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

FROM YOUR PASTOR

There are certain rituals which seem to be permanently attached to the changing of the year. Newspapers and television networks produce lists and summaries to remind us of all that has happened in the previous twelve months; everyone has a funny comment to make about how hard it is to remember to change the last digit when you write the date; and the wise and not-so-wise talk at great length about what the new year has in store.

On the whole I think that is a pretty positive routine for each of us to undertake for ourselves: a review of where we've been, a little humor about the change and some projections of what lies ahead. The questions I would ask is, "Do we really do any of those things -- or do we just stand by as others do them for us?"

I have seen at least a dozen lists of "Most Significant (or Newsworthy or rtant or Glamorous) Events of 1990." Important The items listed are fun or sobering to recall, but few of them had an effect on my life in more than a very general way. It's another matter to create a list of the ten or five or even three most important events in my life during 1990. I would probably include some national and international happenings on such a list (like the military build up on such a list (like the military build up and brinksmanship in the Persian Gulf) but the majority of my list would be items known only to me or my family and friends.

Your list would, I am sure, be similar if you made such a list. Why don't you

do that?

And then let's all have some fun with ourselves. We need to laugh at the reminders of the passing of time. We are all another of the passing of time. We are all another year older -- every one of us -- no exceptions! We have more or less hair, weight, memory and judgment, than we had a year ago. We have probably put some clothes in the "I'll never wear that again" part of our closet -- and maybe even reclaimed one or two long-held items. items that have come back into style. Along with furrowed brows of reflection there needs to be a solid dose of good humor.

And then we ought to look ahead. There mountains to climb, pleasures to discover, people to love. Set your sights; fix your vision. "Futuring" is important to us as individuals and to us as a congregation. (Watch for news of our Campaign for a Faithful Tomorrow.) Don't let some pundit set out all the possibilities. FROM YOUR PASTOR

Faithfulness is at the heart of our Christian life. If I were to try to find one characteristic to describe the essence of who we are and what we believe, I would have a hard time doing better than "faithfulness." We begin with the faithfulness of God -- to the children of Israel, to the whole of humanity. Through covenants, Christ, and the abiding presence of the Holy Spirit, God keeps his promises. God is personally God. Then we measure discipleship by our faithfulness -- the way we love and live for others, the way we learn and follow Christ. 210; age 3 - grade 2 - Rooms 202/204. And we conclude the cycle by returning to God's faithfulness in always offering forgiveness, salvation, peace and eternal

Because faithfulness is so central to my life as a Christian, it becomes an important standard for me in assessing myself and my world. Do I live faithfully in relationships, commitments, behaviors? I see faithfulness reflected in the lives of my friends, my church, my leaders, my community, my government? And the more critical question -- How can I support and encourage faithfulness where I find it and lift it up and demand it where it is absent? Such is the ongoing work of every Christian.

In the next two months around Third Church you will be hearing a lot about "A FAITHFUL TOMORROW." This is the heading for our capital campaign and a reminder to ourselves of what we as Christians promise to do. Oversimplified, we promise to nurture our children in the Christian faith and to share the good news of Jesus Christ throughout the world. Our campaign for "A FAITHFUL TOMORROW" moves us forward in those two directions. By participation in six projects (2 local, 2 national, 2 international) of the Presbyterian Church's Bicentennial Fund we will strengthen the proclamation of the gospel to our world. And by renovating and updating our education building we will be enhancing our efforts to teach our children the faith which shapes our lives. It is an effort worthy of our faithfulness.

As you read this I will be out of town, spending 5 days in study so that I may be faithful in my preaching in the months ahead. a tale about something, soon it will be clear I will return to the office on January 16 the story that is, who's telling, which story. and the pulpit on January 20. FROM YOUR PASTOR

There is a certain difficulty attached to writing a column that will not be read for 4 or 5 days. Last week Laura wrote about peace, and by the time it was delivered we were well into war. I would like to hope that this week I could write about war and have it arrive at a time of peace. If only it were that simple ...

our being at war. I'm sure part of that is purpose of electing new officers and approving due to the fact that we are responding to an act of aggression which took place over will be held in the Celebration Center 5 months ago with nothing happening since, except the passing of an arbitrary deadline. We are not accustomed to nor comfortable with being the initiators of military action.

In addition, our mentality has undergone major shift in the last 20 years. As a faith community -- and as a society at large -- I believe we have changed our view of war from "a sometimes necessary evil" to "an inappropriate approach to conflict resolution." We are amazed that the horror and damage of modern warfare has not provided adequate motivation to avoid its use. We can no longer be reconciled to the idea that war is a solution.

But now war has come -- in part because of Saddam Hussein's blatant aggression and intransigence, and in part because a large group of allied nations were not experienced enough with the tools of a "new world order" to develop an adequate alternative. With deep sorrow I am left to conclude that the only thing this crisis has demonstrated is that we are creatures of habit.

At this time it is pointless to engage in wishful thinking about what might have been. Perhaps in the future we will demand different qualities -- faith, imagination, commitment to dialogue -- from our leaders. Perhaps we ourselves will dare to envision a new world order that is characterized by plowshares, pruning hooks and peace -- and then work to make that vision a reality.

For the moment, however, let us offer our prayers for those in the midst of war, than two weeks. The format looks something remembering there is no "them" -- we are all like this: children of God -- everyone is "us".

#### HELPING HUNGER and HOMELESSNESS

As Adult Education finished the series "No Room at the Inn" many Third Churchers felt the need to become more personally involved in helping the problems of hunger and homelessness in our city. Below is a list of some ways Third already addresses these issues and some new ways we will be trying to be more focused in future weeks:

Financially, Third Church supports:

NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSING SERVICES (NHS)

This organization provides assistance to low-income people who need to repair their homes in order to stay in them. NHS does this by helping "unbankable" clients with mortgage assistance and construction Two projects to which Third gave birth management. The people are thus kept out and which continue to be vitally connected of homelessness and neighborhoods are both financially and through volunteer stabilized through continued ownership and improved housing stock.

URBAN WORK CAMP

This program hires teenagers in low-income areas of the city for summer housing rehabilitation. The young people work with a supervisor gaining skills for employment and houses in need of repair to get fixed

SOUTHEAST ECUMENICAL MINISTRIES (SEM)

The SEM Food Cupboard gives out emergency food supplies, as well as supplemental food supplies to people who can't make ends meet on a regular basis.

There are individual members of Third who are deeply committed to these projects, as well.

**Soutreach** 

work, work to help give poor people assistance which will enable them to maintain jobs, education and housing. These are:

Located at 515 Joseph Avenue, on the city's Northeast side, The Gift Center is a drop-in storefront ministry. Folks can come in for a cup of coffee, or help with the social services. Third members, led by Ellie White, have served Friday lunches there since this past fall.

**TAPSS** 

The TeenAge Parent Support System gives young mothers personal skills and resources to be better parents and providers, to stay in school and to make healthy, responsible decisions about their lives and their children.

NEW IDEAS

Committees have now begun work in the three following areas:

Led by Kathryn Stimson and Henry Curme, this group will be planning for a hot lunch program in our own church building, staffed services Third Church could provide for by Third Church volunteers.

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

Bill McQuilken will lead a group to sponsor the building of a home through Habitat. Third currently supports Habitat financially, but this group would involve us in working with a family to build a new home.

SUPPORT AND ADVOCACY FOR HOMELESSNESS

Kay Wallace and Christina Oddleifson will lead a group that will explore what support homeless people, especially women and children from Sojourner House, and how we might advocate for societal change to provide better housing options.



FINALLY ...

