How many people will start to read the whole Bible in a year, and get bogged down in somewhere in Chronicles? Many aspire, few attain.

I guess my understanding of human nature does not hold much optimism for the instantaneous decision to make a change. I think, in part, my understanding is informed by how God works in the lives of people. I don't believe conversion experiences are instantaneous. Some will disagree and say that Paul himself had a dramatic and quick conversion. Bright lights. The voice of Jesus. Blindness. These were certainly powerful and dramatic elements in his conversion to the Christian faith, but these events were not isolated from his past or from his future. As a Jew, his faith prepared him to be attentive to God's leading. As a Christian, he continued to grow, develop change in his understanding of faith.

I believe in continuous conversion. Each holds with it the promise of God's grace and m for every person – Christian or not. Each day day when God works on the hearts and mind people – Christian or not. Although I can point particular day when I recognized for the first my need for a Savior, I have had many n conversion experiences since then. What I t learned from these events is that God is working and shaping me into the image of Ch I've also learned that I am hardheaded belligerent at times when God is working.

Maybe that is why I hate resolutions. Bec I know my own struggles with meaningful ch in my life, I also know that my aspirations for New Year will not be as easy to attain. I want to zap me and instantly make me the person I intended to be. However, God is more methet and patient than I am.

This year I resolve to look for the continu conversion that God is working in my life.

From Your Interim Pastor

Every year your Session holds a retreat to discuss issues, concerns, or plans that are important to the life of the congregation. The Deacons and Trustees were invited to attend this year's retreat. I feel very strongly that, while the three boards have specific responsibilities, they are partners in ministry, and issues that affect one board may affect the other boards as well.

I want to share some information about the Church Officers Retreat that was held beginning with dinner on Friday, January 19, lasting through Saturday afternoon. Friday evening we heard a report of the work of the Session's More Light Committee, Carol Malach, chairperson, On Saturday morning, the Christian Education Task Force, appointed by Session last winter, presented its final report. The Task Force has been gathering data about Christian Education programs in other churches, reviewing our C.E. ministry, and surveying Third Church members about their ideas about Christian Education. The Task Force's report is now available for you to pick up and study. Saturday afternoon, the officers discussed the national policy of the Boy Scouts of America that discriminates against gay scouts and leaders.

I wanted all of the officers of the church to be aware of the complexity of these two issues that have been part of the Session's concern. It is important for me to say, and for you to hear, that no recommendations and thus no decisions about these two issues were made at the retreat.

So what happens next? The proposals laid out by the Christian Education Task Force in its report will be reviewed by Session and then forwarded to the standing committees of Session that are impacted by the proposals. The committees will study the proposals, perhaps modify them, and report their recommendations back to Session for implementation. That process may include open forums and other ways for the congregation to comment about the proposals.

The Boy Scout issue is sensitive and requires thought. Last Fall, I asked Carol Malach, Chairo More Light Committee, Chris Bensch, Cler Session, and Rev. Frohman, the staff resource for Outreach Committee, which oversees the Boy S at Third Church, to meet with me representatives of the Boy Scout Council members of Troop 31 committee to discuss wa resolve this problem. The major concern center the fact that Third Church, a More congregation, is chartering an organization discriminates against gay children. Several mer have taken place and another one is schedule week. I want to emphasize that no decision recommendations have been made concerning Boy Scouts at Third Church. We are in a contin dialogue and hope that we can come to a conclusion.

Our Church Officers Retreat brought togethe people that you have elected to lead this congregation. I ask that you continue to holds in your prayers as they seek God's will and guid for their work.

As I left my interview with Kristin Romell, Director of the Third Church Early Childhood Programs (TCECP, an image popped into my mind of two slim tree trunks slowly growing together to form a single, stronger tree that could reach out labeling branches wider and wider. Over the last six years this image could desrobe how the relationship between Third and the TCECP program has grown – tighter and tighter, together until you can see where the program meds and the church begins.

TCECP is not just a pre-school for lower-income kids, and Kristin Romell is not just a dyscare provider. Thirds early childhood program receives funding from Head Start and New York's Universal Pre-Kindergarten and dyscare. TCECP is a comprehensive family support program offening medical support, referrals, literiou programs, and programs in parenting skills all designed to make families stronger and more successful. Kristin a warm, enthusiatis manager of everything from teacher training, grant writing to hug griving.

Third's Head Start program begins this year on a full five-day schedule. Originally the education program wa designed in collaboration with the U of R and Kodak to focus on a curriculum based on science. This has been a successful "experiment" that has been copied at other programs regionally.

Kristin has been at TCHS for five years, after eleven years spent at the VMCA. She is dedicated to working in matche child care field in a mission-oriented way. She says she had liked the idea of working for a church had is not always searching for ways to make stronger church connections. Head Start at Third Goes Full-Day, Full - Year!

The Head Start preschool program at Third Church is expanding it's services to low-income children and families. As of Janary J, 2001, the Head Start program operates from 8:30 AM to 4:00 PM, Monday through Friday, with classes includied all year long, including ischool vacation weeks and the summer months. In addition, we are open until 5:30 PM for extended daycare.

This latest expansion is a result of efforts to multiply the proven benefits of preschool education in getting children ready for school success by increasing the hours of program, and also to provide services to help families who are working or attending school full-time.

In addition to the Head Start program, Third Church Early Childhood Programs also offers Universal Pri Kinderganten and extended day care for those renolled in the Head Start and UPK programs. In all, the program server 47 three and four year olds from low-income flamilies in Southeast Kochster through a comprehensive pretiched program that focuses on a hands-on science curriculum and strong family involvement through family literacy programs and volunteer opportunities.

Support from Third for this program has been great with donations for Food Baskets at Christmas, the mitter tree, and involvement of time and effort from the Outreach, Personnel, and Property Committees.

Food for thought.....

Did you ever stop to ponder the story of Adam and Eve and the garden of Eden? Did you know that Eden means delight? Adam was not created for the garden, rather, the garden is planted for Adam's sake. He, then, is given the responsibility to till and keep this garden of delight.

There are many trees in the garden, trees pleasant to the sight and good for food (what one would expect in a garden of delight.) Two trees are specifically named there: the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. Adam is told he may freely eat of any tree, except the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. He is not to eat of that tree, for the Lord warns him "in the day that you eat of it you shall die." Isn't in theresting that a fruit bearing tree should bring death? But to partake of delights without becoming addicted is at best most difficult -- and addictions clearly can lead to death.

The second tree mentioned is not a forbidden tree, yet after Adam and Eve partake of the first tree they are prevented from eating of the tree of life. Gerald May, M.D., in his book Addiction and Grace, says that when Adam and Eve are prevented from eating from this second tree, it is more to protect than to punish them for God "knows that Eve and Adam will not be able to withstand the compulsion to eat from that second tree." And for Adam and Eve to not be able to control the compulsion and then eat of the tree of life would have meant they would live forever in a state of addiction. God in Jesus Christ brings us through grace back to a state of wholeness and then offers us eternity.

