So, suggests <u>The Post</u>, "It is time for us to take a new pledge of allegiance <u>to</u> each other."

The Orleans County Peoples Coalition's program is designed to serve about 1200 boys and girls ages 6-18 in the Medina area and another 1,000 boys and girls in the Albion area, Black, White and Puerto Pican. Recreation and information centers for both towns are planned. In this rural area there are currently no facilities to provide these services for these young people.

Rochester Community Involvment is a project designed to help prepare men as adult male image models for fatherless boys and women to serve as adult female models for motherless girls. This program has been in operation for a few years and currently has a waiting list of young people who want someone with whom to identify.

The Oak Orchard Child Development Center is to be a day care facility for underprivileged children of Orleans County ... Some of these children are from migrant labor families and some from year around residents. Once established, funds from other sources will be available.

Through our loan of seed money, unskilled migrants have had the opportunity to build their own homes. They have become a part of the political world, engaging the assistance of state legislators and convincing U.D.C. to build its first rural housing development. They have reached out to us Presbyterians, securing the advice and assistance of such church leaders as Harris Wilcox, former Moderator of Presbytery, and Fred Buse, Trustee of Third, And, they are learning management and development skills themselves, launching their own Western Monroe Development Corp. this spring. Some twenty houses were built last year, and in December, 1971, the ground was broken for the 65 unit Sawyer Road development. The Western Monroe Community Project anticipates building 200 units in the next couple years through "sweat equity" (borrow \$12 -\$15,000, resulting in a \$20,000 home) and through "partial self help" (the prospective owner contributes less work, raising his purchasing cost, but more houses can be built more rapidly.)

However, the real gains are told in human terms - people finding hope and purpose for their lives. One ex-migrant doubled his salary in a year; he was no longer drinking. Another gained the skills to be selected as project developer. Relieved of anxiety about housing, other families become secure enough to concentrate on strengthening their family relationships. A professional found renewed energy to tackle seemingly impossible problems, and a businessman found joy in being part of the successes of others.

If we in the Presbytery attain our goal, \$50,000 will be available to assist local projects such as these.



BANGLADESH RELIEF

A \$13 million relief program for Bangladesh has been mapped by the World Council of Churches. Top relief priorities go to supplying proteins and supplementary foods, providing blankets and clothing, help with medical supplies and equipment, and help with transportation and the rebuilding of ruined homes. The churches of Norway have made available three transport planes which are airlifting supplies and equipment. A church team in Bangladesh is making a precise survey of needs and a German group is surveying church agencies to pinpoint supplies which are available or can be quickly purchased.

Even as the new aid program got underway, the World Council announced the successful phasing out of its \$20 million aid program in the wake of the civil war in Nigeria, its largest aid program to date.

These important channels of aid are maintained through the One Great Hour of Sharing Easter offering.

WHY DO LONG RANGE PLANNING?

Let's review briefly here why we are presently engaged in an intensive planning process.

Church programs usually grow like Topsy did! A need is felt, a program or group is created, organized and goes into action. The group or program goes on and on through the years often looking for needs to fulfill! In the meantime, new needs arise, new programs are formed, etc. Eventually, the demands on staff and budget exceed reasonable expectations.

Periodically, every dynamic Church needs to reevaluate its programs, look again at its goals, and redirect portions of its budget. To do this sensibly and well, goals need to be formulated, priorities determined, staff job descriptions reworked, and the entire budget reviewed and reconstructed. This must be done in the light of present needs of the congregation and community. It is what we are presently doing!

Sunday Worship

PENTECOST CELEBRATION

Pentecost is the Greek name for the Hebrew feast of Weeks, a time of harvest celebration and of special sun offerings and peace offerings. It was on this occasion, according to the second chapter of the Book of Acts in the New Testament, that the early disciples experienced the Spirit of God in a unique way. This became the occasion for a great influx of believers to the community of Christians.

The Church has, therefore, especially recognized this date - seven weeks after Easter - as a time of membership commitment and renewal. This Sunday we will observe Pentecost with special events, at the 11:00 A.M. Church Service.

WHAT OUR CHURCH IS DOING. PLANNING

I would first like to discuss with you what our church is not doing.