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has a long, rich history of working for the empowerment and self-development of people around the world. Our work with local faith communities extends to every continent. A book of daily prayers for our mission efforts is available. FROM YOUR PASTOR

Annual meetings are contrived events that serve a very important purpose. The work of the church -- the life of a congregation -- is constantly moving, developing, changing. Faith development does not come in measured steps. Neither does discipleship or evangelism. Some would argue that the same thing could be said for history or mathematics, but we have gotten used to the fact that they have been subdivided into a series of courses and sequenced for easier mastery. But Christian growth has no natural break points -- no identifiable pauses. It is a continuum; a lifelong process.

So we must manufacture some pauses -and that's where annual meetings come in. They provide us with a chance to look through our most recent set of snapshots, while still admitting that life is really a motion picture.

You are invited -- you are urged -- to join us for the look into our recent past. We will talk together about some things we did very well and some things that didn't happen like we had hoped. Then we will look ahead, lay out some plans, approve a budget (recommended at \$983,700) and elect the officers who will lead us in the months ahead. FROM YOUR PASTOR

Lent has begun. "I'm glad it comes early this year," she said, "so that it doesn't spoil the nice spring weather days."

The comment caught me very much off guard. I had not thought of Lent as a time that "spoiled" anything. But further conversation revealed that Lent was a season with a negative image. As someone else said, "It's a real downer."

If that is — or has become — the image of lent for you, let me try to put another face on it, for that is not the intent of these forty days. Lent is first and foremost a season of preparation; a time to ready ourselves for the upcoming celebration of thrist's resurrection. It is a season of growing and expanding our awareness of God's love and grace; not, as some would suggest, a time of brow-beating ourselves into some

The term "lent" comes from an Old English.

The intention was to match what was happening in the natural world with what was happening in our spiritual lives. Winter was moving to spring; darkness was moving to light; lend was word to warmth; sleeping things were beginning to grow. That same emerging and awakening should take place in each of us as we become alive to what Christ is doing for us through his passion, death and

resurrection.

Certainly self-denial has been an historic part of Lent. It was not, however, intended as punishment, but as a way to focus our concentration; as a tool for our own growth. It was never to be the sole means of marking this season, but was to be coupled with prayer and study and service to others.

and study and service to others.

Let's not twist or truncate Lent. As we hang the purple paraments, let enter into a time of personal growth. Make a commitment to find some new way to connect yourself to Jesus Christ -- to allow Christ to connect with you. Only as we find ways to develop that relationship will we enhance our readiness for Easter. Only as we grow into Christ will we be able to fully celebrate his resurrection triumph!


Q. Doesn't Genesee Hospital Day Care

They currently use two floors during the week, but Third Church program needs will require the reduction to one floor. A portion of their rent is being applied to the costs, but the renovation is designed to serve our Christian education purposes.

The two top prioritites are an up-to-date and welcoming space for our youngest children and adequate space designed for and devoted to our growing youth program, but all classrooms will be brought up to current standards.

FROM YOUR PASTOR

How often do you stop and think about being Presbyterian? When you're in the midst of a round of introductions? When you disagree with something the church does? When you come across the word in a book or newspaper? When you walk into the building?

Being part of a denomination may not be a constant part of your thought process, but I would like to suggest that it is more than the chopped nuts on the top of your spiritual sundae! In other words, our denominational tie is not -- in my opinion -- a piece of window dressing we could just as well do without.

The denomination is a network -- an congregations; we learn from each other, share and Sunday activities. It is time to bring with each other, support each other. But our 1950's building into the 90's -- to that may be something that is more important to me than to you. I find colleagues who share my situations, speak my language. may see nothing more than a string of other churches you did not choose to join.

We could lift up denominations for the way they resource the local church. The curriculum materials, the leadership people, the guidelines and procedures. Each local church does not have to reinvent the wheel. But it is certainly true that as a large congregation, we need and use less support services than a small struggling church does.

The most telling argument for me is the broadened view the denomination supplies. The Presbyterian Church is engaged in mission in 110 countries on six continents. That is what we as individual Chistians are called to do, but can never accomplish. the Presbyterian Church we feed the hungry. cure the sick, preach the good news. Through our denominational ties we share the joy of a baptism in Bangledesh and the pain of persecution in El Salvador.

It is my hope that our participation in specific projects of the Presbyterian Church's Bicentennial Fund as part of our Campaign for a Faithful Tomorrow will create for us on-going ties to congregations in Germany and Carolina.

As one local congregation among over 30,000 we have an opportunity to give as well as receive strength through our Presbyterian connection. It is good to be a Presbyterian. Faithfully,

COMING TO ADULT EDUCATION

Following the January Adult Education series led by Professor Joseph Kelly of the Department of Religious Studies at Nazareth College, it is anticipated that Dr. Tamara Sonn of St. John Fisher College will be talking to an Adult Education session later in the year.

When asked about reading matter relevant to the situation in the Middle East, Dr. Sonn recommended a number of books. Two of these have been made available to the Peace Shelf of Third's Library through the Action for Peace Committee:

Between Qur'an and Crown (Tamara Sonn) Blaming the Victims (ed. Edward Said and Christopher Hitchins).

In addition, a paper by Dr. Sonn is available, entitled "The Arab-Israeli Conflict". This paper is from the collection "Movements and Issues in World Religions."

The flyleaf of Dr. Sonn's book states "The struggle for political legitimacy in many Middle Eastern countries poses a dilemma for ruling elites. In order to maintain authority, leaders often must capitulate to Islamic universalist dogma, which may conflict with their own views of the state as well as threaten the legitimacy of other leaders in the region who are attempting to establish a secular, national basis for government." Tracing the roots of this dilemma in Middle East history and Islamic philisophy, Dr. Sonn compares the contemporary Middle Eastern period to Europe's 'Age of Religious Wars" that preceded the emergence of the Western secular

An opinion on the cover of Blaming the Victims states that the books wide-ranging scope and demythologising structure "makes it especially relevant at the prsent time when the actions of the state of Israel seem so to contradict received opinion as to its analyses it convincingly, and points the readaer in the direction of further information."

FROM YOUR PASTOR

In Jerusalem seven years ago I walked along the Via Dolorosa - the Way of Sorrows. It is a route through narrow streets supposed to be the way Jesus was led from Pilate's courtyard to the hill of Calvary. Our guide said, "It's just not Easter until you make this walk." I learned what he meant. Along that crowded cobblestone path Easter became a personal event.

Whether or not you ever travel to Jerusalem, the season of Lent offers us something of the same opportunity. If we walk through these 40 days with some intentionality, the season can help us connect to Easter on a personal level. To that end I would recommend to each of you the discipline of weekly worship during the time when we will recount the story of Jesus' journey to

The Rutter Requiem on Sunday provides the "setting of the stage" in beautiful and dramatic fashion. During the four weeks which follow I will continue our journey with a series of sermons entitled MOVING TOWARD EASTER. The particular dates, titles and texts are:

"With Our Feet" March 10 (II Chronicles 36, Ephesians 2) March 17 "With Our Hearts" (Jeremiah 31, John 12) March 24 "With Our Hands" (Isaiah 50, Mark 11) "With Our Voices" March 31 (Easter) (Isaiah 25, Mark 16)

FROM YOUR PASTOR

I wrote this column somehwere on the road between London, Ontario and the U.S. Canadian border last Saturday. I share that bit of information with you because it is symbolic of the journey I have been on during this season of Lent, and the struggle I have had with our participation in the Persian Gulf war. My interest this particular forty days has been about seeking to be on a path with a heart. While news of our being pregnant with our first child has certainly enhanced this season, I have been moved beyond my individual joy to a deeper sadness with grief for all of God's children.