Dr. May has an interesting perspective addiction and the power of God's grace in overcoming addiction. And all of us. Dr contends, have some form of addiction. He "Eden represents the garden that is both birthplace and our destiny, our home and promised land. Humanity's struggle addiction is a journey through the wilderne idolatry where temptations, trials, deprivations abound, but where God's gra always available to guide, protect, emp and transform us. --- But it is much more the journey; it is the discovery of the depth weakness, the power of grace, and the print both. Moreover, what takes place in the dese not simply difficult travel and adventu learning; it is repentance and conversation transformation of mixed motivations purified desire, the greening of desen garden through the living water of grace. is no geographic journey here: it all takes within our hearts. And what happens is not purgation and purification, but also a h courtship, a homemaking between the h soul and its Creator." May we all make iourney, relying on the grace of God!

"A child miseducated is a child lost" --J.F.K.

We all have heard about the importance of education: campaigns have been run on trying to send more money to the right places, states have been raising standards, and the media have been reporting about the deficiencies in public schools. What everyone seems to agree on (and that's not much) is that students need to be treated as people and not merely as numbers or statistics. The Volunteer Tutoring Program at School #6 is a program that pairs adults with students at the elementary school located at Upper Falls Boulevard and Hudson Avenue in Northeast Rochester in order to enrich and support the educational, emotional, and social growth of the student.

Susan Crego has been the Tutor Coordinator since the fall of 1992. She administrates the program, interviewing potential tutors and organizing the resources. "Successos can be large or they can be small, " said Crego. "One teacher told me that the only time during the week the student smiled was when he came back from working with the tutor."

Each tutor meets one on one with a student for 45 minutes once a week. This year twenty-five tutors are working with 63 students. Tutors range in age and experience, but all of them are kind and patient. Not all of the tutors are Third Church members. Some are referred by the Rochester City School District. Others are people Crego knows who hear about the program and are intrigued.

"The administration and teachers are supportive. It's more work for the teachers, but they see the results in their students," says Crego.

Crego stays involved because of the inspiration she gets from seeing the tutors working with the children. "It's a special situation," said Crego. "The people are great." For more information, please contact Susan Crego at 442-4191.

An Invitation to a Lenten Discipline-A Fast From Violence

Ash Wednesday begins Lent, a season traditionally given to fasting. Some people ask, "So, what are you giving up for Lent?" Some traditional answers have been: meat on Fridays, chocolate, and desserts. Yet such self-denials seem trivial and reduce faith getting along with something we really don't need in the first place.

What I propose may, in fact, be harder than fasting from certain foods. What I would like to propose is a fasting from violence. Fasting from violence would mean that we are invited as individual Christians and as members of this congregation to examine our lives as to where we consume and support violence in our culture. Can we, for a period of the five weeks of Lent, not eat and drink the violence of our culture? The World Council of Churches is promoting the Fast to Overcome Violence as a way for each Christian to observe a different Lent.

What would fasting from violence specifically look like? Here are some examples. We might refrain watching violent television shows or movies. Teens might refrain from playing violent video games. Children could refrain from playing with toys that encourage violent play or glorify war. We could refrain from listening to or playing music with violent lyrics. We could also refrain from paying certain taxes that help to finance war. We could refuse to buy products that are manufactured in sweatshops or by child labor. For the period of Lent (from now until April 15th) we could divest our assets from companies whose main occupation is the production of war material of any sort.

How would we do this? I think it is as simple and as difficult as keeping a 3" by 5" card in one's pocket or purse. Whenever we see or participate in violence in our day-to-day activities, we'd jot down that activity and figure out away to refrain from participating in it. So, for example, we could be watching television on a particular evening during Lent. If violence would occur in the story we would note that on our and card and switch to another channel. Or imagine ourselves in a movie theater and we come to the conclusion that the movie we're watching is too violent. We could get up and walk out. Of course by watching a "trailers" on television we might avoid going such movie in the first place. The point of a Lenten discipline is to be conscious of what violence is, refrain from doing it, and record a restraint.

In order to sensitize ourselves to violence is a society I would like to suggest that we begin w pray the prayer of St. Francis every morning Lent. The prayer is provided in the box bdn Why not cut it out and put in on your mirror soft you may see it and pray it each day?

Then finally, I would invite you to attend the Buttons Conference on overcoming viola Saturday March 31, here at Third Church, just days before Easter.

I think such a discipline would soon be a penetrating because we would learn how significantly violent is American culture. A h from Violence. Now that's a Lenten discipline!!

Galileo's Telescope

During these several years of at times intense debate on the rights and role of gay and lesbian people in the Presbyterian Church, the essential argument against ordination and holy unions has been based on those passages in Scripture about same-we sexual behavior. The strategy has been to claim what we believe about gay and lesbian people is equivalent to what we believe about the authority of Scripture. If we honer the authority of Scripture we will honce what it ays about gay and lesbian people. If we do not honor what Scripture says about gay and lesbian people we do not honer the authority of Scripture.

Yet, as the debate in these recent years persists, it simply becomes more and more clear we can har different views about gay and lesbian people and still honor the authority of Scripture.

The litany of views most of us hold which are in conflict with some passages of Scripture is well known. We do not support slavery. We do not believe people who are divorced and remarried are committing adultery. We do not believe women should be subservient in the church. The litany goes on and on especially when o many of the laws in Levinicus are considered.

As this debate goes on, it is becoming clearer to people that being Presbyterian means honoring the authority of Scripture and also practicing the disciplines of interpretation.

What scares many people is the possibility of simply using experience to interpret Scripture. Oa Presbyterian discipline of interpretation employs experience and reason, but it takes us first to Christ as the primary standard for interpretation, along with the plain sense of the text, the rule of faith, the rule of low and the work of the Holy Spirit.

When the church judged Galileo a heretic because he claimed the Earth was not the center of the univers the theologians who made that judgment did not look through his telescope. They only looked at Scripture at their interpretation of Scripture. They insisted they would not change their views until they we perstuded by Scripture. Finally, other interpretive influences led later theologians to see their errors.

As more and more people "look through the telescope" toward gay and lexibia persons, they are beginning to realize the biblical texts on same-sets sexual behavior simply do not account for or understand what we now know about being a gay or lexibian person. They are beginning to realize the claim that anyone with does not adhere to these texts does not hoor the autobinity of Scripture is a false claim.

A traditional saying of the German Christian church is: "In essentials, unity; in nonessentials, liberty; in al things, charity: "The authority of Scripture is an essential for us. Our beliefs about a gay or lesbian way of life is not an essential.

Early on in the evening, I was asked by a young mother how to explain to her children what Mardi Gras is all about. Clearly I could have described what I said above, but the deeper issue seemed to be why do we celebrate it? One could say it is a night of great fun, before 40 days of giving up something you like to do. Or one could say it's a great time for kids to get their faces painted with colorful symbols before their parents get their foreheads marked with ashes the next night. What should we tell our children?

I think we should not just talk about Mardi Gras without explaining the season of Lent and the journey of Jesus to the cross, and his Resurrection beyond. Mardi Gras is a time of fun and frolic, which focuses on ourselves. Then the season of Lent begins the next day. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of a spiritual journey we should make following Jesus' example of prayer, fasting and being more in touch with God. It should be a time of sacrifice and renewal for us as we come to understand that Jesus calls us all to pick up our cross and follow him by serving others in need.