We must define "church". My definition is that the church is the congregation-you and me. What are we not doing?

One - We are not sitting around worrying about the future of the church. We are doing something about it.

Two - We are not wondering why interest in the church is lagging, as some claim, we are studying and searching for the reasons and how we can correct the situation. Three - We are not letting George do it. instead over three hundred of us have been involved.

Four - We are not ivory towering it from a committee approach. The long range planning process at Third Church is innovative, democratic and vital.

What are we doing, what have we done and where are we going? For about two years, the basic committee of five, with help from Dr. Massa, met, studied, brain stormed, blue skyed and planned. Over thirty in depth interviews were had with a random sample of church members. Major concerns, local, national and internal, were obtained. After these were analyzed, the questionnaire, which over six hundred of you filled out, an amazing response was drafted.

Early this year, the Presbytery Executive, Carl Smith, came on board as a process trainer. Task force facilitators in the four major areas of church concern: internal mission, external mission, worship and christian education, were chosen and trained. The four task forces, of twelve to twenty members each, were formed and have been meeting weekly or more often since March first.

We have not failed to check back with you during this process. Four Sunday morning meetings were held and the results of the questionnaires were reviewed with you. Your comments and ideas were recorded and are being considered by the committee and the task forces.

In the last weeks, each task force has held an open meeting, in fact, all task force meetings are open to the congregation. The input from the congregation at these meetings was excellent. In process is a statistical report on the questionnaire results which will be distributed to the congregation in next week's Messenger.

On May six and seven, over sixty task force, session and trustee members with the entire ministerial staff, met for thirtysix consecutive hours to receive the status reports of the task forces and to set priorities and mold a preliminary draft of the long range planning report. By late May the report will be in the near final form and mailed to the congregation. On June fourth there will be an open meeting in the Sanctuary on Sunday morning, which will give each of you the opportunity to make sug gested changes and additions to the report. Session will have the report for action in mid-June so that it should be ready for beginning its implementation in the fall .

The effort has been monumental - the dedication outstanding - the process unique and dynamic and we hope that the results will provide for as creative a future for Third Church as its past has been.

It occurred to me as I prepared to play the role of Jacob in our recent production of "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat," that I had once preached a semmon on this man's experience. Looking back, I discovered it was about six years ago when I had first come to Third Church. The title was, "A Meeting with God."

This Sunday I am going to use some portions of that sermon in an updated version as a follow-up to our recent presentation. Jacob, as the third of the great patriarchs, is a much more complex character than either Abraham or Isaac. As such he reveals things about a man's faith and relationship to God which are as relevant today as they have always been.

Jacob's struggle to believe and to understand what a true faith is like is the same struggle you and I must go through. It includes the story of Jacob's sons, of course, but in the sermon we will deal with only the man Jacob, himself - a man who was "A Rascal with Faith."

After nine years as Minister for Pastoral Work at Third Church, The Rev. William W. Young will assume a new job description this September. PROUD TO BE PRESBYTERIAN!

The following written by Ian McPherson, pastor of Sunnyslope Church, Phoenix, Arizona, is reprinted from Monday Morning, a magazine for Presbyterian Ministers.

This is being written as our church's annual General Assembly is in session. I guess the events of that meeting in Denver have provoked these thoughts. It dawned on me that many of us have been going around this last year almost seeming to applogize for being Presbyterian. Such an attitude is certainly uncalled for - maybe what is called for is some of us telling the world why we are quite glad to be Presbyterian.

There is a sickness in our country today - the disease of alienation. Many are alienated from government, political leadership, society in general, institutions, national issues, news media, church structures-you name it; if anything is outside the immediate sphere of self-interest it may become an object of suspicion and hostility or else simply ignored. Some church people even think this disease is a virtue. I am proud to belong to a church which really struggles with a balance of national, regional and local concerns, and participation. It is encouraging to see our church honestly and courageously trying to renew itself as an institution. It is exciting to be part of a church that reaches out to a diversity of groups, interests, areas, and life styles to connect in a larger church community which encompasses and enhances local and individual experience.