That sadness and grief surfaced most poignantly last Thursday when the headlines of the D and C read in bold black letters "VICTORY." Later that same day, I was appalled by the reference to the loss of such few lives of American and Allied soliders as "miraculous," as if God intended for more Iraquis to die than Americans. Friday, I listened in disbelief to the words of the President about a "post-war euphoria, the likes of which had never been seen." And Saturday, I wept when I read, "By God, we've kicked the Vietnam syndrome once and for all." In ways, we've not even begun to grieve over the loss experienced in Vietnam. As for post-war euphoria, I have only sadness becuase our leaders chose a path without a heart.

Being pregnant really does change the way you view the world and its events. Sitting in worship Sunday morning, I was mesmerized the actions of the children in the pew in front of me. Looking at them in their various stages of development, I was touched by the hope they brought to my troubled heart. Seeing them safe and secure in that sanctuary made me want to share with you words I learned about peace a long time ago as a young child. And when the bell choir played that familiar tune during the service, I knew I was on the right path.

"Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me. Let there be peace on earth, the peace that was meant to be. With God as our Creator, children all are we. Let me walk with my sisters and brothers in perfect harmony. Let peace begin with me, let this be the moment now. With every step I take, let this be my solemn vow. To take each moment, and live each moment in peace eternally. Let there be peace on earth, and let it begin with me.'

I want for our child the same thing I want for all of the children of the world, be they Iraquis or Soviets or Americans. I want those of us who are adults to chose about this exciting addition to the life paths with hearts. War has never been, nor of Third Church! can it ever be such a path. Joney

If dropping bombs on Kuwait and Iraq strikes you as an odd way for Christians (or Jews or Muslims) to behave even in the face of aggression, this workshop may help you to come to terms with recent events. If it seems to you that the human race never learns to abandon its trust in war and weaponry even though they are clearly not a Christian response to problems, this will be a day that you may want to remember.

At the workshop, conducted by Rev. Virginia Mackey and others, participants may share their feelings of alienation from the events that are unfolding and of inability to have any impact on these events. FROM YOUR PASTOR

FROM YOUR PASTOR

I was only sixteen years old. I had never known what it felt like to have a pastor leave a church where I was a member. my family had moved to Glens Falls, Mr. Wright was in the pulput every Sunday. I remember him talking to the children's choir members before services. He taught my commissioning class and had a friendly smile and an easy going manner. Then, he left to go to another church.

I was not ready for anybody to replace but an Interim Senior Pastor was hired his name was Dr. William Hudnut, I made a concerted effort to show my pain at Mr. Wright's leaving by openly resisting Dr. Hudnut's presence in our church. I even left in the middle of worship one Sunday in At Dr. Hudnut's insistence, three protest.

protest. At Dr. Hudnut's insistence, three days later the two of us had lunch.

"Young man," Dr. Hudnut said after we had ordered, "what do you intend to do with your life?" I remember my palms being wet and my stomach tightening. I gave several answers: school teacher, musician, lawyer. He asked if I had ever thought about being a minister. His gaze was steady; his tone serious. I stifled a laugh.

For the next year and a half he helped

For the next year and a half he helped me answer that question. My icy resistance to his presence at First Church melted away to a deep love and respect for a man I came to know as Dr. Bill. He allowed me to "shadow" him to learn about what it meant to be a minister. He asked me challenging questions about faith and life, never letting me off with an easy reply. He helped me discern with an easy reply. talents and gifts I was reticent to acknowledge in myself. I am a pastor today, due in large part to his influence in my young life.

I share this with you because we have just completed another outstanding Hudnut memorial preacher weekend at Third. Dr. Peter Gome's gifts as a preacher not only helped us to worship God, but brought honor to the memory of the 18 years Bill Hudnut served this church.

When I look at his picture on the wall in Johnston Hall, I am reminded of how fortunate I am to serve as a pastor of the church he loved so dearly.

And so, this week I commend to your thoughts and prayers, the lives of many people who have shaped our individual and corporate Bill Hudnut was one of those people -- for me personally and certainly for Third Church.

FROM YOUR PASTOR The Times Union carried an article on the report of our denomination's Task Force on Human Sexuality. This report is on its way to our annual General Assembly in June. It is a 200-page document to which a forty page minority report has been added. Your pastors and key elders have had copies of the report for about a month and additional copies have been ordered (a 2nd printing is underway) so that we might make them more widely available.

As is so often the case, the newspaper article highlighted the controversy generated by the report without pretending to give a As Third Church moves into new arenas of fair or thorough overview of the full document. We have come to understand that as the nature of newspaper reporting, and thus must be sure to move beyond their "brief quote" coverage.

To be sure, the report is controversial and in my mind very uneven. It deals with a wide range of issues and topics assigned to it by a Church which was looking for guidance by Wayne McKusick, who will help lead the in a confusing and fast-changing area of life. The report deals with such topics as sexual violence, sex and the elderly, homosexual issues and reproductive technologies.

As you might expect, most of the material in the report is solid and helpful. The minority report is consistent in its affirmation of much of the majority document. Only a few pages among the 200 will draw the attention and the heat -- and well they should, because they ask the church to consider moving onto new ground. We should make such moves only with care and faithfulness.

One of these controversial sections contains a recommendation some of us at Third have worked for and are pleased to see -- the right of a congregation or governing body to decide who it will ordain without prejudicial reference to sexual orientation.

The report comes to the General Assembly with the recommendation it be studied by the Church for two years. There is considerable opposition to that idea. I believe it is opposition generated by fear. Study will not weaken us nor our moral sensitivities. It will enable us to clarify what we believe and why. To refuse to study something that and why. 

There are some cycles that are easy to see and identify. They are the ones that begin with an event in your life and run their curved route until your child comes to the same experience point. A full cycle, we say -- or we label it as the completion of a generation.

I have to admit I had not really stopped to think about this being year thirty. I had been concentrating instead on Steve's graduation from Syracuse, for which we were to leave the following

So suddenly the great circling line had regained its starting point. Father to son -- from one graduation to another - a 30-year cycle. At such a time it is impossible to avoid reflecting on both history and myself; impossible to dodge the barage of questions which rush to the surface. Two generations stare at each other and wonder not only what will follow, but how it will unfold. How will what we have learned together and separately shape our common and individual tomorrows?

I want to spout answers that are profound; that show great insight into the past and present as well as the future. But I find instead a quiet sense of awe sweeps over me. I am struck by the fact that I have not orchestrated these last 30 years, nor have I had the measure of them. When Steve and I embraced under his mortarboard last Sunday, we were both aware that we had come to this moment more because of the way God had cared for each of us than the way we had cared for each other; that we had completed a generational circle more because of the grace of God than because of the decisions either of us had made. It is "awesome."

FROM YOUR PASTOR

One of the glories of the Presbyterian Church is its form of government. We are a church that makes its decisions by representative democracy. That process becomes most visible to the whole country (and to the media) when the General Assembly gathers

each year.
This national body is composed of over 600 commissioners elected by 171 presbyteries. The number of commissioners from each presbytery is determined by the membership of the churches in that presbytery. (The same principle as the House of Representatives). It is further required that the commissioners be equally divided between pastors and ruling elders.

FROM YOUR PASTOR

#### **EDUCATION TASK FORCE:** San Antonio Plan

While numerous national, state and local commissions call on schools to improve student achievement, they continue to address the symptoms of student failure without tackling underlying motivation problems. A few years ago, business and academic interests in San Antonio, Texas put together an Education Partnership anti-dropout program which offers to students with a B average/95% attendance rate either financial assistance for college or job placement assistance. While Rochester has programs in place to assist college bound students, there is no comprehensive approach in our community to assist the larger, non-college bound population. Meanwhile, the emerging crisis in the American labor market of a shortage of workers with sound basic skills is predicted to increase throughout the 1990's.