2001 Presbyterian Youth Triennium: "Even the Stones Will Shout"

This summer, during the last full week in July, four youth from Third Presbyterian Church will be joining about eight thousand others from across the country and around the world at this amazing event. The Triennium is the largest regular gathering of Presbyterian youth anywhere. Happening every three years on the Purdue University campus, it is a life-directing event for youth and adults alike, who come to learn, play, grow in their faith and be connected to a broader family of faith.

A limited number of youth from each presbytery are allowed to attend and are selected by nomination and vote by a selection committee. Amonda Gianniny, Bryan Wegman, Jonathan Dannefer, and Sarah Norton have been selected to represent our Church and the Presbytery of Genesee Valley this year. Third Church has never had the opportunity to send four nominees to this event before. Please congratulate and pray for these young leaders in our congregation as they go and return with new foith and enthusiasml

Member in Mission: Tom Morse

Speaking with Tom Morse about the many talents and gifts he shares with Third is a conversation that requires a quick pen. My narrow interviewer's mind was focused on the Food Cupboard, but I som realized that this modest, enthusiastic man has made an impact far wider than one outreach program.

Tom came to Third in 1990 when he moved into the city, realizing that his interests and activities were more urban than suburban. "My first mistake" he said with a smile, "was admitting to experience as a treasurer of several non-profits." John Cairns immediately spotted this talent, and Tom became church treasurer for most of his first five years at Third.

"What's wonderful about Third?" Tom noted, "It's a great diverse, community-wide congregation with an openness shown in the More Light stance and so many outreach programs." One of Tom's commitments is to the Dining Room Ministry, which provides a hot meal every Saturday to 40 - 80 people in need. As a shopper, he works with Otto Muller-Girard and one of several volunteer teams to plan for, and serve the meal – his team is on duty two months each year.

Tom reminded me that so many of our neighbors are just one mortgage payment away from being in dire need. The Food Cupboard at Third was begun by folks like Betsy Essley, Sue Locke, and Tom to find a way to serve the people who wandered into the church every day asking for food. In existence for 6-7 years now, the Food Cupboard gives emergency food to individuals and families each Monday and Thursday morning from 9:30 – 12:00. Most of the people served are from the neighborhood, and they receive enough food for 2-3 days, and can return once every 30 days. Third serves about 20 people each day the Cupboard is open.

Where does the food come from? Donations from the Congregation each week are mixed with food that comes from Foodlink. Foodlink is a regional operation that coordinates grants to cover the cost of the food, and facilitates getting the food to the various food cupboards around the city. Tom is our "buyer" who makes the trip each week to Foodlink to make pick-ups from the distribution center. The food doesn't always arrive exactly as expected. One day last spring we received 4000 lbs. of food!

"The neighbors who come to the Food Cupboard are so grateful" Tom said, "Often they are as thankful for the contact with the volunteers – just to find a listening ear, as for the food itself!" Foodlink requires that we keep a record of who receives the food, and Tom describes those served as a wide range of people, many with physical or other disabilities. "The most disturbing thing," said Tom, "is that in the last year we have started seeing so many more single parents with their young children."

Typically, Food Cupboard volunteers work one day each month. "It's such a pleasurable experience to help these people, and we can always use more volunteers!" encouraged the remarkable, high-energy Tom Morse. If you would be willing to volunteer, please call Betty Gocker at 248-0274.

Death and the Resurrection of Jesus

Sundays through April 8th 9:15am - Johnston Hall

As Marcus Borg puts it, the death and resurrection of Jesus are utterly central to Christianity. This has been so from the first century to the present. But for many in the scientific age, the biblical accounts of the crucifixion and resurrection raise as many questions as they answer. This six-part video series is intended to help groups explore the historical events behind Good Friday and Easter, as well as the meanings that Christians have seen in these events.

Children's Worship Discussion

- Heard the annual report of the More Light Committee which highlighted educational support and outreach efforts for 2001.
- Directed the Clerk to write to the Otetiana Council and the Democrat & Chronicle in support of Boy Scout Council president Frank Crego's recent editorial in favor of changing the Scouts' national policy on homosexuality.
- Okayed the installation of one of the "Horses on Parade" on church property.
- Endorsed the "Respect Is Elementary Outreach Project" that works to promote tolerance and reduce violence.
- Decided not to renew the contract with Action for a Better Community as a delegate agency for Third Church Early Childhood Education (Head Start).
- Approved the attendance of four Third Church youth at the Youth Triennium in Indiana in July.
- Offered special thanks to Joseph Shook for all he has done for the Session and the congregation as a whole.

THIRD VOICE

Dear Friends,

An ancient poet once wrote "to everything there is a season." That sentiment reflects as truthfully as anyone could imagine the nature of our living and the nature of our faith. We are aware of the changing seasons all around us, are we not? Some of them are physical and obvious. Other seasons dwell within us, and within the relationships we cherish, and sometimes change just as dramatically as the ones we chart on the weather map.

- As a baseball fan, I can hardly hold my enthusiasm until opening day, when every team is in first place (even my beloved and beleaguered Chicago Cubs!) and every player an all-star.
- Evidences of spring are all around us, and God's extraordinary imagination and creativity made manifest in the cycle of green and growth and new life. A wonderful example was the Easter sunrise service held in conjunction with other churches at Cobbs' Hill reservoir. Just enough chill hung in the air to remind us of the past, but we could tell that spring was on the way.
- Graduation parties are being planned. Commencements are being attended. Periods of hard work and perseverance are being rewarded with degrees, signaling endings and beginnings and the promise of possibility. Graduates look to the future with hope, and a little trepidation, while those who supported them (including parents) live with a mixture of gratitude and sentiment.

This new pastoral relationship continues to take root: learning more names, attending more meetings, gathering in different ways, preaching (and listening to) more sermons, thinking in new and exciting ways about the future.

After writing that "to everything there is a season," that ancient poet, the writer of Ecclesiastes, suggested that "there is a time for every purpose under heaven." That is an extraordinary claim, by the way, suggesting that every moment of every day is cared for, tended to, by God who created us in love and who continues to care for us.

That is true for us in the seasons of our lives as well – in our relationships, in our jobs, in our journey of faith. "To everything there is a season," and we live with the hope and the promise that God accompanies all of our days, in seasons of challenge and seasons of celebration.

All of this, of course, unfolds during what the church calls "Eastertide," the several weeks following Easter and preceding Pentecost. But in a deeper way, each season, every season, unfolds in light of the Easter story, the story that leads through Lent to Holy Week to the good news we shared just a week ago, the gift and promise of eternal life.

May all of your seasons be blessed, and may we continue to build a church where we sustain each other in God's love in every season.

Dear Friends,

The recent exhibit in our newly configured and lighted gallery featured art work by Presbyterian children and young people from across the country. It touched many of us – both for the beauty of the art and the deeper message it conveyed. As you know, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is concluding its "Year with the Child," and Third Church was privileged to host this wonderful exhibit. Thanks to all those who helped make it possible.

