When was there ever such an opportunity for Christian affirmation, for grasping the great Christian truths and flashing them in the abyss like flaming torches? THERE'S A CHRISTIAN PHILOSOPHY ABOUT GIVING

There are four areas of American life which Christians traditionally support from their private means: religion, education, community services, and other, non-local appeals. But of these four, religion is the only one entirely dependent on voluntary, mdividual gifts. No public funds raised by taxation are available to it. The support of the Church is the sole responsibility of Christian people.

Some of these will, out of sheer habit, make their gifts "the same as last year" regardless of circumstances . . . Some will give only a nominal amount because they are not deeply concerned about the Kingdom.

Most Third Church members, however will take their responsibilities more seriously, and will allocate a worthy proportion of their income to the Church of Christ. There is nothing different about the Church's appeal this year-no new, shiny models to offer, no glamorous gimmicks, no electronic short-cuts, no automation. The very unchanging sameness of her story is what gives it enduring value. The Church is here now for the same reason she has been since the first century, namely, to save the world: save it from greed, violence, hatred, and war; save it for brotherhood, kindliness, justice, and pace.