The Education Task Force is therefore focusing its energies on establishing in greater Rochester a coalition of academic and business interests to channel our non-college bound graduates into the local job market. Using the San Antonio Plan as a successful model (for example, 1990 figures show that 47% of eligible students were hired by local companies upon referral during the first 2 years of the program.) We are now in the process of contacting the appropriate leaders and agencies in Rochester to design our own model.

This experience will help them to wonder about life in a new way; to ask questions about what it means to be a Christian; to help us realize that our standard of living in Monroe County is not the way the world lives. A sale of baked goods will be held during the Coffee Hour this Sunday to help with the purchase of tools and materials.

Dear Members and Friends:

We, the commissioners and advisory delegates to the 203rd General Assembly, write you out of pastoral care for our church.

We have acted on a number of important matters. None, however, has drawn more attention than human sexuality. We write to communicate our actions and to offer a pastoral word for our church.

We have not adopted the special committee's Majority Report and recommendations, nor have we adopted its Minority Report. We have dismissed the special committee with thanks for their work, and with regret for the cruelties its members have suffered.

We have reaffirmed in no uncertain terms the authority of the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. We have strongly reaffirmed the sanctity of the marriage covenant between one man and one woman to be a God-given relationship to be honored by marital fidelity. We continue to abide by the 1978 and 1979 positions of the Presbyterian church on homosexuality.

We are also convinced that the issues raised again by this report will not go away. Though human sexuality is a good gift of God, we and our families are in pain. We are being torn apart by issues of the sexuality and practice of adults: single, married, and divorced; teenage sexuality and practice, sexual violence, clergy sexual misconduct, new reproductive technologies, AIDS, sexually transmitted diseases, and the sexual needs of singles, gay and lesbian persons, the disabled, and older adults.

That pain was felt by us here in Baltimore, expressed by people of very different perspectives. Some of these are issues on which there is considerable theological and ethical disagreement within the church.

We also believe that at the heart of the recent debate lies a painful distrust of the General Assembly by many of our members. Often the General Assembly has been ceneral Assembly by many or our memoers. Often the General Assembly has been perceived as telling individual members what to think. Let it be said that in Baltimore the 203rd General Assembly (1991) heard the cry of the church for an Assembly that listens to the grass roots. In that spirit, we have instructed the Theology and Worship Ministry Unit of the General Assembly Council to prepare a plan to encourage us as Presbyterians in our theological and ethical decision-making. We reaffirm that the church is healthiest when it honors what we Presbyterians have always believed, as expressed in the "Historic Property of the Council Principles" of 1788: That God alone is Lord of the conscience, and has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men and women which are in anything contrary to God's Word, or beside it, in matters of faith and worship; and also that there are truths and forms with respect to which people of deep faith may differ (G1.0300). This is an opportunity to learn again what it means to be Presbyterian.

In conclusion, we wish to reaffirm that we are all one as Christ's body and while we are diverse, we are one family of faith because of the unconditional love of God for all persons. We welcome your response to our action as we rejoin you this next Sunday. May the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ keep us and bless us in the Spirit of divine grace and love.

As you are aware, we each observed a portion of the work of our recent General Assembly in Baltimore. Both the national media attention and our own involvement was focused on the "Human Sexuality Report." Since the media reports were not always clear or accurate, we wanted to share our direct comments.

The actual question before the assembly was: "Should the report be <u>studied</u>?" (It was <u>not</u> the consideration of a policy statement.) From the beginning it was clear that the Assembly and much of the church felt that the report was flawed -- in form and method, and at some points in content. It was also clear that media reports had angered and excited many who had neither read the report nor understood its intention (i.e., study).

In brief, the Assembly acted not to adopt the report or any of its recommendations. They did, however, act to put in place a church-wide study process of the issues raised by the report. A letter to the church (see reverse side of this page) details that action.

We were moved and impressed by the work of the separate Assembly committee which revised the report and shaped the motions which were (in the main) adopted. We were also moved and impressed by the pain that exists throughout the church as we struggle with these difficult issues. A quote from the preface of the committee's work says it well: "We come to you wounded by the pain within our group, within our beloved church, and within those who feel isolated from the good news we proclaim but do not always live out... We come to you aware that whatever is finally adopted by the 203rd General Assembly does not, itself, have the power to bring healing to the church or reconciliation between individuals; only God working through the Holy Spirit and Christ's redeeming love can do that."

We believe it is urgently important for the whole church -- and for Third Church -- to study these issues, and we are preparing to begin such study in September. Our culture and our own families wait (and need) for the church to say a faithful word. Yet, even as we strive to do that, there will undoubtedly be points at which people of good faith disagree -- and we will need to acknowledge and accept that fact.

We urge you to plan now to be a participant in the biblical, ethical, and practical study of God's great gift -- our human sexuality.

With the comings and goings of these summer months there is a tendency to assume that nothing happened while you were away. It is, however, an assumption that hardly ever stands.

After just 10 days away at the end of June and beginning of July I returned to find a lot going on around 4 Meigs Street. Most visible is the work on the Education Building, but since it is all interior, it is not noticeable to the casual passer-by. The folks from Garrett Construction are proceeding on schedule and expect to be done by late August.

That work -- and a snag in getting into their new facility -- has prolonged the tennancy of the Genesee Day Care Center, and forced them to scramble for space. They have been housed in the Celebration Center, Youth Lounge, and Johnston Hall since mid-June. Their lady will be July 19. That will clear Johnston Hall of cribs and playpens, but Third Church child care and Nursery School equipment will continue to fill the downstairs rooms until the renovation work is completed.

Each summer there is a long list of projects scheduled under the heading of building maintenance. (Many of these are funded from the Building Maintenance Endowment of the Building Maintenance Endowment of the 1966 campaign.) Of special note this summer are the cleaning of the stone in the various entrances (just completed) and the repaying of our parking lots (still to come). In addition, our sextons Dave Taroo and Dwayl Carter have gotten our grounds into excellent condition.

Certainly of major importance is the coming our our full-time organist-director, Peter DuBois, who is profiled on the second page of this MESSENGER. We have enjoyed excellent music leadership from Jonathan Biggers and we look forward to more of the same under Peter.

Pastoral schedules will vary during these July and August times as we enjoy some vacation time. Please know that there are always at least two pastors in town and ready to serve you. And, as you find time for rest and relaxation, we remind you to join us for worship when you are in town.

We are pleased to be able to announce to you the selection of Peter DuBois to be our new organist-director. We enthusiastically chose Peter and we are delighted that he has accepted our invitation to join the staff of Third Church and take this means to provide a picture of the man we believe to be superbly suited to serve in the music leadership of Third Church.

Peter began his organ study in junior high school, earned his bachelor's degree in organ performance under David Craighead at Eastman, and his master's under Robert Glasgow at the University of Michigan in 1982. Since that time he has served as full-time Director of Music/Organist at Christ Church United Methodist in Charleston, W.V. In his nine years of experience there he has achieved great success in a position very similar to ours (a 40-voice adult choir, 4 younger choirs and two handbell groups). FROM YOUR PASTOR

Saturday night Third Church lost a piece of its heart and soul. After a long struggle with cancer--after what was in large part a personal battle fought with all the faith and will she could muster--Helen Moot passed away. Her health situation had worsened dramatically about two weeks ago, and at the end she slipped into death.

As a congregational family we will need some time to take in this news. Some of us have not been around much this summer and still hold in our minds the picture of Helen directing the youth choirs through their paces in the musical, "Celebration." It's a picture I have myself--and I will treasure it, as I'm sure many of you will.

Some of us were aware of Helen's increasing symptoms and knew that she had been hospitalized. Still we are never prepared for the finality of death. Our minds are a swirl of feelings and questions that may produce answers, but which don't produce resolution. I know there is a lot that I must simply hand over to God, attempting to trust and not control. It's difficult.