The "Year with the Child" has been our church's attempt to share a simple message – that one of God's fundamental priorities is the safety, health and development of children, God's precious gift and our great hope. We know that to be true, but too often our church and society fails to make the investment it must in order to honor that vision.

Clearly, we don't need a denominational program to help us "get it." Yet it has been helpful to think more systematically than usual about the life of the church with the vision of children as our yardstick.

Our church's program has been committed to children over the decades, from Sunday church school to Qabats to our children's and youth music programs to our youth fellowship program. THIRD VOICE

Dear Friends,

The church has been on my mind over these past few weeks. The church – this church, our Presbyterian church, the church in history, the church in community.

In the Confession of 1967 (as you know, one of our Presbyterian theological statements), we are told that "the church is trusted with God's message of reconciliation." In the 1960's, reconciliation represented issues such as civil rights, warfare, poverty and human sexuality. It seems to me that such a list rings true today as the church is called to bring God's reconciliation to a world conflicted over many issues, issues that are in a way as timeless as 35 years ago and as current as this morning's news.

The church itself, though, is also in dire need of reconciliation. Whether it be the issue of ordination or biblical authority or others, factions in the church are preparing for this June's General Assembly in Louisville as if it were a political convention or worse. Surely Christ's reconciling spirit could abide with brothers and sisters from different places on the theological and ideological spectrum. Surely the church could find a way to move beyond its internal battles to be able to proclaim God's reconciling love to communities that hurt and people in need.

We are privileged to have the vision and resources to proclaim reconciliation, reconciliation that takes on many forms. Sometimes reconciliation happens

between two people, or within a group. Sometimes it happens internally, as a person comes to a new realization that leads them to a fresh discovery or insight. Sometimes reconciliation is more overtly political, as we take positions and make arguments and seek to come to resolution that is fair and faithful.

So in this place, whether it be a great group of new members or an outstanding commissioning class, people are acting to claim God's invitation to follow and to make a difference, to be reconciling agents wherever God calls them. For these journeys I am eternally grateful, and thankful to be able to share them.

Remember, we are called to reconcile and are called to be part of a reconciling church. In these days, pray for reconciliation in our nations and cities and homes, and pray with hope for reconciliation in our Presbyterian family.

A Resurrection Story

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It was the Saturday before Easter and I, like so many of you, was setting the stage for the glorious day to follow. Lists were being checked off as I carefully prepared much of my Easter menu ahead.... the artichcke dip was ready, the decadent checesy potatoes were in the casserole, the lemon pie had just come out of the oven, and much to my husband's amusement the table had been set, a day ahead, with our finest china, crystal and linen. This organization was necessary, I told myself, if guests were to arrive a short time after we got home from church. And being a victim of the Martha Stewart generation, I wanted it to look effortles!

It was 8 PM, the stage was set for Easter dinner and then the telephone rang. "Hello Mrs. Foye, this is the Dean from Haverford College. This is one of those phone calls I hate to make but I had to let you know that your son Adam was in a bike accident at approximately 5pm today. The ambulance has taken him to the University of Pennsylvania Hospital which is a fine hospital and well equipped to handle head injuries." "O my God, how bad is it?" I managed to get out, "Did he lose consciousness?" "Yes." I explained that I was extremely worried because Adam had suffered a serious concussion in a skiing accident about 14 months ago and I knew that multiple head injuries could be very serious. The Dean said it was hard for him to get information from the hospital because Adam was over 18 so he passed the phone number along to me.

I felt like my heart had stopped. I couldn't cry. I just fell to my knees in prayer. I was home alone, Ry was at the hospital checking in on a new baby. I paged him to come home quickly and then I nervously dialed the Emergency Department at the University of Pennsylvania. I was shuffled from one person to the next and pleaded for someone to get the doctor who was attending to Adam. The CT Scan of his spine was normal, they were awaiting the CT scan of his head, he was in and out of consciousness, he was having a lot of abdominal pain and the doctor said he had been called in to sew up his face. I can't quite explain the gut wrenching pain I felt knowing our child was going through this alone, away from home, and we really did not have a clear indication of the extent of his injuries.

I felt that all I could do was to pray that God's ever-loving arms would enfold our son and give him courage and strength and then I started to feel numb. I knew that I needed something more... I had this overwhelming desire to be connected to our church. I nervously went to my directory and called one of the pastors at home. All of a sudden I felt very shy thinking calls like this are only at times of death. I was greeted with loving care and concern. We talked about the accident, about our plans to leave for Philadelphia and then we prayed together. I requested that Adam be included in the pastoral prayer on Easter morning.

I can't explain how much better I felt after that phone call. We were still extremely worried about what we would find when we got there but I felt a deep connection to our church family. Something changed in me. I felt in a very profound way that I was being carried. Ry and I drove off that night with the strong realization that we were not alone.

Adam is doing well and healing more quickly than we ever imagined. He is back to classes and expected to have a full recovery. We thank you all for your love and support. While we were not able to be in church this Easter, I do feel that we experienced a resurrection story.

I do not think that our Lord intended for us to walk this journey called life alone. Each one of us has the potential to be a Christian caregiver. We can't predict when life's crises will arise, but rest assured they will for each one of us. The love, concern and prayers of the staff and our many friends at Third Church helped to strengthen and sustain us. Please know that our church staff and family are there for you.... don't be afraid to reach out and take their hand. It is offered in love by the One who has promised to provide rest for our weary souls, comfort for the broken hearted, and a love that knows no boundaries. Pamela Fove. April 2001

Battle over PC(USA) ordination standards is expected to dominate General Assembly

"Fidelity and chastity" clause is back on agenda after 2-year break

(*Please Note: Third Church will be well represented at this year's General Assembly. John Wilkinson will attend on behalf of the church and to participate in the leadership of the Covenant Network of Presbyterians. Roderic Frohman will attend as an alternate commissioner for our Genesee Valley Presbytery and as an overture advocate.)

After a two-year moratorium, the issue of sexual-conduct standards for ordination in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is poised to retake center stage when the 213^{th} General Assembly convenes in Louisville on June 9.

The current ordination standard -"fidelity within the covenant of marriage between a man and a woman, or chastity in singleness" - was approved by the 1996 General Assembly (GA) and later ratified by the church's 173 presbyteries (district governing bodies). A move by the 1997 GA to delete the requirement now G-6.0106b of the denomination's Book of Order - was overwhelmingly defeated by the presbyteries. The 1999, Assembly declared a two-year moratorium on amendments to G-6.0106b and asked Presbyterians to study and discuss "the unity we share in our diversity."

Now that the moratorium has expired, two dozen presbyteries have petitioned the GA to amend the ordination requirement. Most urge that G-6.0106b be excised from the Book of Order.

This year's weeklong GA also will address the deeper problem of the continued unity of the 2.5-millionmember PC(U.S.A.). While there has not been much talk of schism, the presbyteries' defeat of a proposed amendment to ban same-sex union ceremonies, and a still-simmering controversy over a speaker's suggestion during a Presbyterian conference last summer that Jesus may not be the only way to salvation, have fomented several demands that the GA take stronger stands on doctrinal issues such as Christology and salvation. Several presbyteries are calling for a special committee to try to find a way out of the theological conflicts that plague the denomination.