I am very glad that our church has the guts to insist that in dealing with the issues of our country and world it is proclaiming the Gospel. With much gratitude I receive benefit from the study and concern of those who have followed specific issues, wrestled with alternative answers and pointed to possibilities of Good News. I am glad for Presbyterian lay persons (and clergy persons too) who speak out about

their convictions. At times mistakes are made and judgements misguided. Yet, this is a risk solemnly taken in order to go with Christ onto the cross of pain, injustice, and need in the midst of man-

kind. We are merely being true to our Presbyterian heritage when our church witnesses in the world (some call it "politics")-all the way back to revolutionary Founding Fathers and to the Genevan radical John Calvin.



Much more could and should be said. The other night one of this church's laymen talked about a sign he saw which he felt hit the nail on the head and I feel fits well with my thoughts right now - the sign read "The truth is the best line of defense." That would be an appropriate style for this congregation and for all of us who are proud of being Presbyterian.

GUEST PREACHER FROM SCOTLAND

Third Church will be privileged to have as guest preacher in both services on Sunday, August 6th, the Reverend Alexander Reid Shillinglaw, M. A., pastor of Newton St. Boswell, Roxburghshire, Scotland. INSTITUTIONAL HOUSEKEEPING

During the summer several housekeeping projects, large and small, were accomplished under the direction of the Board of Trustees.

Least obvious to the casual view, but most expensive, were repairs to the church roof, costing \$23,000, and pointing of all the exterior masonry, at the cost of \$16,000. These vital repairs will prevent moisture from damaging the fabric of the building.

More obvious, but less expensive, are the new tile treads on the staircases in the parish house, repainting of the church narthex in a lighter color (possible because a long-standing leak in the east tower was corrected), and new carpet and equipment in the church office.

The cost of these necessary repairs has been met from the capital reserve fund which has been built up over the years, and which is now depleted. However the time and talent of the members of the Board of Trustees, which they gave generously during the summer months, has saved the church a substantial amount and has added to the effectiveness of the work completed.

1972 PLEDGE BALANCES

The quarterly financial statements which have been sent out indicate the balance remaining in 1972 pledges. This information is included to encourage members to complete their pledge within the year. This is especially important on this year when church expenses have been heavy.

Very quietly (lest publicity damage the delicate initiative) the W.C.C. officials assisted in the talks and , near the end , helped to draft the final agreement itself. All the while, aid was flowing to the war victims through the W.C.C. and the All Africa Conference of Churches.

HUMANS AND THE CHURCH

The job of the church is to make humans human. Abundant life means being what you are—not more than you are. Jesus didn't challenge people to be superhuman. He challenged them to be themselves. REFLECTIONS ON THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

My present major responsibility to "other echelons" of the United Presbyter-ian Church is membership on the Board of Trustees of Princeton Theological Seminary. On October 9-10 I attended the Fall meeting of that Board . Since Princeton is included in our Outreach Budget I am especially happy to share some significant statistics with you.

This year again there are over 600 students on campus with 557 of them matriculating for degrees. Of these 76 are womenin fact 1/3 of the entering class are women. There are 33 American black students and 64 international students which is the largest number of international students of any seminary in the country. One-half of the student body are United Presbyterians. Over 50 denominations are represented as are at least 25 nations and 35 American states.

The long of it is a plan - a projection of our Church program for at least the next five years. The short of it is our present Stewardship campaign and the need for \$35,000. more if we are to be able to work toward our goals.

Those of you who have been attending our PEG meetings know that this is an average increase of \$39. per year per pledge or 75¢ per week. That is a large percentage increase for some, we know. But for all who can afford it, we must emphasize that the old one or two or even three dollars a week isn't what it used to be for a Church anymore than anywhere else!

There are 45 family units at Third Church which pledge \$1,000. or more per year. Another 200 units give from \$5. to \$20.per week. This kind of giving makes possible the creative programming we seek.



PHILIPPINE PEOPLE POWER

The poor people who dwell in shacks along the water front in Manila, some Catholic and some Evangelical, organized themselves and approached the Philippine Ecumenical Council on Community Organization for help. They got it in the form of skilled assistance in community organization from fraternal worker Herbert D. White, who had done similar work for COEMAR in Korea, and who, previous to that was executive of the Board for Urban Ministry in Rochester. Mr. and Mrs. White attended Third Church when they lived here and Mrs. White is still a member.