We begin to think ahead. How will anyone replace Helen? What will happen to the choirs--the programs--to which she gave leadership? The answers are important to us as individuals and as a congregation. Some of those pieces are part of our trademark. What can we expect?

Well, no one will be "the next Helen Moot." The programs-or at least most of them-will go on with new leadership, and therefore probably with some changes. What Helen gave us in her 38 years on the staff was not so much a way to do music as it was a way to meaningfully involve people in the work and worship of the church. We will not let go of that Moot tradition. There will continue to be a place for every child in the choirs and a job for everyone who wants to "get in on the action" in a supporting role. Both Junior Choir and Glorious Things will resume in September. Families of registered children should watch their mail for details. We will go on.

But for now, we grieve. The church has lost a dedicated servant and we have lost a beloved friend. "Grace and peace to you, Helen Moot. We miss you."

#### HIROSHIMA REMEMBERED

"May Hiroshima's prayer be understood all over the world!

The atomic bomb which was dropped in Hiroshima on August 6, 1956 was considerably less powerful than the modern nuclear weapons. But still I remember vividly the trauma, the terror of seeing the whole city turned into a sea of fire in a moment, burned, hurt, and dead people all over, and the smell of dead bodies enveloping the whole city. I saw hell. It seems just like yesterday to me, and the trauma has never left me.

Over 40 years has passed, but we, survivors have not recovered physically and psychologically yet. Each survivor's tragedy was much beyond the ordinary.

Through those experiences, I have a strong hope that no one shall ever have the same suffering and sorrow. May all nuclear weapons, as well as all wars be abolished. May Hiroshima's prayer be understood all over the world!"

A program was started at East High School and has expanded to both Franklin and Marshall High Schools. In addition, some tutors teach other levels of math, and some teach some science. "Studies of new members indicate that the overwhelming majority of people who attend a congregation for the first time come because a friend or a relative invited them. Try inviting someone new to church and sharing with them what your faith means to you!"

It doesn't take a poet to inform us that the only thing in a name is what we <u>put</u> into that name. Advertising agencies spend all their waking hours trying to make product names mean something to us. Prospective parents spend months selecting the most appropriate name for their yet-to-be-born child to grow into. And creative writing teachers are still giving out the assignment to "invent an animal, name it, and describe it."

What is in a name? How about a name like "Share Third Church Month?"

Well, first there's a little "P.R." in the name. September is the time when we crank things up at Third Church; the time when folks come back from wherever they've been. So, a little bit of hype seems to be called for to energize the troops for the annual season of new beginnings. Therefore, we've given September a name-a designation. It's "Share Third Church Month."

There's also a little logic in the name. This is the time of the year when people are establishing their patterns and acting on their intentions. As a rule we make for more resolutions prior to Labor Day than we ever make prior to New Year's Eve. So, this is the perfect time to offer a little nudge, because a lot of people are already on the verge of beginning a new church habit. Our nudge may be all they need. The time is right.

And then there's a little guilt in the name because we all realize that it shouldn't take some special campaign to get us to invite a neighbor or co-worker to come to church with us--and even on "Bring"

a Friend Sunday" we could find a dozen reasons why we just can't manage it. (It seems that most of us have a reasonably high guilt tolerance!)

But, mostly what is in the name is a celebration—a celebration of a unique family with a special ministry that we have found here at Third. That ministry will be displayed for all to see this Sunday, September 22.

If you bring a friend on Sunday, the name will also describe a very successful congregational effort to make Third Church "more than just a name!"



As you float across the sky you become aware that you are one with your surrounding. The wind propels you as it does itself. Occassionally, even as I am enjoying the nautral high of being aloft, I will also feel the need to reach out. I realize that this euphoric state cannot last forever and somewhere below me is a chase crew upon whom I depend and in whom I have developed confidence. I reach for my radio microphone and ask, 'Chase One,

are you there?' 'God, are you listening?,' 'God will you help?' How often when we are asking these and other questions of God that our reply comes through another person, another member of our community. The reason? God works through people." ...

May you be towed by this reality in the coming weeks and months.



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It's Sunday evening. A cold front has blown into the city. As I sit on the couch and listen to the rustling of the leaves in the trees, Austen is falling asleep in his snuggly.

It has been quite a weekend for the Rauch/Clifton clan and about 60 other folks from Third Presbyterian Church. Just a few hours ago, we participated in closing the intergenerational retreat held this weekend at Watson Homestead. Our discussion centered around Micah 6:8, which is about doing justice, loving kindness, and walking humbly with God. I'm not sure any of the participants came away with any specific answers as to how to do those three things. However, I did witness a willingness to atruggle with what it means to explore the requirements of justice, kindness, and humility. That's the way Micah puts it: "What does God require of you?"

It's a question I posed to the retreat participants. Now, I'd like to pose it to the rest of Third Church. What does God require of us? How do we do justice, love, kindness, and walk humbly with God? It is not my intention to provide any answers in this column. Rather, I want to challenge you as I did myself and those who attended the weekend at Watson. I challenged them to use memory and hope as ways of understanding what God requires of us. It is

important to remember your own story, and to encourage others to share their own stories with you. It is important to hope, especially in the midst of hopelessness. And most of all, as one of the retreat participants put it, "It is important to remember that doing justice, loving kindness and walking humbly with God often happen inspite of us."

Austen is asleep now. He adjusted rather well this weekend, although we did have to take a car ride late Saturday evening to help him fall asleep. I drive while Jack Mould sang. It worked rather well. Austen does have a set of lungs. He can't help that. He has two ministers for parents. Poor child. Imagine being a double P.K. (By the way, there were 6 other P.K's besides Austen in attendance this weekend.) We're scheduled to start planning next year's retreat in about a month. Maybe you would like to join other Presbyterians from Third for this event. Watson Homestead is a beautiful place. The food is not bad. And the people -- well, they are the reason I love Third Church so much.

"They were hungry and thirsty, and had given up all hope."
Psalm 107:5

Filling an empty stomach doesn't wipe away poverty, but having eaten, the human soul is restored with new hope. Food is so basic a human need that those of us with plenty hardly think twice about it -- except that when we are hungry, we open the cupboard and make a selection. When the cupboard is bare, we drive off to the nearest superstore, grocery lists, double coupon values and check cashing cards stuffed into our pockets. Once there, we gripe about the parking and the long lines. Wouldn't it be great not to have the hassles!

In Rochester alone, hundreds of families don't have the hassles! Instead of fretting over parking and long lines, they worry about how they will get anything at all to eat. It is a problem we hear about all too often these days -- and it only seems to grow worse.

The feeling of being hungry is one to which all children can relate -- even well-fed children who from birth must rely on adults in their world to fill that need. That is why it is so appropriate for our church school children to sponsor the Annual Fall Food Drive. Once again this year, we will kick off our food drive on MORLD FOOD SUNDAY (October 13) and conclude on Thanksgiving Sunday (November 24). Our goal is to collect 2,000 items during this period and -- with a little help from all of us at Third -- we will! A second goal of the Food Drive is to establish in us all a new habit: that after the food drive is officially over, we will continue to bring in food to benefit S.E.M. and our own pantry at Third.

Bring in an item each week -- or a bag -- or whatever you can. The children will help remind us with their delightful bulletin inserts and will keep us posted with our progress on the charts in Johnston Hall and the Education Building. Each week students will also count and box food items that you place into collection boxes outside Johnston Hall, the Education Building and the Chapel narthex. Together, we can restore hope to a few of our own Rochester neighbors.

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Taizé

The question has been asked regularly over the last year--"Why don't we sing the 'Amen' at the end of hymns?" And I have answered each inquirer as fully as possible. But, questions like that need more than one-by-one attention. They are everyone's questions and there are many of them.