THIRD VOICE

"In a broken and fearful world, the Spirit gives us courage to pray without ceasing..."

On Pentecost Sunday, we shared a portion of the Presbyterian Brief Statement of Faith. This statement is about a decade old, and came about at the reunion of the major Southern and Northern streams of Presbyterianism. Jack Stotts, who served as president of both McCormick and Austin Theological Seminaries and who has visited Third Church, chaired the very diverse committee that produced the statement.

As you will learn over the coming years, I deeply cherish the Brief Statement of Faith. Its poetic style and evocative images stir my heart and nurture my spirit. The statement is a great resource for worship, adult education, church visioning and personal devotions.

The statement begins with the phrase " "in life and in death we belong to God," echoing earlier theological affirmations. That phrase in itself is possibly enough to keep us going for a while – the notion that we belong to God and to no one and nothing else – not the world, not our possessions, not even ourselves. It is a startling affirmation, but in the end it provides a deep sense of comfort, particularly when we are facing challenging times.

The phrase to which I keep returning time and time again is lodged within a wonderful paragraph on the Holy Spirit, hence our use of it on Pentecost Sunday. It suggests a remarkable position for we people of faith - "In a broken and fearful world. the Sprit gives us courage to pray without ceasing."

That stunning sentence acknowledges the world in which we live.

"Brokenness" and "fearfulness" do not label or place blame. They paint the world in real colors, and acknowledge our very real habitation of that world. But we also inhabit a world in which the Holy Spirit dwells, that the Holy Spirit visited two millennia ago to empower the church, that the Holy Spirit continues to visit whenever we gather or whenever we endeavor to ask questions of and find meaning in the world in which we live.

And we Presbyterians, living as we do in the Protestant and Reformed traditions, believe that we are called to make a difference in the world, whether on the broad plane of public life or the more immediate set of human needs that we face each day. Called to make a difference, but only because God's Spirit inspires us to.

So pray without ceasing in these days. Pray for members of our congregation who are facing physical or emotional or spiritual challenge. Pray for members of this church who are facing death, their own or the ones they love. Pray for our city and nation, that we might find ways that move us into the light of reconciliation in the face of brokenness. Pray for our Presbyterian family as it gathers in Louisville for the General Assembly. Pray for our life together.

And be thankful for the courage we find together, and for the Spirit that encourages us in all that we say and do and are.

New Books in the Library



Life is a Miracle: An Essay Against Modern Superstition by Wendell Berry

The seeking of greater knowledge through science is a good thing, but has side effects that may be harmful to humankind. It is sometimes better not to do something just because science makes is possible. What criteria can w use in making these difficult decisions?

Speaking of Sin: The Lost Language of Salvation by Barbara Brown Taylor

This well-known philosopher-theologian brings her fresh perspective to a cluster of words that cause us discomfort and have widely fallen into neglect: sin, damnation, repentance, penance and salvation. She asks, "Why then, should we speak of sin anymore?" And yet abandoning the language of sin will also weaken the language of grace, since the full impact of forgiveness cannot be felt apart from the knowledge of what has been foreiven.

THIRD VOICE

Dear Friends,

As members and friends of Third Church, in fact, as members and friends of any church, we are called to bear one another's burdens and share in one another's joys. The Apostle Paul encouraged the church in Rome to "Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep." (Romans 12:15)

We do that many ways around here: hospital visits from ministers; parish visits from Pamela Foye; NCN gatherings; fellowship and study groups; the Prayer Cordon. In fact, every time we gather for worship on a Sunday morning, we gather in solidarity with all those from our congregation who are facing challenges.

Beginning in September, we will try a new, decidedly low-tech and oldfashioned method to keep us connected and to share our joys and concerns. The church office will send out a letter (20 or so per week, working through the alphabet during the course of a year) indicating that you will be prayed for by name on a specific Wednesday at our 9:15 a.m. Wednesday morning prayers.

All of us are invited to Wednesday morning prayers at 9:15, which typically precede our Wednesday morning staff meeting. You may choose to be in attendance on the day that your name is lifted up. You may also choose to send us a note (or even an e-mail) if you have a particular concern or a special joy that you would like to be spoken of in prayer.

Perhaps a relationship needs to be strengthened. Perhaps you are facing a job transition. Perhaps you are expecting an addition to your family. Perhaps a parent is facing physical hardship. Perhaps you are facing a challenge in your own life. Perhaps you need to utter simple words like "please" or "thank you." Whatever the need – joy or concern – I believe that we are strengthened as we are connected, and that by praying together and for one another, we are brought more profoundly into the heart of God.

We are a large congregation, spread over many communities. And yet it is the connections we have with one another that make us who we are, the body of Christ. A simple letter might be one modest means to deepen our ties and to strengthen our life together.

In the meantime, I am grateful for a summer that has been filled with wonderful trips (the choir to England, the youth to Montreat), great weddings, meaningful worship and unfolding plans for an exciting and busy fall.

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THIRD VOICE

Dear Friends,

Perhaps the wisest words in the Bible come from the ancient poet of the Book of Ecclesiastes: "To every thing there is a season." That notion of rhythm, whether it be in our own lives or in the lives of the institutions to which we are committed, means that the cycle of "up" time and "down" time is natural; and, in many cases, it is a gift from God.

And so into this sense of rhythm and this gift of seasons we would commit these very last days of summer. Several Sundays ago we considered the notion of time. God's rhythm of creation includes a seventh day for resting, codified in the Ten Commandments. Our Hebrew forbears used that invitation both as a time for worship and as a Sabbath time for laborers and animals. Jesus would later scandalize some by healing on the Sabbath. His response, that the Sabbath was a gift of God to promote human rest and to allow for the worship of God, was echoed in his own pattern of retreating, of getting away in order to be reenergized, refreshed and rejuvenated for his own work.

To every thing there is a season. And now Third Church is gearing up for a new church program year. I am personally very excited about what lies ahead. Committees are back together and meeting at furious paces. Staff people are preparing for fall programming. Rally Day is upon us, and soon to follow will be renewed volunteer opportunities, church school for children and adults (note the new 9:00 a.m. starting time for adult education), music programs for all ages and the return to two Sunday morning services. Budgets are being prepared, stewardship efforts are getting organized, building needs are being attended to.

After a bit of family time away, I am in the midst of sermon preparation for the fall, deeply thankful as always for the gift of being here. I am also working with many groups on visioning and programming issues. These are long-term conversations to be sure, but they also testify to the vitality and wealth of resources that has been Third Church's hallmark for 175 years, and to our sense of hope for our future together. These conversations are a vivid reminder of the nature of seasons, and that we are called - in new ways and in former ways - to imagine the church God would want us to be on this corner of the city at the dawn of a new millennium.

The sharing and building up of our faith through music is an important part of our life together at Third Church. Opportunities exist for persons of all ages and abilities to participate in musical groups - from preschool through older adult. Please look through this brochure and find where you and/or members of your family fit in - and join a singing or ringing choir this fall! For more information on any of the music and arts programs, contact Peter DuBois or Christina Lenti at 271-6513 or e-mail pdubois@thirdpresbyterian.org.

