the Daily Bible Reading cards will be found in the new Religious Literature rack in the foyer of the church.

The Christmas gifts from Third Church to needy Rochester families amounted to \$256.00 in cash and a large number of toys and generous supply of clothing, the value of which was not estimated. The giving was done through the Women's Guild and the Church School.

The Special Christmas Offering of last Sunday was \$512.80. This will be of considerable help in meeting the current expense budget.

Certain members of Third Church have generously arranged by will for Memorial Endowment Funds, the income from which is to be used for definitely specified purposes. Others who may be contemplating similar action are urged first to consult the Endowment Committee in order to avoid a duplication of endowments for the same purpose. Only endowments to the General Fund, the income from which is

unrestricted, should be made without first consulting the Endowment Committee through the Church Office.

The splendid display of food stuffs that decorated this church on Thanksgiving Sunday was broken up directly after the service and transported to the Presbyterian Home where it was stored for future use. This week a report came to the church that the value of this contribution to the Home's pantry is estimated by them to be \$395.80. This is in addition to a cash gift at Thanksgiving of \$120.50 and the Easter Offering of \$641.21.

Rev. James A. McAllister, President of the Evangelical Seminary in Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico, is one of our representatives in the National Missions Field. A recent letter from him states, "The students in this seminary do not average a higher proportion of perfect examples of humanity than are found in the seminaries in the States. Even in the faculty, not all are entirely perfect. . . . A recent check-up shows that of our graduates who had taken the full regular course, the percentage of failures is indeed very low. Even during the recent crisis due to a very emotional type of movement in parts of the Island, every one of our graduates met the crisis well and took his people through without fanatical opposition and with the result of directing the enthusiasm along safe and sane lines. . . . A great number of our graduates are doing a work that would be a credit to any minister anywhere, and that under handicaps that most ministers do not even imagine exist."

On Sunday, January 21, Mr. Mutch and Dr. Gillies will exchange pulpits. It will be a real pleasure to have Mr. Mutch with us again and to hear him preach from the pulpit of this church.

About 130 women met here on last Tuesday, Church Day, for work, luncheon and an afternoon address by Mrs. Theodore D. Steinhäusen. During the morning work period 3,000 dressings were prepared and 50 dressing towels made ready for use in Chinese hospitals.

Week-day Classes in Religious Education have been part of the program of church and school in this city for several years past. Children have been dismissed early from the public school to be taken to a nearby church for distinctly religious instruction. NEVERTHELESS—A NEW YEAR!

The small ship of our cause is thrust into a dangerous sea these days. The waves of our age are high—and deep.

The social and economic order that we trusted to support us while we sought, even slowly, to change it has run its inherent course more quickly than we thought—and is now being rebuilt, or will be, by others.

The forces that in the last sixteen years were, we hoped, to bring the nations closer together have done just that—but only so that they can see each other better, sense their conflicts more, and hate each other more bitterly.