On Sunday, October 20 we will alter our standard sermon format in order to talk about worship. Several members of the staff will join me in a series of short comments and explanations dealing with various elements of our worship service.

I realize that for most of us worship is like a shoe. When it is first new to us (or we are new to it) the service may seem to call attention to itself. But as time passes, the whole enterprise becomes more and more familiar -- and more comfortable. Sometimes, we would all admit, it becomes too familiar. It becomes like the daily drive to work--we hardly notice it as it goes by. At other times a particular piece catches our attention, and we become very focused on it--and we're not sure why.

The Staff can't promise to deal with every issue or element of worship on Sunday, but we do plan to address the areas of the service which we believe are the most mystifying or which raise the most questions. In addition to explaining why we do what we do, we anticipate sharing some possible variations—ideas that would help the service make more sense or increase your experience of participation as a worshipper.

To do all this in the context of our Sunday morning schedule means that our time is extremely limited. (If this venture is well received, we will undertake another round some time in the future). My hope is that your comments and feelings--not Just about this Sunday's service, but also about worship and its meaning for you--will be shared with me and others on the Staff both after the 10:30 service and in the days and weeks ahead. We want to know what makes sense to you.

We do not plan worship to satisfy some theorist. We plan it to enable you to hear the Word of God and to make your response to it. We plan it to gather and to celebrate our community in Christ. With your help, we will do that better and better. I look forward to an enriching Sunday morning.



On Saturday night we adjust our clocks ("fall back") and bring an end to Daylight Savings Time for another year. It is a fall event that has been moved a few weeks later by our legislators, but which we handle in a routine fashion.

So many of our routines are tied to the shifting of the seasons. The leaves turn, there's a chill in the air, pumpkins appear on doorsteps, and the days get shorter -- it's fall! And fall means there are things to be done. There are leaves to rake and bulbs to plant. The lawn mower must be drained and the storm windows put in place. The heavy sweaters come out of storage and the pastels are tucked away. Oh, these are not necessarily our favorite jobs. We may not whistle and grin our way through them. We may even put it off a couple of days or a week. But, they do get done. They get done in a fairly limited time frame--and they get done carefully and well. Such is the nature of routines.



#### FROM YOUR PASTOR

Considering our pledge to the church for the year ahead always provokes some thoughts about commitments--the ones I've made, the ones I've intended, the ones I've broken. There are so many different commitments in my life--and every year seems to bring others to my door. I join a neighborhood group and they expect me to serve on a committee. I give to a charity and they want me to collect from my neighbors. Politicians offer yard signs and bumper stickers so I can show my commitment. Schools urge us to come to PTA meetings to show our commitment to our children. Our children urge us to stay home for the same reasons! And then there is the church...

What kind of commitment did you intend when you joined the church? I don't mean what you believe the church is promoting; I mean what are you carrying in your own mind? Is it a commitment to learn more about the Bible? or to get involved in community service? Is is a commitment to help your kids know Jesus? or to become a better steward of God's gifts? Is it a commitment to try to pray? or to celebrate who you are? And how committed have you been?

Third Church offers a lot of programs and a lot of possibilities, but many of our "commitments" lie forgotten around the edges of the busy church calendar. We had good intentions, but we never quite got to them. Somehow the timing was always bad or our energy was needed elsewhere.

One of my favorite Biblical ideas is the concept of "first fruits." Our Old Testament ancestors understood that the way to make something important was to put it first; to address it before you ever got started on anything else. Whatever they committed to God got done first, given first, remembered first. It stayed out in front of all of its competition.

I urge you to regard your commitments seriously enough to take time for God when you are fresh rather than when you are exhausted; to plan your giving based on what you are paid, rather than what you have left at the end of the month; to be alert to God's grace and blessings rather than having to be reminded of them.

The concept of "first fruits" enabled our predecessors to offer their best to the Lord. By our commitments let us do nothing less.

Everything went so smoothly - the living and eating together, the group discussions on the Book of Micah, the sing-alongs, making Friendship Bracelets - that you would think they do this every year. Come to think of it, that's not such a bad idea.

CHURCH? How can it be "church" when you're living in cabins out in the middle of beautiful red and yellow fall trees in the Southern Tier? What kind of church has a softball game or turtles and crayfish for the kids to catch or a glass-walled indoor pool that makes you feel as if you're swimming out in the middle of the woods? Even our worship service on Sunday morning had us all around the Communion table singing and holding hands. Is that "church?"

#### DR. JAMES EVANS TO PREACH

Colgate-Rochester Divinity School president, James H. Evans Jr., will preach at both services of worship on Sunday. November 10.

Dr. Evans joined the CRDS faculty in 1980 following the completion of his doctorate at Union Seminary (N.Y.) In 1984 he was appointed the M.L. King Jr. Professor of Theology and Black Church Studies. He was elected president in 1990. Prior to his academic career he served the Chambers Memorial Baptist Church in N.Y.C.

Dr. Evans is known to many Third Churchers and has taught on several occasions in our adult education program. His third book: We Have Been Believers: Faith, Freedom and Black Theology is to be published soon. We are privileged to have him in our pulpit and look forward to his message.

#### FROM YOUR PASTOR

I am a member of the board of Planned Parenthood, and as such I have been deeply involved in their struggle to insure that poor women--and in particular those on Medicaid--have access to the full range of reproductive health services. That includes abortion. Like most of my colleagues on that board, I see the high number of abortions in Monroe County as a sad commentary on the failure of our network of educational and social services. It is clear to me that issues like this are not solved by "pocketed" (or targeted) programs. They need to be addressed systemically.

That is why the response of the United Way is particularly disapponting--and tragic. several years Planned Parenthood has tried to broker community-wide approach to providing adequate services to women on Medicaid, but with little result. No hospital, agency, or physician wants to undertake additional work that offers no prospect of breaking even--unless they can be convinced to become part of a community-wide strategy in which the burdens (financial and otherwise) are shared. The United Way is the one agency in town that had the clout to orchestrate such an effort. They have the power of the purse strings. They have done nothing.

Only when Planned Parenthood considered addressing the problem itself did the United Way act--and then negatively. My sadness is only compounded by the recent United Way funding decision. My primary disappointment relates to their unwillingness to try to address an identified community program in a pro-active, systemic way in the first place.

On the other hand, I have been pleased to see our Third Church Outreach Commission working hard to be part of the rather than acting as a Lone Ranger. Let me cite three examples very briefly:

- 1. Our Dining Room ministry was established on Saturdays because that was the day very few meal providers operated. We make an effort to serve children because they cannot get their nutrition from school lunch programs over the weekend.
- 2. Our housing/homeless initiative has worked with existing programs. (Habitat for Humanity, Sojourner House) to help them expand their programs, rather than creating one of our own. At the same time we have a group looking at the system to see how we can assist in increasing the supply of low income housing.
- 3. Our Education Task Force is serving as a catalyst to bring together the education, business, and human service leaders of the city to develop a plan that will provide initiatives to city school students to stay in school and select courses that will provide them with marketable skills. They are also working on a tutorial support system to enable these students to succeed.

I urge you to find a place, not just in a program, but in a venture that contributes to a community-wide solution to the struggles of all those who are our neighbors. The long term health of our city requires our active, thoughtful involvement.

Fortunately I had a marvelous opportunity to celebrate the recovery of my body-self at the end of the week at a workshop which explored "the contents of our lives through the body." The leaders reminded us of our ability "to play that profound process of using one's inner resources to interact with and

enjoy the world." As a child I was perfectly convinced that I had the world's clumsiest body, not to be relied upon for anything other than carrying around my mind and spirit. It is only in recent years that I've begun to dance and participate in sports and generally enjoy this amazing body with which God gifted me. We have a tendency to admire people who achieve greatness while "overcoming" some physical handicap. The Helen Kellers and Stephen Hawkings of our world seem to perform in spite of their bodies. But I would argue that it is because of their bodies that they are so uniquely gifted.