Children

Group opportunities encourage the young to be involved in the service-oriented aspect of the church and encourage life-long commitment. They also provide a pool of peers that fosters friendship and a sense of acceptance into the larger "Family of God." At Third Church we encourage all children and youth to participate in programs designed to build their self-esteem and broaden their faith

- Carol Choir (Preschool and Kindergarten) meets on Sunday mornings during Church School from 11:40 - 12:00 a.m. The children will learn simple songs, play rhythm instruments, and explore musical ideas using movement and games. The Carol Choir traditionally sings in worship in Christmas Eve and Mothers' Day. Chris Lenti leads this choir.
- The Glorious Things! (1st and 2nd grades) meets on Wednesday evenings from 7:00- 7:30 p.m. as part of the Qabats program, which is a mid-week program of music and fellowship for children. The music portion of the evening is a multi-activity program designed to introduce early elementary children to basic musical ideas through games and songs. Emphasis will be on exploring the voice, pitch matching, and developing musical sensitivity, Chris Lenti directs this group, which will sing in worship 4 times during the year. They will participate in the children's musical in April, 2002.
- Junior Choir (3rd 6th grades) rehearses on Wednesday evenings from 5:30 6:15 p.m. as part of the Qabats program, which is a mid-week program of worship and fellowship for children that runs from 5:30-7:30 each week. Junior Choir also rehearses on Sunday mornings at 9:15 a.m. in preparation for worship. The choir participates weekly in worship in a variety of leadership roles. A more advanced choir, this group continues music training through vocal warm-ups, rhythmic games and choral anthems which reflect a variety of musical styles and traditions. In April 2002, the Junior Choir will present the musical "The Rock Slinger and His Greatest Hit" by Allen Pote. An annual summer choir camp is also a highlight of the year. Chris Lenti directs this group.

Children's Bell Choir (5th and 6th grades) rehearses on Wednesdays from 5:00 - 5:30 p.m. This newly formed choir learns the basics of handbell ringing utilizing music and exercises that are particularly appropriate for children. Last summer the choir attended a handbell festival in Geneva, NY. Chris Lenti directs this group.

Youth

As youth mature and grow into faithful members of the church, they continue to have opportunities to serve through both singing and ringing groups. This year, the groups will participate frequently in worship, be involved in a mid-winter retreat and youth worship service in the spring.

The Covenant Singers (7th-12th grades) meet on Sunday evenings from 6:45-7:30 p.m., following fellowship groups and dinner. The group sings regularly in worship throughout the year. Membership is open to all youth of the church - whether they have previous experience in choirs or not. Peter DuBois will direct this group in September, and February-May. Carrie Hesketh will direct during his sabbatical: October 1 - February 15.

Sr. High Ensemble (9th-12th grades) Now in its third year (!), this ensemble is designed to give high school singers an opportunity to be in a smaller group focused on singing music from a wide variety of styles and traditions. Rehearsals are on Sunday evenings from 7:30 -8:15 p.m. immediately following Covenant Singers. The ensemble will participate in worship regularly throughout the year. Peter DuBois will direct this group in September, and February-May. Carrie Hesketh will direct during his sabbatical: October 1 - February 15.

Junior High Bell Choir (7th and 8th grades) meets Sunday evenings from 4:00 - 4:50 p.m. This choir is primarily a training choir. Ringers will learn the basics of handbell techniques, through exercises and repertoire, and will participate in worship regularly. Jeanne Fisher directs this choir.

<u>Staff News –</u> Peter DuBois to Begin Sabbatical

Having recently marked the completion of ten years of service to Third Church, Peter DuBois has been granted the opportunity for a period of sabbatical by the Personnel Committee and Session. The sabbatical, which will cover the period from October 1 - February 15, will provide the chance to pursue some opportunities and areas of study that are dificult to accomplish in the course of a troially lougy church season.

The concept of sabbatical is actually grounded in the biblical idea of Sabbath rest, and creates space for creativity, rest and renewal. In addition to time for study, intensive organ practice, reading and reflection, Peter will take advantage of several unique opportunities during this time.

In October he will travel to Göteborg, Sweden along with the faculty and students of the organ department of the Eastman School of Music - for two weeks of teaching and study there, where there is a unique collection of organs built on historic European models. In late December, at the invitation of the cathedral of Notre Dame de Paris, he will perform an organ recital in that extraordinary place. He will then stay on in Paris for a few weeks to study organ improvisation, and hopefully to perform several more recitals in that area. He will return to his duties at Third with the beginning of Lent. in mid-February.

During his time away, a number of talented people - several of whom are well known to Third Churchers - will carry out most of his usual duties. Christian Lane, our gifted Assistant Organist, will assume all of the organ playing responsibilities, while Carrie Hesketh, a member of the Chancel Choir, and school music teacher, will direct the two youth singing choirs - The Covenant Singers and Senior High Ensemble. Dr. Robert McIver, of the Eastman voice faculty, will lead the Chancel Choir during Peter's sabbatical. Dr. McIver has extensive experience as a choral conductor and church musician, and this period promises to be a great time of learning and renewal for the choir, as well Chris Lenti will certainly be continuing her wonderful work with the children's and bell choirs, and will be the primary staff support for Music and Arts activities.

Peter DuBois Assumes Part time Responsibilities at Eastman

Third Church Director of Music/Organist Peter DuBois was recently appointed Assistant Professor of Sacred Music (part time) and Director of the Sacred Music Diploma Program at the Eastman School of Music. With the permission of the Personnel Committee and Session, he has assumed the directorship of this new and innovative program.

The Sacred Music Diploma is being offered for the first time at the school this fall. The curriculum goes beyond the normal course of study for Masters and Doctoral students at the school, but it can also be added as a fifth year of study following a Bachelor's degree.

The program is somewhat unique in this country, designed to provide a broad range of experiences and study options to students, reflecting the increasingly varied demands of the church music profession in our time and in the future. It is open to keyboard majors, as well as choral conductors, singers and music educators. Included in the curriculum are a core of sacred music skills classes, a course on perspectives in church music focusing on theological issues and different approaches to music and worship, and such varied courses as jazz improvisation and working with elementary and middle school choirs.

Peter's responsibility with the program is to provide overall direction and advising for the students in the program, as well as supervised internship coordinating a component of the curriculum. This is in addition to the one-semester course he currently teaches in Sacred Music Skills. Chris Lenti also teaches an extended segment in Sacred Music Skills geared toward working with children's choirs and handbells. These new responsibilities and the new program provide an exciting opportunity for Peter - and for Third Church - to be involved in the shaping of church music leadership for the future.

Dear Friends.

"Nothing will ever be the same again." That seems to be the consensus, does it not. We have certainly been living into a new reality, and the tragic, awful, obscene events of September 11 are now emblazoned onto our spirits and psyches for this generation and the ones to follow.

Our hearts are broken and aching and wandering. As people of faith and as American citizens, we are confronting and living with many emotions: grief, despair, anger, bewilderment. And we are filled with every kind of question: how? why? what now?