Mr. White serves as a trainer and the people themselves compose the organization known as ZOTO - Zone One Tondo Organization. When a hurricane struck and the normal relief channels bogged down, ZOTO delivered the relief supplies quickly, without bottle necks or pilfering, because it is an organization of and for the local people.

Despite a personal visit and blessing from Pope Paul VI, ZOTO has run into resistance from the Catholic hierarchy in the area. Important needs are for landrights and a housing development planned with the community, not imposed upon it. ZOTO has helped to give tens of thousands of poor people an effective voice, a sense of dignity, and progress toward community goals, a powerful witness for Christ and his Church among the very poor in Manila.

DEACONS: HOW AND WHY?

The office of deacon is a historic one in the life of the church. In the early church deacons were appointed to look after the needs of members and through the years the office has been developed in different ways in various denominational traditions.

According to our Book of Order," the office is one of sympathy and service" after the example of our Lord. Deacons are to be people of "a spiritual mind,...friendly spirit and sound judgment". It is proposed that each PEG elect or appoint one person to be the Deacon from that group. This person would be the liaison with the church and be a center of communication within the PEG. It is envisaged that the Deacon could be alert for new neighbors and to cases of illness or other need.

The Board of Deacons would meet twice a year for interchange of ideas and information. After the organization of the Board there will be a readjustment of the duties of the Service Board.

WILL YOU HELP?

Bridge, Inc. is a program which is concerned with the welfare and rehabilitation of inmates leaving Attica prison. In the six months that Bridge has been in operation twenty-two matches have been made between concerned citizens/sponsors and volunteer inmates. The program has proved highly effective in sharing Christian love and concern to the "Forgotten Man" in very practical ways.

There is now a need for more citizen/ sponsors to train for matching with more inmates who will be released from prison in the first six months of 1973. Sponsors are asked to make a commitment up to two years for the sake of visiting their assigned inmate once a monthuntil he is released and after for as long as it takes for his re-entry into society. The job of sponsor calls for dedication and a sensitivity to human need with a strong motivation derived from the love of Christ.

As of November 1st the following results are known of our Stewardship for 1973: Pledges received. 359 Amount pledged: \$130,300.40 Pledges showing increase. 195 Amount of increase \$14,429.90 Pledges showing decrease: 23 Amount of decrease \$5,066. PROGRESS REPORT ON TASK FORCE FOLLOW UP

The following is a progress report on the specific actions recommended by the Session as a result of the long range study process. Since the goals were long range and, in some cases, involve substantial changes in the operation of the church or its physical structure, it will be recognized that some goals will be achieved more readily than others.

Worship

The Worship Commission has been broadened in its personnel and in the scope of its responsibility . (A list of the Commission members is printed elsewhere in this issue of the Messenger). There have been two very effective and well received united services on October 1 and November 5, and the emphasis on "joyful thanksgiving in worship" has been noted in all services. Two congregational breakfasts have been held in lieu of chapel and adult seminars. Special services planned include a nativity pageant, a Christ-Mass, the Christmas Eve service, and an Ash Wednesday dinner and worship. The job descriptions of the ministers and music directors have been re-written, and plans coninue toward united services of worship beginning September 1973.

The excellent Cooperative Education program has been continued. Planning for an educational consultant and increased workshop experiences will depend somewhat on the coming of a fourth minister. This will be determined after the stewardship response of the congregation is known. It has been decided not to hire an intern seminary minister. The duties of the director of contemporary music have been broadened to include work with a teen chorus. The combined work of the contemporary music director and concerned members of the church has resulted in the most active and well attended youth program (grades 9 through 12) in several years .

External Mission

A Stewardship Commission has been formed and the innovative approach to Stewardship this fall is partly a result of the work of the commission. There is continued cooperation with Genesee Ecumenical Ministry and with the FISH program. The local mission involvement of the church and its members was demonstrated in the Mission Exhibit on October 1, and continued in the Adult Seminar series this fall. Emphasis is on both educational and recruitment.