"Do you not know that your body is a sanctuary of the Holy Spirit within you?" (I Cor. 6:19) We tend to view this as a passage berating our bodies, as if we need to be purified from our bodies. But the idea is actually to glorify God in our bodies, "so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies." (2 Cor. 4:10)

Bodies, in fact, are central to the gospel. Ours is a faith based on incarnation. "This is my body" Jesus said while we seek to receive the mind of Christ and the spirit of Christ, we are the Body of Christ.

So, what's the point? Take care of your body. Honor and respect your body. Enjoy your body. "Glorify God in your bodies" (1 Cor. 6:20) for it is God who "formed my inward parts; ... I am fearfully and wonderfully made!" (Ps. 139:13-14). Praise God for bodies!

The Third Church Dining Room Ministry has some nice numbers to share this fall. Since we opened in April, over 1,000 lunches have been served to hungry people on Saturdays. Over 120 members of the congregation have helped in this effort, in addition to the many other members who bake cookies and desserts, donate fresh fruits and vegetables and equipment such as high chairs, cutting boards, and even a freezer! The Church School classes make a new set of imaginative and colorful

decorations each month. Each of our teams has now served three Saturdays and is supported by an active and creative food committee who plans and distributes menus and a team of purchasers, who are always on the

lookout for specials and "good deals."

And our guests? The first thing that we notice is that they're hungry. We put bread and butter on the tables so they'll have something while waiting to be served, and that disappears fast! Two slices per guest wasn't enough, and we're going to three. Each Saturday they come in near--or over--our capacity of 40 people, with the largest attendance toward the end of the month when food stamps and money run out. And they come back--a very large fraction has joined us at least several times. Many have been coming regularly since the early days.

Our guests let us know how we're doing in many ways. A number have told us "best food in town." They pass by the kitchen door as they leave, and often call in their thanks to the cooks. Other expressions of thanks have included the gift of neatly written Bible verses, a little money to be put into the collection plate, and an assortment of pens and pencils that one of the guests had collected. On a recent Saturday, a guest came early to request the recipe for our special applesauce meatloaf—the ultimate compliment a cook can receive!

One Saturday, after hearing several of the guests refer to another guest as 'No. 1.' one of the volunteers overcome with curiosity, asked the man, "Why does everyone call you 'No. 1?" He replied, "They call me 'No. 1' because I shave every day, I wear fresh underwear, and I have a clean heart."

Third Church is becoming a friendly, warm, safe haven for many of its neighbors. We have had several young families with children in the past weeks, and we continue to rejoice in the good natured fellowship and the intermingling of generations and sexes and races.

Almost every week one or the other of our guests asks us anxiously how long we will be doing this. It is with great joy that, thanks to the generous response of the congregation, we are able to reassure them that it looks as if the Third Church Dining Room will be around for a long time.



#### When children come to church

Let us suggest that bringing children to church is a little like letting them eat at the dinner table. Even though their manners are far from elegant, we share our mealtime with them in the hope that, given time, they will feel and act like the rest of the family.

Children giggle, they poke, and swing their legs simply because they are children. But they also sing and pray with us. Let us suggest that we adults should accept...even value...the children's restlessness during worship, trusting that they are learning:

- \* that it is important to come to this place on Sunday;
- \* that they belong to a special group of people;
- \* that the sights and sounds and feels of the sanctuary are
- \* that something is expected of them in this place, and that they may respond in song and prayer.

AGE 4-6: This age child spends considerable time climbing off and on the pew; finds the purse of an adult other than his/her mom a challenge to reach; may wander down the aisle if allowed to sit on the end seat; insists on a personal bulletin, keeping it in constant noisy motion, and clings to it tenaciously if a parent reaches over to grab it; writes first name on as many of the friendship pad pages as is allowed; fits toes nicely into hymnbook racks and finds that more comfortable than letting them hang down.

But look for a moment at the other things that are happening at the same time: This child can be assisted with finding the page numbers of the hymns and have them ready for singing; may sing along with everyone else, albeit with unrecognizable words; joins lustily in singing the Doxology, a song everybody knows; adds voice to the Lord's Prayer, pleasing both self and parents, wants to hold the offering plate as it goes by and adds an envelope, perhaps sensing that worship involves giving.

AGE 7: The seven year old generally sits in place unless there is acceptable reason for moving, the best one being a dropped bulletin. More than once during the service, the seven year old's bulletin flutters to the floor, landing well under the pew ahead. It is always followed by a small body that wriggles under various feet, and returns grinning triumphantly. This child writes the whole name plus address and phone number on the friendship pad and checks each small box, thus inviting one of the pastors to call. While feet are closer to the floor at this age, the hymnbook rack is still handier, but the increase in shoe size creates a risk that feet will get stuck there causing major panic.

#### ADVENT AT THIRD CHURCH

ADVENT is our season of expectation. Jesus is coming and we would welcome him. These four weeks provide each of us with a time to prepare our welcome--and that preparation is quite specific. We plan celebrations; we give gifts to others; we map out pathways to peace; we boldy share our joy. These actions reflect the very nature of Christ. Our welcome would be incomplete without them.

Stop to consider, though...this child can do some new things. The seven year old knows when to sit and stand, bows head during prayers, finds the hymns from the bulletin and is a good hymnbook holder, is excited to find some readable words in the prayers or hymns and is beginning to apply reading skills to matters of faith.

AGE 8 & UP: This child can handle the bulletin with more agility...in fact, has learned to fold it into an airplane; has also learned not to sail said airplane over the heads of the congregation, but enjoys threatening to do so; fills out friendship pad facetiously...(Name: Laura Ingalls. Address: Little House on the Prairie); swings feet back and forth creating discernable rocking sensations, often hitting legs or bumping pew ahead; and pretends to take money out of the offering plate.

But there is another story: the eight year old can read the bulletin and find the scripture lesson and follow along with the lay reader. This child also knows that we read a hymnbook differently from other books and follows the hymns pretty well with a helping finger. There is eagerness to sing in the choir, a real sign of readiness for fuller participation. They may catch words from the sermon and at inauspicious times remind their parents what the pastor said, "Give, and do not count the cost." Of course this does not refer to Reeboks, but no matter to the child.

SO! Bringing your child to church can be a real exercise in aggravation. You may wonder if you will ever be able to worship again. But like so many facets of parenting, we manage our way. Of course we do not want our children to be disruptive or hamper the church's worship. But we must remember that baptized children are members of Christ's church, and children should be among the people who worship God. They may not participate just the way adults do, but they are growing in understanding and learning to take their places in the church family. Proverbs 22 states that if we teach a child how to live, that experience will be remembered throughout life. Young children in worship may have bad moments, but it is their birthright as Christians to worship. Our satisfaction comes in later years when we seen them stand in the midst of the church with a faith of their own.

#### **EDUCATION**

#### FROM YOUR PASTOR

It is time for a change of seasons—a change of church seasons that matches the change in the weather. Thanksgiving is past, and we have become used to the fact that colder weather and Advent are both on their way. And both winter and Advent require of us a focusing of ourselves and our energies. We have learned that to make the most of winter requires a thorough preparation. I want to suggest that making the most of Christmas—of Christ's coming into the midst of human life—requires an equally thorough piece of preparation.

So, how do we maximize the season? First by paying attention to the veterans—to those who have prepared for longer than we have been alive. There are traditions that go with the season. There are favorite ways of doing things; there are routines that are designed to insure that we remember all the pieces; there are symbols that have a power to communicate meaning when words are inadequate.