A partial answer to the "what now?" question will be prayer. Prayer, in this case, takes on the aura of hope. We who believe that God's heart is breaking over these events seek ways to become connected to the very heart of God. We further seek ways to become connected to one another, to the grieving ones in Pennsylvania and Washington, D.C. and New York City, to those in countless U.S. cities and global cities whose world was changed inalterably when they said good-bye to the ones they loved that Tuesday morning.

We will now also gather for at least five consecutive Fridays at 12:10 p.m. for noonday prayer in the Sanctuary, beginning September 28.

We are also being called to the roles of peacemakers and reconcilers because of the faith we claim and because of the life, death and resurrection of the one who claims us. That means we take our citizenship very seriously, and our participation in civic and public discourse. It also means that we can model for our nation the ways we find unity in our religious and ethnic diversity. We will be exploring ways in which we build relationships within our community over the coming months.

Dear Friends.

Allow me to use this space to make two commercials with a bit of a theological "nudge" to them.

This coming Sunday, October 14, Presbyterians across the Presbytery of Genesee Valley will gather at the Blue Cross Arena for "Gather at the River." It is estimated that several thousand people will attend this service, which will feature massed vocal and bell choirs and a celebration of the Lord's Supper.

We will hold worship here at Third Church at 9:00 a.m. "Gather at the River" will commence at 11:00 a.m. You could make a tremendous day of it and attend worship twice! At least come to one of the services! Thanks to many of you who have or will contribute to the success of this day. I am grateful that Third Church can continue to offer important leadership to the life of our presbytery.

Noted Presbyterian poet Ann Weems will be the preacher for the day. Many of you know her works, including Kneeling in Bethlehem and Kneeling in Jerusalem. I am sure that she will inspire us on that morning. I am also sure that we will find comfort, somehow, in a gathering of many of us at a time like this. The music will be great. The preaching will be great. Communion will be great. But the greatest of these will be the simple gathering of men and woman, young and old, all stripes, all types, from throughout our presbytery.

Secondly, you all know that the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is involved in a rigorous debate regarding its ordination standards and their relationship to human sexuality. Voting has now commenced on what is known as Amendment 01-A, which seeks to delete G-6.0106b from our Book of Order, the so-called "fidelity and

chastity" provision. There will be much more in these pages and in our life together over the next several months in terms of the debates around Amendment 01-A and the role Third Church has to play.

In the meantime, please consider attendin a very important conference that we are co-sponsoring with Westminster Presbyterian Church in Buffalo. We will gather in Buffalo on November 9 and 10 around the topic of "living with or without" athyn the current constitutional standard.

The fact of the matter is that faithful Presbyterians disagree on this issue, and the conference in Buffalo will attempt to place that disagreement in a faithful context. Speakers will include Barbara Wheeler (known by many of us as a friend of Third Church, President of Auburn Theological Seminary in New York City) and Jack Haberer, who serves as a pastor in Houston and who has served as moderator of the Presbyterian Coalition, group promoting our current guideline.

Beyond living with or without the current Book of Order provision, we are also called more deeply than ever to live together in order that we seek ways to share the love of God with an aching world.

So if you are so led and so able - come to "Gather at the River" on October 14 and come to Buffalo on November 9 and 10. Please do give me a call if you'd like information on either of these.

We need each other these days more than ever, and the world needs us. I am grateful Meet on the church grounds (inside in case of rain) for our long tradition and our present commitment to put our arms around one another in order that we may embrace the world.

THIRD VOICE

Dear Friends,

Each year, stewardship committees in churches great and small wrestle with finding just he right way to try to communicate the financial needs of the church and the call to support those needs. Sometime in early summer, our Stewardship Committee landed on "Rooted in Love, Growing in Faith" as its theme for the 2002 stewardship effort. Little did we know how prescient that decision would be.

The visual image for this stewardship season has been a tree, a tree whose roots represent God's love and whose branches represent the ways we respond to that love in faith. This fall, a wonderful series of Church Life Celebration luncheons have highlighted in creative ways those branches - the programmatic ways that this congregation has sought to live God's love out in the church and world. I like to think of it as faith in action: congregational care and fellowship; worship, music and arts; education for all ages; outreach and mission and service. All of these branches are, of course, nurtured as well by a church building that shelters us and a staff that labors faithfully and well on our behalf.

Yet as much as this story is about the branches, our faith response, it has seemed to me focused in these weeks in profound and poignant ways on the roots, God's love. In the face of unspeakable tragedy and in the face of continuing fear and anxiety and uncertainty, we have held on to one another as a community of love. We have turned to words in the pages of the Bible that have articulated in old, old ways about the love of God that we discover most hopefully in the person and ministry of Jesus Christ. We have looked one another in the eye or held a hand or shared an embrace, and by so doing have shared the love of God in extraordinary ways. Church historian Martin Marty writes that one of the unsung heroes of this fall has been the church itself. That is to say, when people turned to the church, there it was, open, ready to provide sanctuary, ready to provide words and music to begin seeking meaning for all this, ready to be a community of love and hope for those who sought it out and for a nation that needed its message more than ever.

We are rooted in God's love. That is the best news of all. We respond to God's love by building the church of Jesus Christ, whose best days would have it resemble a growing, thriving, flourishing tree that provides shade and anchor and strength and hope.

And now we are called to celebrate that love and support that tree and its growing branches with our financial resources. Much has been written these days on these things. about how we will respond in the face of economic uncertainty. Last year, the Third Church congregation responded magnificently to increased need by pledging in record-setting ways. This year, as we have moved through a time of transition into a new time in our life together, the need remains very real. We have a great story to tell one another and a world that so needs God's love. The tree that is Third Church matters, and it matters deeply, and it needs our tending. So thank you now, in advanced Stewardship Sunday on November 4, for your support of this place and all that it means to us and our community.

Thank God for love beyond love. Thank all you for living that love out in community. for roots that run deep and for branches that nurture and challenge and give hope, now, more than ever, when we need it most.

In Support of Amendment 01-A.

The 213th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) passed a proposed amendment that would delete G-6.0106b (the "fidelity and chastity" provision) from the Book of Order. This proposed amendment, known as 01-A, is now being voted on by the 173 presbyteries in our denomination. The Presbytery of Genesee Valley will vote on the amendment at its November 27 meeting. Third Church, along with other More Light congregations in our presbytery, will sponsor a gathering in support of 01-A on Monday, November 19 at 7pm at Downtown United Presbyterian Church. All are welcome to this time of information sharing and support.

THIRD VOICE

Dear Friends,

Many of you know the history better than I, but the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is again voting on its ordination standards with respect to human sexuality. The current proposed Amendment O1-A, approved by the 213th General Assembly, is now before the 173 presbyteries of our denomination. Our presbytery, the Presbytery of Genesee Valley, will hold its vote on November 27 in Summerville.

If passed, Amendment A would remove the current Book of Order requirement, known commonly as the "fidelity and chastity" provision, which effectively prohibits gay and lesbian persons from being ordained or installed to church office – minister, elder or trustee. OI-A would also erase the previous "definitive guidance" regarding this issue.

Depending on your vantage point along the spectrum, O1-A would either allow for the ordination of people who live contrary to biblical guidelines or it would allow responsible governing bodies (presbyteries and sessions) to make decisions about who it discerns that God is calling to leadership in the church.