Ministry to Congregation

A Commission on Ministry to the Congregation has been established and is at work. Mr. Young has taken the responsibility of Minister for Administration. Much of his time has been spent this fall in implementing the stewardship PEG meetings. The Westminster Room is being transformed into a Teen Lounge known as the Orange Pit. Studies are under way at present as to how to make the church parlor more flexible and attractive. Aproposal for the formation of a Board of Deacons is to be presented at a special congregational meeting on November 19th. This proposal seeks to enhance the "caring" ministry of the whole congregation and would be a structural way to make the Parish Enrichment Groups even more effective.

Miss Lorraine Cardillo, director of the half-way house for boys released from correctional institutions located on Phelps Avenue, will talk about her work during the November meeting of Calvin Guild on Wednesday evening, November 15th in the Celebration Center. HALF OF PLEDGES CONTINUE TO SHOW INCREASE

As of Friday, November 10, 638 pledges have been received for 1973. Of these, 323 show an increase over this year. The amount of this increase is \$23,806. Pledges lost and reduced total 47 and amount to \$9,105.

The total pledged thus far is \$218,705. After Sunday, November 12, when our callers will have gone out to members of the congregation, we will be able to indicate our predictions for the 1973 budget. At the same time, the Joint Budget Committee of the Session and Trustees is working on ways in which we can implement all the essential elements of the Long Range Plans. The fact that 50% of all families pledging thus far have increased their giving is a rather clear indication of the desire of many of our people that we proceed with our plans for the future. This we will try to do.

EASTMAN ORGAN PIPES TO SOUND IN THIRD CHURCH - DEDICATION TO BE THIS SUNDAY

This 32' Bourdon stop was acquired byus atnocharge at the time of the dismantling of the Eastman Organ. We did not know when, if ever, its installation would be possible.

Mrs. Eisenhart's kind provision and her family's special wishes for this project have made our hopes a reality. At the same time, a complete reworking of the Great division of the existing organ has been accomplished as part of the same gift. You have probably noticed the brighter sound which the organ has achieved because of this. Further incidental mechanical work completed this very necessary and important phase of the restoration and updating of our basically fine instrument.

This Sunday the dedication of the new Bourdon stop will be celebrated. It seemed most appropriate to have been able to accomplish this work in time for Thankegiving Sunday. Mr. Hollenbach will play a special piece on the organ and Jur Senior Choir will sing the 150th Psalm.

CELEBRATION OF CHRISTIAN UNITY



STEWARDSHIP RETURNS CONTINUE TOTAL PASSES LAST YEAR AT SAME TIME

With 726 pledges received by November 10th we have pledges for \$241,000. By the third Sunday of Stewardship last Fall we had only \$239,000. We need to receive another \$18,000 to equal the total of this year's pledges. We should exceed this year by at least several thousand dollars if remaining pledges come in. If your pledge is still outstanding, you can make the crucial difference now!

Four persons moving have brought a loss of \$3,000 in pledges, while four retirements have meant another \$2,000 in reductions. Others, including deaths of members through the year have brought a total of \$11,000 in lost pledge amounts.

We mention this to indicate why, with the marvelous response from so many we have difficulty making major overall gains. But we all cannot help but be grateful for the outpouring of gifts and goodwill this Fall.

ADVENT

Advent is a preparation for the celebration of the Nativity, as Lent is a preparation for Easter. The date of the Feast of the Nativity, or Christmas, as we call it, was not fixed in the Western Church until after the fourth century.

The earliest references we have to an Advent period come from the middle of the sixth century. Congregations were encouraged to go to Church frequently and to do good to the poor. No wedding was to take place during Advent as it should not during Lent. It was to be a season of fasting in which all amusements were out of place!

Among those churches which have official liturgical calendars, there are four Sundays in Advent for the Roman, Lutheran, and Episcopal Churches and six Sundays for the Greek Church. Other Protestant traditions have joined in the recognition of the Advent period of four Sundays, following the pattern of Western Christendom.

While fasting has not been a part of our particular religious tradition, the accompaniments of fasting self-examination, a sense of religious devotion and expectation are still the essence of Advent. In the new lectionary for our Presbyterian Church, the following Scripture passages are for the first Sunday of Advent. Isaiah 63.16 to 64.4; Mark 13 32-37; I Corinthians 1.3-9.