Think about Advent as you have known it. Recall the Sunday by Sunday lighting of the purple candles until the Christ candle is finally lighted on Christmas Eve. Think about the singing of "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" and "Watchman, Tell Us of the Night." Think about the things you do to get ready for Christmas in your home—the food, the decorations, the schedule of events.

We know a lot about preparing for Christmas—and every year we learn more. We listen to the words of the prophets and are drawn into their expectations. We hear Mary's familiar words of response to the surprizing angelic announcement and are reminded of her themes of justice and reconciliation. We rediscover the empty spaces in our own lives and know that there is good news coming, not just to all people—but to us.

The season of Advent is a wonderful and exciting time for all Christians. I nivite you to share in this season—to share in its worship, its music, its challenge, and its joy—as part of the family of Third Church.

#### "GLORIA" Antonio Vivaldi

On Sunday, December 15 at the 10:30 am service, the Chancel Choir, under the direction of Peter DuBois, will present "Cloria" by Italian Baroque composer, Antonio Vivaldi. The work will be accompanied by a chamber orchestra and will feature soloists Jolie Harrington, Betsy Marvin and Riki Connaughton. Vivaldi's "Gloria" is a festive setting of the traditional Gloria text, cast in twelve movements. This piece, as with most of Vivaldi's sacred music, was probably written for the chapel of 'Ospedale della Pieta,' the Venetian orphanage for girls with which he was associated throughout much of his working life. Although the "Gloria" has achieved great popularity, its first modern performance was given just over fifty years ago.

Also in the December 15 service, the orchestra will play the first movement of J.S. Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 2 in F Major. It is one of six concertos that Bach wrote for the Margrave of Brandenburg in 1721, and features a solo group of trumpet, flute, oboe and violin.

Plan on being present for this joyous Advent musical offering!

#### FROM YOUR PASTOR

As we head into the final month of the year, it seems appropriate to do a few progress reports and updates.

First, you will find elsewhere in this issue a full report of our Campaign for a Faithful Tomorrow. We are calling it a "full" report rather than a "final" one because several gifts and pledges are still outstanding. We are gratified by the results and by what those dollars have already done in renovating our Education Building and what they will do in enabling the worldwide mission of the Presbyterian Church. Of particular importance is the fact that the pledge payments have come in at a rate that enabled us to pay our contractor without borrowing. I am grateful to all who have been a part of this successful effort.

Second, my recent comment on the United Way—Planned Parenthood situation prompted many notes and comments from you, but more importantly it—and a lot of other input—led to a United Way initiative to try to resolve the community problem. I believe that it is still possible to find a "win—win" resolution to this, not only for both the United Way and Planned Parenthood, but also for both women on Medicaid and the community as a whole. We can be a community that cares, but the cost of that caring in terms of dollars and personal commitment is constantly escalating. We must be strong and faithful.

Third, a word of excitement and anticipation as we move toward the purchase and use of the new Presbyterian Hymnal. I know that when it comes to hymns, in many people's minds newer is not better. The new book responds to that complaint. It's larger selection of hymns (600 vs. 375 in our current book) means the return of many favorites as well as several new hymns. By way of example, the Christmas section adds "Away in the Manger," "Infant Holy, Infant Lowly," and "We Three Kings" as well as providing a more inclusive text with "Good Christian Friends, Rejoice." There are also hymn settings of many of the familiar psalms. I encourage you to help us reach our goal of 900 books by completing your order form before the year's end. (Current orders total 419).

Finally, I want to offer my thanks not only for the support you provide to our regular ministry, but for the way you extend yourselves to others in the name of Christ during this season of giving and sharing.

#### FROM YOUR PASTOR

There are dozens of stories about the wide and crazy happenings that have occurred under the guise of church Christmas pageants. It seems that gathering several dozen children in one place at one time creates a settling where something funny is just about guaranteed to occur. And the fact that these small people are dressed as angels and shepherds as they do whatever they do, strikes us as doubly laughable. Do you suppose there is some purpose served by our having so much fun with things that are intended to be holy?

One of the absolute requirements of this season of the year is singing Christmas carols. They are piped at us in stores and on elevators, but that doesn't count. They have to be sung by a group of friends or family using vintage paperback song books to really be authentic. But are the mispronounced and misunderstood old English words also part of the tradtion? Certainly you have come across Round John Virgin and Harold's Angels! Could it be that even we adults have no idea what words we are singing or what the texts actually mean? If so, why do we bother?

There is a clandestine nature to these middle weeks of December. You need to keep very careful track of what you have sent to whom, lest you inadvertently destroy the fabric of childhood belief. The more concrete information that gets into circulation, the more difficult our cover up. We have to be ever more inventive to preserve what is undoubtedly the most preposterous merchandize delivery scheme ever believed by millions of children. Are we really just deceptive people or are we going to all this trouble for some lofty purpose?

A central part of our Christian story is literally surrounded by traditions. There are dozens and dozens of patterns and practices without which Christmas wouldn't be Christmas for us. And yet many of these obligatory observances seem to have no connection at all to the story of the birth of the Christ Child. Have we undermined the holiday?

Hardly. In fact, we have honored it. By surrounding Christmas with traditions and layers of family practice we ensure its continuity and its strength. Our string of holiday routines—and particularly those which defy rational explanation to any outside our family—are often our most effective way to celebrate something that is beyond our understanding.

God has come to be with us. It's overwhelming! We don't know how to act or what to say. All we can come up with is to sing a carol or bake some cookies. Not bad.

"...and they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks: nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore." Isaiah 2:14

As a peacemaking people we are called to do just those things: to make bicycles, not bombs; to fashion tools for creation, not for destruction; to embrace conflict resolution, not military might to settle our differences; to abandon armed struggle as a way of life.

Why now? Because weapons of mass destruction are now so powerful and so readily available that our life on this planet will not survive the next major conflict.

But, don't we still need to be able to defend ourselves, to protect our way of life? Very likely. However, we need to think of defense and protection in ways which have more of a chance of achieving our objectives as members of the 'global village;' we need to recast our thinking and our actions in ways which Christ tried to teach us—to share, to be concerned for our fellow humans, to seek for common ground, to forgive.

How do we make these transformations? Our society is structured to identify our enemies, to make preparations for armed conflict with them, to threaten them and, if necessary, to destroy them. We need to transform ourselves and our institutions to eliminate these patterns of thinking.

During three weeks in the new year (January 26, February 9 and February 16), Adult Education and the Action for Peace and Justice Committee will sponsor Adult Ed sessions on the subject of "Economic Conversion." Mark these dates now. The January 26th session will be addressed by Dr. Joel Yudken of Rutgers. Watch the MESSENGER for more information.

#### FROM YOUR PASTOR

I have an increased interest in the weather at this time of year. Partly that is because I have a sentimental longing for a "white Christmas—just like the ones I used to know." (Actually, I have never kept score; and could not even guess what percentage of my childhood Christmases were white.) Since I am not an avid skier or ice skater, my desire for a snowy holiday can only have its genesis in Christmas card art and Bing's singing! By way of contrast, becember finds our daughter Christy in Brazil as an exchange student. Thus, we are learning about Christmas in the tropics where the season is now summer and the forecast is hot and sunny. It doesn't take long to realize how we have been aculturated to believe that Christmas requires winter weather for proper celebration. I wonder what the temperature was that night in Bethlehem!

Another reason for my interest in the weather is the fact that many folks are traveling in these pre-Christmas days. Not only can the varieties of December weather create hazzards, they can also cause all kinds of delays. Anyone who does much flying can tell stories of the flight that couldn't take off although the weather was perfect—because somewhere along the route bad weather was waiting.