I firmly support O1-A. It is not a perfect solution, by any means, to the thorny issues of ordination and human sexuality, nor the deeper divisive issues facing the Presbyterian family.

Though some would surely disagree with my perspective, I believe that OI-A provides the church with the "middle ground" it so urgently needs. It neither requires nor prohibits sessions or presbyteries from ordaining leaders as they see fit. Church "A" could make decisions based on their discernment; church "B" could make the opposite decision based on an equally valid discernment. Presbyterians, in generally equal numbers, disagree on these issues. In my mind, O1-A creates an atmosphere of "mutual forbearance" so that faithful, committed Presbyterians can live together, seeking to engage in ministry and mission while sharing differences of opinion on this non-essential matter of faith.

These are challenging times for the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), perhaps as contentious as any in recent memory. Our ordination standards are the presenting issue, but divisions run deeper than that. Debates such as Christology (what we say and believe about Jesus Christ) and the authority of scripture tear at our fabric. Mor so, however, than particular theological topics, we seem to be struggling to discover ways to trust those with whom we disagree, to forge new ways of being the church in an ever more complex social and cultural environment.

There is much more to come on all this. We will continue to communicate as the vote on Amendment O1-A unfolds. At some later point, we will also start sharing a conversation about a General Assembly Theological Task Force to which I have been appointed that will address the broader issues facing the church over the next four years. I continue to be grateful, and hopeful that Third Presbyterian Church has a leadership role to offer to our beloved Presbyterian community.

In the meantime, pray for the church, for Presbyterian brothers and sisters on all side of this issue. Pray for our peace and unity, that God's spirit might work through us so that we can be the body of Christ to and for one another.

THIRD VOICE

So fast on the heels of it all comes Advent. So fast on the heels of Thanksgiving (and I hope that yours will be, or was, a blessed one) comes Advent. So fast on the heels of a September that left us mourning and an October that left us in a daze comes Advent.

We Protestants have come to the Advent conversation more recently, in the past several decades or so. It is really only the most recent version of the Presbyterian hymnal that has included more than a handful of Advent hymns. Our awareness of liturgical color, for example, is a fairly new development – we will use purple during the four weeks preceding the birth of the Christ child as an indication of the somber preparation for the arrival of royalty. Advent wreaths are a new phenomenon in Presbyterian circles, and a welcome one.

I am grateful for these more recent developments, because I don't know what we would do without Advent. It is easy to blame the commercialization all around us but we in fact have done as much to shape the culture as it has done to shape us.

My deep gratitude for Advent flows from the very human fact that we so clearly need it. For those of you who have carried children, and for those of you who have welcomed them into your homes, you know that you needed a time of preparation, of physical preparation as well as emotional and spiritual preparation for something new, something different, something altogether life-changing. So it is for us, and the whole church. We need this time to get ready. You will hear words over and over again in these next weeks: prepare, anticipate, expect. They are very real and very human words. They are also very biblical words. The great words of the prophet Isaiah will ring out again. The songs of witnesses like John the Baptist ("prepare the way") and Mary ("my soul magnifies the Lord", will assist our preparations in wondrous ways. The hymns we sing - "Come, Thou Long-expected Jesus" and "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" and "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence" - will set the tone.

Just as the world in which we live will get ready for the big day in busy ways, so will this place be a busy one. That is good. We will sing and worship and leam and celebrate together.

But I hope that you will be able to carve out some quiet minutes amid the bushe of it all – even as we will do so at Third Church. This season of preparation is an important one, and will make our celebration of the arrival of the Christ child all the more joyous.

THIRD VOICE

At the outset of Advent, I want to share with you news from the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and to solicit your prayers.

As you may know, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is facing a challenging moment. In many ways, the contentious environment in which we have been living over the past several decades has reached a new level. There is great disagreement over the issues of ordination and human sexuality, but the divisions go deeper than that.

Many of the issues are theological – particularly regarding different thinking within the church about the Lordship of Jesus Christ as well as the role and authority of the Bible as the word of God. These are important issues, and worthy of deep theological reflection and broad dialogue.

Many of the issues, however, are not theological, or aren't theological on the surface. (Every issue is theological at its core, isn'til?) They result from differing approaches and visions about the church. They have to do with power and trust and decision-making. They have to do with an approach that considers everything either left/right or conservative/liberal, and how the church lives with those labels. These, too, are important issues, and deserve careful and sustained attention if the Presbyterian Church has any hope of offering a faithful and authentic witness into the 21st century.

In its wisdom, the 213th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), meeting last June in Louisville, called for the creation of a 17-member task force to address the "preace, unity and purity" of the church. Specifically, the task force was chartered to explore issues of "Christology, biblical authority, ordination standards, and power." In essence, this task force was asked to help the church move through, if not propose a solution for, the deep differences it faces. The task force will meet over four years and make a final report to the 2005 General Assembly. The Theological Task Force was appointed during the week of September 11 by the current General Assembly moderator, Jack Rogers, and his previous two predecessors, Syngmann Rhee and Freda Gardner. The three moderators determined that the task force would need 21 members, rather than 17, to represent fully the many facets of the Presbyterian Church.

Some have asked how the current vote on Amendment A will affect the work of the task force. There are two opinions, at least, on this: one says that the General Assembly was incorrect in proposing Amendment A and that the task force itself should propose a way out of our ordination struggles. Another opinion affirms what the assembly did, that the current G-6.0106b (Amendment B) would need to be removed from the Book of Order prior to the church moving ahead on any resolution to this issue. I happen to concur with that approach. We will wait and see what the church thinks. Either way, the task force will face issues of sexuality and our ordination standards.

So finally, the prayer request. I have been appointed to serve on this task force. I am humbled and honored and just a little bit daunted. And so I ask for your prayers. We meet for the first time this week in Dallas. I will report back to you as this work unfolds, as long as it is appropriate and relatively interesting. I am grateful for the opportunity, and grateful that Third Church takes its role in our denomination seriously and responsibly.

2001 Christmas Joy Offering

oyful giving has long been a Presbyterian tradition during the Christmas season as we celebrate our fellowship in the family of God. The Christmas Joy Offering provides tangible support to church workers who have faithfully served the church for many years and to the eight Presbyterian-related racial ethnic schools and colleges where the gifts of students are being developed.

The receipts to the offering are distributed 50% to the Board of Pensions and 50% to the Committee on Higher Education to support the racial ethnic schools and colleges.

The Board of Pensions administers three programs that provide support to retired and active church workers and their spouses and families. These programs supplement these individuals' regular benefits when they are inadequate.

Income Supplements are available to help retired church workers and their spouses when their total incomes fall below a level established by the Board of Pensions. Income supplements help raise their incomes to a level where they can live modestly and maintain their independence.

Nursing Home Care Assistance can help eligible retired church workers and their spouses who need long-term permanent care, but whose incomes and assets are inadequate to pay for the cost of such care, and who are not participating in Medicaid.

Shared Grants are provided for any eligible church worker of a surviving spouse in the event of an emergency of special financial need. This grant support is "shared" by the Board of Pensions and either the employing church, or organization, or presbytery.
